Warfaw, Decemb. 22. GHE Letters from Zolkiew of the 14th Inflant, inform us, that a great Council of War, at which were prefent the King of Poland, 24 Se-nators, and the General Officers of the Army, had been held there, that it begun the 2d and ended the oth of this Month ; and that perfuant to the Refolutions there taken, Orders had been given concerning the Recruits, the railing feveral new Regiments, the preparing a good Train of Artillery, and the providing Magazines for the fubfiftence of the Forces of the Crown, which it's intended shall take the Field towards the latter end of April, or in the beginning of May at farthest; And the general opinion is, that they will begin the Campagne with the Siege of Cami-These Letters add, That the Pope has by ticc. his Nuncio at that Court promifed the King a upply of 500000 Florins to be employed in the pre-parations for the next Campagne, and to provide befides Cloaths for 6000 Foot Soldiers. And that the King had given the Archbishoprick of Gnefna, to the Sieur Wiskowiski Bilhop of Pofnen. They write from Grodno, that the Ambassadors of this Crown were arrived there, and that they would in few days continue their Journey towards Mosco, with a very magnificent Equipage. We are told from Lemburgh, That an Envoy was arrived there from Tartary, being fent, as he reported, to offer the Cham's Mediation for the making a Peace between the Crown of Poland and the Port, but that he was lookt upon but as a Spy, and was therefore very firicity observed. The Coffacts have frequent Rencounters with the Tartars; They have lately, it's laid, defeated a confider ble Party of them, and taken four picces of Cannon.

Vienna, fan 6. Ihere can be no greater diligence used than there is in making the preparations for the next Campagne. The Chamber of the Finances has fetled the Fonds that are necessary for that Service. And the Pope's Nuncio has caufed a confiderable Sum of Money to be paid to the Count de Rabata, Commiflary General of the Imperial Army, towards the providing of Magazines in Hunga-We have a Confirmation of the Victory lately obtained by the Imperialifis near Arach ; Feterbass, who abandoned the Rebels and returned to his Obedience to the Emperor upon Teckeley's being made a Prisoner at Great Waradin, did in this occasion very gallantly behave himself with the Hungarians under his Command ; He gave the first Notice to the Baron de Mercy and Colonel Heufler, who were then at Zolnock, that the Turks were drawing together their belt Troops, and that their defign was to conduct a great Convoy which had been provided in Transilvania to Gyula, and afterwards, being reinforced with other Troops from Sigeth, Hatwan, Agria, and Buda, to Attack the

Imperialists in their Winter-quarters, upon which General Mercy affembled with all the hafte he could 2000 Imperial Horfe, and 1000 Dragoons, and having joined with 3000 Hungarians under the Orders of the foid Peterbasi, fell upon the Turks, who exceeded the Christians in number, and defeated them, as you have been already told; Arach, which the Imperialists took afterwards, is a Town, or rather a great Caffle on the River Matos, which by the means of a Bridge that is there over that River, kept a Communication between Temiswaer and Gyula; The Imperialists took the whole Convoy abovementioned, with all the Horfes belonging to it, and 11 Colours, with 3 Ket-tle-Drums; The Sieur de Baffompierre, Lieutenant Colonel to the Baron de Mercy, who arrived here the 4th inffant, has prefented to the Emperor avery rich Cimcter which he took in this Action ; He, affures us, that of the Enemy there were 700 flain on the place of Fight, and above double that number in the purfuit and at Arach, and that they took 200 Prifoners; on our fide there were killed about 300 Hungarians, and 100 Germans. The Count d'Erdeudi, Viceroy of Croatia, is expected here the next week, to receive the Emperor's Orders about putting the Militia of that Countrey into fuch a pofture as may render them most ferviceable the next Campagne. The Baggage of the Ambassadors that are coming from the Prince of Transituania, arrived here last Thursday, and they themselves are expected in few days.

Raticbonne, Jan. 12. It is confirmed as well from Drefden and Berlin, as Vienna, that the Ele-Stors of Saxony and Brandenburgh have obliged themselves by the Treaties they have lately con-cluded with the Emperor, to affilt his Imperial Maj fly with confiderable Bodies of Men against the Turks. The Elector of Bavaria makes great preparations for the Campagne, and continues refol-ved to command his Forces in Perfor. The laft Letters from Vienna told us, that the Duke of Lorrain is expected there in February, and that it's helieved he will be going for Hungary towards the end of March, where in the mean time all things are preparing for an early Campagne. There are Letters from the Court of Poland of the 19th of the laft Month, which fay that the Turks had made Propofals of Peace to that King, whereby they offer to reflore the Ukraine, and the Province of Podolia, and to give him a confiderable Sum of Money belides for the charges of the War; but that they would not reftore Caminiec, because the Grand Signior was in perfonat the taking of it. The Advices we have from the Turkish Territories are very uncertain; the last told us, that the Serafquier who commanded the Ottoman Army in Hun, gary had been firangled, with feveral other eminent Officers, by Order of the Grand Signior ; and that the Turks will have great Armies in the Field the next Summer.

" Hamburgh, Fan. 7. They write from Stackbolme of the 22d palt, that the Count de Noftinz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, was arrived there, and had had a private Audience of the King of Sueden. The Troops of Hanpouer which ferved in Hungary the last Campagne, have taken their Quarters in the Counties of Pinebourg and Tekelenbourg. The Electoral Prince and Princess of Brandenburgb having paffed three or four days at Hanouer, are returned to Berlin; from whence we have an account, that the Elector of Brandenburgh is going to raife feveral new Regiments.

The Imperial Sub-Commif-Cologne, Jan. 12. fioners are now employed in examining the Complaints against the lateiMagistrates. [Gulick , Sacks, and Machovius, at prefent Prifoners at Dufeldorpe, are ordered to be removed to Mulbeim. The laft Letters from Hungary confirm the News we gave you in our last of the defeat of 6000 Turks, who were drawn toget er to conduct a Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition from Arach to Gyala; which is a great Victory, not fo much for the Number of the Enemy that were flain, though that is very confiderable, as for that it has in all likelihood fecured the Imperialists from any farther flurbance in their Winter-quarters on that fide, and has depriv'd the Garisons of Gyula and Great Waradin, which will doubtle's fuff r very much by the lofs of this Convoy of the means of supplying themselves with Provisions from Transilvania by the way of Arach. They write from Vienna, that the Emperor has appointed the Count de Starembergh to com, mand his Forces in Croasia, where his Imperial Majeffy intends to have a very good Army the next Campagne.

Hague, Fan. 14. The Heer Van Starembourgh, Ambailador Extraordinary from this State at the Court of France, has leave to return home for a fhort time to look after his private affairs. States of Halland are now again affembled. The The Council of State had yefterday a long Conference with the Deputies of the States General. The Heer Van Beuningen one of the Burgermalters of the City of Amsterdam decsit's faid with much earnestness defire leave to relign that Office, and to retire from publick bulinefs, but has not yet been able to obtain it. The Elector of Brandenburgh we are told has written to the Emperor on the behalf of the young Counts of Benthem, to whole determination that matter is submitted as the onely proper Judge thereof. The Heep Van Guldenstolpe the Suedifb Minister, has had feveral Conferences with the Deputies of the States General about renewing the defensive Alliance

between the King of Sueden and this State, Bruffels, fan. 18. This Evening arrived the Spanish Ordinary with the News of his Excellencies being confirmed in this Government, which is received here with a great deal of joy. His Catholick Majefty has given him the Title of Marquis, and has commanded him to remove from the Houle where he now is, to the Palace; And we are allured that a confiderable Sum of Money will be remitted hither from Spain by the next Ordinary. The Prince de Vaudemont is much better, fo that we have great hopes of his Recovery.
