Madrid, Decemb. 20.

HE 7th inftant their Catholick Majeffies returned hither from the Buen Rettro. The King has named A the Count de Fuenfalida, at prefent Viceroy of Sardinia, to be Governor of the Dutchy of Milan in the place of the Count de Melgar, who is to go Ambailador to Rome. Upon the Complaints of the French Ambaffidor, an Alcalde has been fent to Fonterabiar to enquire into the diforders that lately happened there between the Inhabitants of that place and thole of Andaye. The Popes Nuncio has prefented to the King a Brief from his Holinofs for the raifing an extraordinary Contribution upon the Clergy of this Kingdom, to be em-Poyed in the War against the Tarks.

Naples, Decemb, 12. The Gallies of Sicily and Sardinia parted from hence on Sunday laft, the first for Palermo, and the latter for Cagliari, where they are to winter. The Venetian Relident has obtained leave of our Viceroy to begin the Levy he is to make in this Kingdom for the feryice of the R-publick.

The 18th inftant arri-Venice, Decemb. 25. ved here a Salque, with Letters from Signior Giofeppo Morofini, who Commanded the Convoy that tailed from hence the 11th of the last month; which give an account, That the Ship in which he was, being the 18th of the fame month, feparated by a violent Storm from the reft of the Fleet in the Sca of Ragufa, he was obliged to put into the Port of Meleda, from whence he failed again the 19th, That the night following the Soldiers that w cre in the faid Ship, to the number of about 100, with the Officer that Commanded them, having Conspired to Assalinate his Excellency, and the Captain, and afterwards to make themselves Masters of the Ship and Treafure that was on board it, betook them eive to their Arms; Some of them with their Commander came to the great Cabin, and were going to break it open, when Signior Morofini awakening with the noile they made, and pu ting out the Candle, with the help of a rope got out of the Window up to the quarter Deck, where he found the Captain, who had likewife taken the Alarm, putting the Scamen into a pollure of defence, fome of which he cauled to g t upon the Main Yard, and from thence to throw han't Granadoes among the Confpirators, who af er a sharp dispute, and having been some time Master of the Great Cabin, (where however they could not find the Publick money, being 135 Thousand Zechins, but to k 250 Zechins out of a Truak belonging to his Excellency,)

were forced to retire to the Fore Caffle; They defended themfelves there for above two hours. but were at laft overcome, the greateft part of them with their Commander *Vinalis* being Slain, and the reft fecured, the Chief of which were afterwards thrown into the Sea. One the other fide Signior *Gerolama Beregani*, with feveral of the Seamen were killed, and many more wounded, of which number were his Excellency and the Captain of the Ship; the Senate have rewarded the latter with a Chain of Gold to the value of 1000 Ducats, and have given a fum of money to be distributed among the Seamen, and the Wives and Children of them that are killed. The Gourier that was laftly fent to *Viewna* with directions to the Venetian Ambailador at that Court, upon the Propofals of Peace made by the *Turks*, returned hither in the 20th infant, and 2mong other things brings an account, that the Marefthal *Coningintark*, who is to Command the Forces of this Republick, intends to be here towards the latter end of *February*.

Turin, Decemb. 25. The Dutchels of Savoy has been for leveral days very hit of a Feaver, but is at prefent much better than the was. We have an account from Milan, that the Count de Melgar has received from Madrid the Ratification of the Treaty he lately made with the Republick of Venice, by which he is obliged to affilt that State with 2500 Men.

Dantzick, Decemb. 22. The last Letters from the Polift Court at Zolkiew, inform us, that feveral of the G neral Officers were como thitber, having put the Forces of the Crown into their Winter-quarters; That the Great General was daily expected, and that fo foon as he arrived a Conneil of War would be held, to confult about the preparations for the next Campagne. That the Ambaffadors of Poland were arrived at Grodno and were preparing to continue their Journy from thence to Mofcow; This Embally is compoled of Four Persons of Eminent Quality, of which the Palatin of Pofnen is the first; Their buliness is first to adjuit the differences that have to long depended between the two Nations about the limits, and then to endeavor to engage the Czars into the League against the Turks; and according to the advices we receive from that Court; we have reason to believe they will succeed in their Ne-We have an account from Moldagotiation. via, that the Turks have reparted the Danube; They give out that they thall have greater Armies in the Field the next Campagne than they had this laft.

Vienna, Decemb. 22. The Turkifb Aga continues fill at Comorra, but will now be very fuddenly difpatched with an Anfwer in the Name of all the Allies; It's faid, that on the Part of the Emperor will be demanded the Reflictution of all the Placeg that are policified by the Turks in the Upper and

Lower Hungary, and in Crossie ; On the Part. of the King of Poland, the Reflicution of Caminiet , and the whole Province of Podolia; And on the Part of the Republick of Venice, the Ceffion of the whole Moree. Prince Abifii and the States of Transilvania have, we are cold, agreed to provide Winter quarters for 8000 Men, and to furnilh Provisions and Forage for the other Imperial Regiments which are in Garifon at Zolnocke, St. Nieolas, and Saravas. The Town and Territory of Debrecen will maintain 6000 Men,and it's believed that the other plac s in Upper Hungary may maintain about 15000 Men more. The last Letters from Cafcham told us, That the Princefs Ragotzi perfilling in her Refulal to receive an Imperial Garifon. General Caprara had with found of Trumpet declared her, and all that adhere to her, Rebels to the Emperor. What was faid of the Imperialifis having taken the Fortreis of Gyula is not confirmed, but the Report continues of Colonel Healters having cut off a great Party of Turks between Zolnocke and Saravas. The Baron de Marenbais Eavoy from the Princes of Lunenburgh, hath made a new Treaty concerning the Troops with which, those Princes are to affilt the Emperor the next Campagne. The Elector of Bavarsa has written to his Imperial Majeftysthat he intends to be at the Head of his Forces in Hungary in the Month of April. Most of the Officers that were here; are gone to make their Recruits.

The Count de Winditf 1 Ratsbonne, Decemb. 25. gratz is returned hither from Vienna, with the quality of the Emperors Ambaffador, but he has not yet declared his Character to the Dyet. . His Imperial Majefty has again written to the States of the Empire affemblied here; to demand their affiliance against the Turks. ; The Electoral Colledge have begun 'to deliberate upon the first point of the Execution of the Treaty of Truce between the Empire and the Crown of France, and have declared, that they think this City the most convenient place for the Conference which is to be held for the fettling the Limits, but the other two Colledges have not yet taken any refolution therein.

The Deputies our prefent. Cologne, Fanu, I. Magistrates sent to the Elector of Trier, and to the Elector Palatin, to thank them for the good Offices they employed on their behalf with the Emperor, are come back very well fatisfied with the Reception their Electoral Highneffes gave them. They write from Liege, That the States of that Diocels which have been allembled for above thefe two Months, are feparated, having fet led all matters to the entire Carisfaction of the Elector of Cologne their Prince, We have Letters from Nurembergh of the 28th pall, which tell us, thet the States of Franconia had been feveral day's a fembled there ; And that the Count de Holenloe who is a Member of that Circle + had prefented a Memorial to them in the Name of the Emperor, by by which his Imperial Majefly thanks them for the affiltance they gave him this laft Campagne, and for leaving their Troops to winter in Hungary, and defires them to halten the recruiting of them, that they may be in a condition to return into the Field carly in the Spring. The States of the Upper Rhine are likewise affembled at Marpourg, to raise a Fond for the maintaining their Troops now in the Emperor's Service.

Hamburgh, Decemb. 31. The Troops of Lunenburgb which return from Hungary, have made a Halt in the County of Schwarzemburgb, where they expect farther orders. The Count de Breu-wr appointed by the Emperor to conduct them, arrived the 23d. inftant at Zell, and had be I having matters of moment then to communicate to them

The laft Letters from Rome told us the Pope was very much indisposed.
