Weymouth, Nov. 16. The 13th instant arrived here a French Barque from Bour deaux, laden with Wines and Prunes, bound for St. Valery, but by ill weather forced into this Port. On the 19th past she left in the Harbour at Bourdeaux about 400 fail of Merchents loading for several Countries. On Thursday came into Portland Road a Vesfel of Rechefter from France, with Brandy and Prunes, bound for London.

Venice, Nov. 4. Our latest Letters arrived from the Le-Court to recall the Grand Visier from the Siege of Candia, the great Ministers giving out that he is to be employed with a numerous Army against the Persi ins, who notwithstanding the War they have already with the Mogul, have drawn a great force together, intending to recover Bagaist and some other places formerly taken from them by the Turks, but tis tather believed the Grand Seignior being distatissed with the Vitier for the little success he has had against the City of Candia, having not in five months time gained any confide able Post, nor made any advance answerable to the vast exence of moneyes and men, intends under this pretext to call him home, where he may probably lose his head, which he engaged for the conquest of that place.

3. The Sultan Galga engages himself in the name of the Chara of Tartary his Master, and all his Subjects, to declare themselves enemies to all such as shall make War upon the Poles, and to affift them with their Forces whenfoever they shall be required ; for the which the Poles are to pay them an yearly Pension, and for so doing to give sufficient Hostages, will the States, which are to be Assembled in Fanussy next, shall have raised money for their present satisfaction.

4. That the Cham shall not Quarter any of his Forces in Whrania, nor in any part of the King of Polands Domini-

5. If any of the Foreign Forces which have been in the Army of the Cham, shall make any Incursions into Poland, as shall not give them either affishance or protection.

6. He shall release and set at liberty all prisoners taken within the space of the year past in the Country near Crasovia, and particularly Machowsky, and the Poles to do the farme with all Priloners taken by them. The Sultan Galga farther engaging to hinder the Forces under his Command from committing any dilorders in their return.
