The Lord Chancellor has appointed George Spackman, of Bradford, in the county of Wilts, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Wheatenhurst Union, and to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by the Act eleventh and twelfth Victoria, cap. 123, intituled "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the tenth year of Her present Majesty for the more speedy removal of certain nuisances and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases," and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, directing that the provisions of the said Act be continued in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; We, the General Board of Health, are authorized to issue such directions and regulations as the said Board shall think fit for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases;

And whereas the parish of Arlingham, in the Wheatenhurst Union, appears to be affected by formidable epidemic or endemic disease;

We, the General Board of Health, do hereby order the execution of the directions and regulations following; viz.:

1. We authorize and require the said Board of Guardians to provide houses or suitable rooms, capable of accommodating necessitous cases, to which persons attacked by cholera, or are threatened with it, and who cannot be properly treated in their own houses, may be conveyed.

2. We further authorize and require the said Board of Guardians to provide houses of refuge, to which may be removed the families of such necessitous persons as have been attacked with cholera, and also such necessitous persons living under the same roof, or in the vicinity of persons so attacked, as the medical officers, acting under the authority of the said Board, may deem it necessary to remove; the houses, rooms, or dwellings, from which persons may have been removed to the houses of refuge, to be cleansed and purified by the owners, or persons having the care or ordering thereof, or, in their default, by the said Board of Guardians.

3. And we hereby authorize and require the said Board of Guardians to provide for the visitation at least once a day, by themselves, or their officers, or such persons as they may appoint in this behalf, of the several houses and dwellings throughout the bounds of the said parish, and to inquire into the condition and matters affecting

the health of the inmates of such houses and dwellings respectively, and their liability to contagious, epidemic, or endemic diseases, and especially as to the existence among them of bowel complaints.

4. And we authorize and require the said Board on their own inspection, or the report of the officers or persons by whom such visitations may be made, or other information which they may acquire from their own committees, or from visitors or others, as to the condition of the poor who may be affected with, or threatened by the cholera, or other epidemic disease, to supply such medical aid as may appear requisite, and to ap-point a sufficient number of medical officers for that purpose.

Whereas by the Act eleventh and twelfth Victoria, cap. 123, intituled, "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the tenth year of Her present Majesty, for the more speedy removal of certain nuisances, and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases," and by virtue of an order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, directing that the provisions of the said Act be continued in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; We, the General Board of Health, are authorized to issue such directions and regulations as the said Board shall think fit for the prevention as far as possible or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases.

And whereas the town of Liverpool appears to be affected by formidable epidemic or endemic disease ;

Now We, the General Board of Health, in further exercise of the power vested in us as aforesaid, do issue the directions and regulations hereinafter contained to extend to the parish of Liverpool:

1. That the Board of Guardians forthwith appoint twelve competent persons who shall make house to house visitations once each day, at the least, and at such other times as they may deem expedient or be directed to make, in all parts of Liverpool that may be affected or threatened with cholera, or diarrhœa, or other epidemic disease.

2. These Visitors shall, on such occasions, inquire into all instances of diarrhœa and premonitory symptoms of cholera; and carry with them medicines for the treatment of diarrhœa, and other premonitory symptoms of cholera, and also of cholera itself. They shall also on the spot administer the medicines where they shall see occasion, and direct the further treatment of the person as they may deem necessary.

3. The Board of Guardians shall also make such provision as they may deem requisite for the dispensing of all appropriate medicines in dispen-saries conveniently situated for the treatment of cases of diarrhœa and attacks of cholera.

4. We further authorize and require the Board of Guardians to provide houses or suitable places capable of accommodating necessitous cases, to which
