ham, in the west riding of the county of York, and within the diocese of York, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Greaseborough, in the said parish of Rotherham, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes, or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners, by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should comprise certain portions of the township or chapelry of Greaseborough, and should be called 'The Chapelry District of Greaseborough,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

"The chapelry district of Greaseborough is bounded on the east, and partly on the north, by the parish of Rawmarsh, on other part of the north, and on the north-west, by the chapelry of Wentworth, in the parish of Wath-upon-Dearne; on the west, and partly on the south, by the township of Kimberworth, and on the remaining part of the south by the township of Rotherham, both in the parish of Rotherham, as such proposed district is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary at Greaseborough, and that baptisms, churchings, and burials should be performed or continue to be performed in such church. That the fees to arise from such publication of banns or solemnization of marriages should be reserved for or paid over to the Reverend Richard Mosley, the present vicar or incumbent of the parish church of Rotherham, during his incumbency thereof, and upon his avoidance of such incumbency that the said fees should belong to the incumbent for the time being of the said church of Saint Mary, at Greaseborough. That the fees to arise from baptisms, clurchings, and burials should be paid and belong to such last mentioned incumbent and his successors:

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thomas Lord Archbishop of York, as the Archbishop of the diocese, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Thomas Lord Archbishop of York has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, church-

ings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act," to amend and render more effectual an Act, "passed in the last session of Parliament, for build-"ing and promoting the building of additional "churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of June one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Polesworth, in the county of Warwick, and within the diocese of Worcester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Trinity Church, situate at Warton, in the said parish of Polesworth, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render 'more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the 'building of additional churches in populous 'parishes,' or under and by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners, by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be called 'The Chapelry District of Warton,' with boundaries as hereinbefore mentioned:

"The chapelry district of Warton is bounded on the east-north-east by the parish of Austrey, on the east-south-east by the parish of Orton-on-the-Hill, on the south by the parish of Grendon, on the south-west and west by the road leading from Grendon to Shuttington, and on the north-west and north by the Lordship of Bramcote, in the said parish of Polesworth, as such proposed chapelry district of Warton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized and performed in the said church called Trinity Church, at Warton aforesaid; and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the incumbent of such church for the time being:
