By the KING, A PROCLAMATION.

JAMES R.

Heneas the Parliament bath been Prorogued until the Tenth day of February next, We, for many weighty Reafons, have thought fit and Refolved to make a further Prorogatian of the Parsiament, until the Tenth day of May next enfuing the Date hereof: And therefore do by this Our Royal Provlamation Publifs, Notifie and Declare, That the Parliament fhall be Peorogued upon and from the faid Tenth day of February, until the Tenth day of May next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeffes, and all others whom it may Concern, may hereby take Notice, and Order their Affairs accordingly: We letting them know, That we will not at the faid Tenth day of February expect the Attendance of any, but onely fuch, as being in or about the Cities of London and Weftminfler, may Attend the making the faid Prorogation, as heretofore in like Cales hath been accuffored. And we do alfo bereby further Declare Our Royal Pleafure, That We fhall not expect the Attendance of Our Houfes of Parliament upon the faid Tenth day of May, but intend at that time a further Prorogation May, but intend at that time a further Prorogation to a more proper Jeafon of the Fear unlefs fome Extraordinary Occafion requires their Sitting, whereof We will give Convenient Notice by Our Royal Proclamation.

Genoua, Decemb. 22. This Week arrived here the Good Success from Barcelona. We have advice that the French are fitting out 15 Gallies at Marfeilles, and 10 Men of War at Toulon. The 17th inflant passed through this City a French Courier in his way to Rome. They write from Milan, that the 3000 Men, which the Count de Melgar is obliged by the Treaty he lately concluded with the Republick of Venice to fend to their affiltance, would in few days begin their march.

Venice, Decemb. 28. The Mafter of a Veffel. which arrived here this week from Soria reports, that he heard before his departure from thence, that the Ships of this State, Commanded by Signior Delfano, had been engaged with Nine Turkifh Men of War, off of Scio, and had taken Five of them, and were in purfuit of the reft; And that a great Turkifh Ship carring 60 Guns and so Men had been caft away in the Sea of Baffo and all the Men loft.

Vienna, Decemb. 27. The Emperor has givene orders for the providing great Magazines in *Creatia*, for the fubliftence of his Forces on that fide, which will be Commanded the next Campagne by the Count of Starembergb. We have an account from those parts, that the Imperial Troops had made an Incursion into the Turkifb Territories, but that the weather had obliged them to return without doing the execution they

intended. The Turkish Aga, who was at Co-morra, is fent back to Budz with this answer', That the Emperor and his Allies will not receive any Propofals of Peace but what come diretly from the Grand Signior. We have advice, but it needs a confirmation, that the Seralquier Ibrahim, who Commanded the Ottoman Forces in Hungary the last Campagne has been Strangled at Belgrade by order of the Grand Signior, for not having relie. ved Newbeusel, and that several other Bassa's have been likewife Strangled to appeale the People. The Count de la Vauguyon arrived here the 25th inflant to refide at this Court with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the most Christian King. The Deputies from the Prince of Tran-filvania are daily expected; That Prince befices the Winter-quarters he gives the Imperial Troops, Commanded by General Caraffa, is obliged to furnish Provisions and Forage for the Gaulions of Zolnock, St. Nicholas, and fome other places on that fide.

Vienna, Fanu. 3. On Monday last arrived here an Express from Casebaw, being fent by General Caprara with the news of the happy fuccels the Imperialifts have lately had against the Turks, of which he gives the following account. The Gailons of Temiswaer, Sigeth, Gyula and other Neighboring places having drawn together to the number of 6000 Men, with a defign to joyn with those of Great Waradin, Agria, Hatwan and Buda, that they might with their whole force fall upon the Imperial Troops in the constant to be been the to be been build the quarters they had taken in their Neigh-borhood, the Baron de Merey and Colonel. Heufler who Command the Emperors Forces on that fide, upon notice of it, allembled the Troops that were quartered at ZWnock and the places thereabouts, and havirgjoyned these which made. about 3000 Men, all Germans, with 3000 Hun-garians, under the Orders of General Peserbase. marched towards the Enemy, whom they found near the River Maros or Marach; The two Bodies being drawn into order of Battel engaged, and fought for fome time with great Fury on both fides, but God continuing to bles the Christian Arms, the Turks at last field, part of them towards the Town of Arach distant 12 miles from Temismaer and as many from Sigeth, where they very vigoroully defended them(elves against the Christians who had purfued them; but at last the place was taken by affault, Plundered and burnt, the Turks that fled thither being ail put to the Sword; The Imperialills returned with a very confiderable booty, having taken a great many Horles and a good deal of mone, and Rich Houlhold Goods. Of the Enemy 900 were Slain upon the place of Fight, belides those killed in the pursuit and at Arach, among the Slain, ac-cording to the report of the Prisoners who are about 300, was a Baffa and feveral other Eminent Officers, though the Imperialifts loft not in this whole Action above 100 Men, Ham-

Hamburgh, Jan. 4. The Baron de Kaunitz, the Brandenburgh Minister, who has made several Journies between Berlin, Zell, and this City, in order to the accommon the Differences we have at prefent with the Duke of Zell, thô hitherto with no great fuccels in his N gotiation, finding he could not remove the Difficulties that hinder it, has taken his leave of that Prince, and is gone back to Berlin. We are told that the Elector of Brandenburgh, b. fides the Forces he has promifed to alfilt the Emperor with against the Turks, intends to have a good Army in the Field the next Spring, to march, if there be occasion, towards the Rbine. The Letters from Poland tell us, That a Council of War had been held at Zolkiew, where it had been refolved to raife feveral new Regiments, and that the Officers shall be commanded to have these Levies, as well as their Recruits, complete before the end of April, the King intending to be in the Field at the Head of his Army in the beginning of May; These Letters add, that the Marquis de Berbune is appointed by the most Christian King to refide at that Court in the Quality of his Ambaffador. They write from Riga, that some persons who came lately from Moscow, reported, that there seemed to be a great inclination at that Court to enter into a strict Alliance with the Crown of Poland, and in confequence thereof to We have an turn their Arms against the Turks. account from Pomeren, that the Velt Mareschal Coningfmarke having obtained the King of Sueden's leave to command the Venetian Forces the next Campagne, was preparing for his Journey to Venice, which he intends to begin fome time the next Month.

Cologne, Jan. 11. The Imperial Sub-Commillioners are returned hither, and have begun to examine the Complaints made against the present Magistrates. Colonel Kirbering who formerly commanded the Garison here, and was put out during the late diforders, was two days ago reftored to that Command, The Sindic Rolenbaer, who was fent to Vienna by the Burghermaffers that have been fince removed from the Magistracy, returned hither this Week.

Hague, Jan.7. Lieutenant-General Spaen parted from hence the 5th inftant for Cleves, to be prefent at the Affembly of the States of that Countrey which are to meet the next Week. Great Endeavors are uled'to compole the Differences between the Count de Benthem and his Sons: The Baron de Craegh, and the Heer Van Diejl, Envoys Extraor, dinary from the King of Denmark and the Elector of Brandenburgh, had yesterday a Conference with the Deputies of the States General on that Subjećt, The Heer Van Stille, the Brandenburgh Minifter, having difpatched the Bufinels he was fent hither about, will part from hence in a day or two on Fis Return to Berlin. The Heer Fun Heemskerke, Amballador from this State at the Court of Spain, has obtained leave to return home, and is accordingly expected here in the Spring

Bruffels, Fan. 8. The Letters from Madrid of the zoth paft, fay, the Count de Melgar, Governor of the Milaneze, declines the Embally to Rame, but that the King has however given that bovern ment to the Conde de Fuenfalida, Viceroy of Sar-Monficur Faultrie, I tendant of Maubeuge, dinia. palled through this City the last Week in his way to Holland. They wrie from Hungary, that the Turks were drawing togetherfrom Buda Agria, Temeswaer, Great Waradin, Sigetb, and other Places; And that the Imperial Generals did likewife affemble their Troops, to have an Eye upon them. That General Caprara was making Preparations to attack the Caffle of Montgatz, the Garifon whereof, as he was informed by feveral Deferters, begun to want feveral Necessaries, and their chief Officers were divided among themselves, some be-ing of opinion, that their b. It way is to submit in time, while others, who are the Majority, are refolved to defend the Place, till they hear what becomes of Teckeley, perfuading themfelves that he will not only obtain his Liberty, but that the Turks will put him at the Head of a confiderable Army, which we cannot imagine what ground they have for, the Advices from Belgrade telling us that he is kept there under a firict Guard with Irons on his Legs.

Bruffels, Fan. 15. The Letters from Vienna of the 3d inftant tell us, that the Emperor had received advice by an Express, of a great Defeat given to the Turks, who were allembled from Gyula, Temeswaer, and other neighbouring Places, with intent to join with another Body from Buda, Agria, Hatwan, & c. and then to attack the Imperial Troops in their Winter-quarters; But that these having had timely notice of their delign, the Baron de Mercy and Colonel Heusler drew together 2000 Imperial Horle, and 1000 Foot, and being reinforced with a Body of Hungarians commanded by Peterbasi, marched towards the Enemy, whom, after a tharp Engagement, they entirely routed, purluing those that fled to a place called Arach, which they took by Allault, putting all the Turks that were there to the Sword; of the Enemy there were found about 800 flain on the place of Fight, and it cannot be doubted but that the number of those killed in the Pursuit, and at Arach, was much greater, among which, as the Prifoners report, was feveral Officers in great effect with the Turks; And to add to the joy of this Victory, we are cold, it has not coff the Chriftians 80 Men killed and The Letters from Cologne tell us, that wounded. the Prince of Mourbacke continues very ill, with little hopes of his Recovery.
