Bruffels, Jan 4. Monsieur de Tirenons, who is at present at Madrid, being made one of the Council of State in these Countries, the Marquis de Mottes has taken for him postession of his place in that Council. The Letters from Firms of the 23d past tell us, that the News they had of Techeley's having been strangled at Belgrade is contradicted, and that the last Advices they had from thence faid, That he was kept there under a firict Guard with Irons on his Feet; And that the Serasquier Ibrahim, who was still in those Parts, had Orders in case he could not make a Peace with the Emperor upon the Terms proposed by the Aga Ckekbi (who, among his other Proposals, has offered to deliver Teckeley to his Imperial Majesty) to fend him under a good Guard to Adrianople. It is added, that the Serasquier has declared, that the Grand Signior will not yield any Places to the Christians, but what they have already taken by their Arms; And that the Grand Visier thath assured him, that very considerable Forces will be sent to Hungary. against They write from Cologne, the next Campagne. that the Prince de Mourback, who was lately in England in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Cologne, lay so very ill there, that there were hardly any hopes left of his Reco-

Paris, Fan. 5. The Ambassador of Poland is preparing for his departure, which, it's believed, will be now in few days; It's faid he has not fucceeded in his Negotiation at this Court. Monfieur de Bethune, who has been a long time in Poland, has Orders to remain there with the Character of Ambaffador from this Crown. The Report continues of the King's Journey in the Spring towards Lor-rain and Alface. The differences between the Inhabitants of Fonterabia and those of Andaye are again adjusted by the King's Lieutenant of Bayonne, and the Governor of Fonterabia, who had a meeting for that purpose. The Electoral Prince of Saxony is arrived here incognito, intending to pass fome time in this City, and then to go for Italy. We have advice that Monsieur Girardin, Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty to the Grand Signior, is arrived at Constantinople.
