Venice, Fan. 5. We have no farther News of the light which the Master of a Vessel arrived c Levant reported there had been off of S State com-r 1 red by Signiot Delfino, and some Ships of Barbary; but we have advice, which we give more credit to, that the faid Signior Delfino, and the Grecian Privateer Manetta, have made a Descent in the Kingdom of Candia, and taken the Castle of Girapietra, which stands near the Sca-side; It was defended by 200 Turks, the greatest part whereof were flain, and the rest made Prisoners. By a Vessel come from Coron we are informed, that 2000 Turks had drawn together near the Borders of the Province of Maine, intending to fall upon the Inhabitants of that Countrey, who have put themselves under the protection of this Republick, but these were so well upon their Guard, that the Turks did not think fit to put their defign in execution. Another great Convoy is preparing here for the Fleet, which will be ready to fail in a -week or ten days. Captain General Morofini was, according to our last Advices, at Corfou, from whence he had lent a Supply of Provisions and Ammunition to Coron. Eight hundred new raised Men are arrived at the Lido. Vienna, fan. 7. A considerable Sum of Money
was sent from hence the last Week for the paying the Garisons in Lower Hungary. The Count de Ra-bata, the Commissary General, has received 300000 Florins of the Ecclefiastical Contribution rasted within the Hereditary Countries, which he is to employ in the providing of Magazines. The Officers have received the Money for their Recruit, which they are commanded to have compleat against the end of March, but because some Regiments are very much weakned, the Emperor has given Orders for the reforming them, and putting the Soldiers into other Bodies. His Imperial Majelly does treat with some Princes of the Empire for part of their Troops which are to be likewife incorporated into the old Regiments. The Forces with which the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburgh have promifed to affilt the Linperor, are to be commanded by their own Generals. Ratibonne, Fan. 13. The Levies that are ma-king in these Parts for the Service of the Elector of Bavaria, advance very fuccessfully, and will, it's believed, be compleated by the end of the next His Electoral Highness, as we are told from Municke, intends to affift the Emperor with 12000 Men the next Campagne, and to command them in Person. They write from Vienna, that the Ambassadors they daily expected there from the Prince of Transivania, had full power to conclude an offensive Alliance with the Emperor against the Turks; but there are Letters from Bungary, which Say their chief Errand is to make new Proposals of Peace on the part of the Grand Signior.

States of the Empire affembled here, have not yet taken a final Resolution concerning the place of Conference for the fetling the Limits between the Empire and the Crown of France; The Electoral Colledge have indeed declared, that they think this City the most convenient place for that purpose, but the two other Colledges are not yet come to any conclusion therein.

Cologne, Fan. 18. The Imperial Sub-Commisfioners having received directions from Vienna up. on the matters they had laid before his Imperial Majesty, it's believed they will now in a short time finish their Commission. They intend once more to examine the three Prisoners at Duseldorpe, who after that will be removed to Mulbeim, in order to the execution of the Sentence that shall be pronounced against them. The Prince de Croy, General of the Emperor's Artillery, arrived here this week from Francfort. The Prince de Mourbach continues very ill, though not without hopes of his Recovery. The Letters from Vienna of the roth Inflant tell us, that the late Defeat of the Turks near Arach, had put all their Garisons on that side into a very great Consternation: And that the Baron de Mercy had sent an Officer to Vienna, to defire a reinforcement of 2000 Imperial Foot, with which he undertook to attack the Fortrel's of Gyula, and doubted not to make himself Master of it.

Hamburgh, Fan. 18. The Troops which the Duke of Hanouer sends to the assistance of the Republick of Venice, began their march the 15th of this Month. We are affured that the Treaties between the Emperor and the Electors of Saxony and Brandenburgh concerning the Forces with which these Princes are to affish his Imperial Majesty, are concluded; Those of the latter, as they write from Berlin, will be commanded by General Schoning. The same Letters say, that his Electoral Highness has resolved to raise several new Regiments; And that he intends to have a good Body of an Army in his Countrey of Cleves the next Summer. The Letters from Poland tell vs, that the Tartars continue their Incursions into the Frontier Provinces of that Kingdom, from whence they have carry'd great Numbers of People into Slavery,

Hague, Jan. 20. Mr. Skelton, Envoy Extraordinary from H.s Majesty of Great Britain, is gone for England, from whence he is expected back again in three Weeks or a Month. The defensive Alliance between the King of Sueden and this State is renewed, having been figned the 12th Inflant by the Heer Guldenstolpe, Envoy Extraordinary from that Kirg, and the Deputies of the States General; By which they are reciprocally to assist each other in case of need with 6000 Men, and 12 Ships. The Treaty concerning the Separation of the Limits between this State and that of Liege is likewise concluded, and the Ratifications thereof will be exchanged in few days. Prince Waldecke is expected here the next Week from Germany. The Heer Van Diest, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, returned hither this week from Cleves.

Bruffels, Fan. 22. On Friday last in the Evening wereceived by the Spanish Ordinary the welcome News of his Excellencies being confirmed in this Government, upon which he was the next day Complimented by all the Nobility, Ministers and General Officers, as likewise by the Council of State, and all the other Councils. On Sunday the Nations of this City, by their Deputies, performed the same Compliment, as the States of this Province and the Magistrates of this City have likewife done. His Excellency will remove to the Palace the next Week, which is making ready in the mean time. The Heer Van Staremberg, Am-bassador from the States General of the United, Provinces at the Court of France, arrived here two or three days ago from Paris, and yesterday continued his Journey for Holland. The Letters from France tell us, that the difference about the French Money seized at the Grojne will be accommodated; and that in the mean time the most Christian King has given Orders for the stopping the Confiscations that were ordered to be made by way of Reprizal in the New Conquests. They write from Vienna, that the Elector of Saxony is to affift the Emperor with 9000 Men, the Elector of Brandenburgh with 8000, and the Landtgrave of Hesse Cassell with 4000, in pursuance of the Treaties his Imperial Majesty has made with these

Paris, Fan. 19. The Discourse continues of the King's Journey in the Spring towards Lorrain and The Differences between the Inhabitants of Andage and those of Fonterabia are composed, and the Articles agreed on for that purpose have been published on both sides. The King has put a stop to the work of the River Eure, as well as to the Building at Versailles.

This day Henry Lord Des Westminster, Fan. 14. lamere was brought to his Tryal, before the Lord High Steward of England appointed for that purpose, upon an Indicament of High-Tresson, For Conspiring to raise a Rebellion against His Majesty, of which he was acquitted by his Peers. And it manifeffly appearing upon the Tryal that Thomas Saxon, who was a Witness against the said Lord Delamere, was Perjured, His Majesty has been pleased to give particular Directions that an Indictiment of Perjury beforthwith preferred against the faid Thomas Saxon.
