

# The London Gazette.

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*Nayles, Decemb. 18.*

**O**UR Viceroy has, in pursuance of the Orders he received from the Court of *Spain*, remitted 100000 Crowns to the Governor of *Milan*, to be employed towards the payment of the Forces of that State. The Officers appointed by the Republick of *Venice* to raise 2000 Men in this Kingdom, according to the leave they have obtained of th King of *Spain* for that purpose, have begun their Levies. Provisions and other Necessaries are sent to the New Fort in the Province of *Abruzzo*, by means whereof those Quarters will be secured against the Banditi, who have of late very much infested them.

*Lephorne, Decemb. 28.* The 26th Instant arrived here five *Dutch* Merchant Ships under the Convoy of a Man of War commanded by Vice-Admiral *Schey*, being bound for *Smirna*. The next day came into this Port a Ship of 50 Guns, and 150 Men, under the Command of the Marquis *de Fleury*, who hath armed her at his own charge to cruise against the *Turks*. We are told from *Florence*, that the Sieur *Meyer*, who has resided for some time at that Court on the part of the Elector of *Bavaria*, was preparing to take his leave in order to his return home.

*Turin, January 6.* The *Dutchess* of *Savoy* is pretty well again, her Feaver having left her. The 27th past, the young Princess was Christened with a great deal of Ceremony, being named *Mary Adelaide*. The 29th arrived here the Count *de Tonnerre* from the Court of *France*, to compliment their Royal Highnesses upon the Birth of the said Princess. They write from *Milan*, that the Count *de Melgar* has received Orders from *Madrid*, to make a further Reform of the Forces of the *Milaneze*, and that in order thereunto his Excellency has appointed a general Review about the middle of this Month.

*Venice, Jan. 5.* The Senate have made choice of Signior *Marco Pisani*, at present Proveditor Extraordinary of the Galeasses, to command their Ships in the place of Signior *Delfino*, who is designed for a more considerable Employment. Signior *Nicolo Lioni*, Proveditor Extraordinary of *Prevesa* being lately dead, the Captain General has given that Command to Signior *Paoli Nani*. A Vessel which arrived here this Week from the *Levant*, confirms the Account we had, that a *Turkish* Ship, carrying 40 Guns, and 300 Men, had been cast away in the Sea of *Baffo*; And the Master of the said Vessel likewise reports, that the *Turks* having

sent a Ship with Provisions to the *Morea*, under the Conduct of an Aga, the Seamen mutined, and having seized the said Aga, carried the Ship into some Port where they disposed of the Lading. The Governor of *Milan* has, we are told, given the Senate an account, that the Troops for which he has treated with the Republick, would in a very short time begin their march. The Forces which the Duke of *Hanouer* sends to the assistance of this State, are expected towards the end of the next Month at *Triepte*, where they are to embark. Signior *Cornaro* is preparing for his departure, being to succeed Signior *Pietro Valier*, as Proveditor General of *Dalmatia*, from whence we have an account, that the *Morlaques* have been hindered by the ill weather from the great Incurfion they intended to have made into the Province of *Bosnia*. The last Letters from *Coron* tell us, that the *Turks* have not appeared in that Neighborhood since the beginning of the last Month, being discouraged by the ill Success they have had in several Rencontres with the Parties of that Garrison. The Count *de St. Paul* has quitted the Command he had in the Service of this Republick, in which he is succeeded by the Marschal *Coningmarke*, who is expected here some time the next Month. The Duke of *Mantua* is gone home, but it's believed he will be here again in a very short time.

*Warsaw, Decemb 30.* The *Turks* shew how desirous they are of a Peace, by their Endeavors to procure it; They have made Proposals to all the Allies, but so, as that, by the Advantages they have proposed to each in particular, they might induce them to treat separately, but the Success has not answered their expectation; As for the Offers they have made to this Crown, they come by the hand of the *Polish* Resident at *Constantinople*, who has been kept there under a Guard ever since the beginning of this War. He has given the King an account, at the desire of the chief Ministers of the *Ottoman* Port, that the Grand Signior, to re-establish a firm Peace with this Crown, is willing to restore the whole *Ukraine*, and the Province of *Podolia*, except *Caminiec*, and to give besides a great Sum of Money for the charges of the War, but the King, far from hearkning to these Proposals, has sent directions to his said Minister to let the Grand Visier know, that he will not receive any Overtures of Peace, how advantageous soever they may be to him and the Crown of *Poland*, but what are made jointly to him and his Allies; And an Answer to the same effect has been given to the Envoy the Cham of *Tartary* sent to the King of *Poland* to offer his Mediation for a Peace. At the same time the preparations for a vigorous prosecution

cution of the War, are carried on with all the diligence and application imaginable. The Officers have positive Orders to have their respective Regiments compleat by the end of *April*. A great Train of Artillery is preparing, and Magazines are providing, towards the charge whereof the Pope's Nuncio has promised a considerable Sum of Money. The *Cossacks*, commanded by General *Mobilis*, are divided into several Bodies, to have an Eye upon the *Tartars*, but notwithstanding all the care that is taken to secure the Frontier Provinces, they have lately made a great Incurſion into *Russia*, advancing as far as *Lemburg*, and ravaging the Country for many Miles together, from whence they have carried a great number of People into Slavery. We are expecting with some impatience to hear of the arrival of the Ambassadors of this Crown at *Moscow*, where we have reason to believe they will be very well received, all the Advices we have of late had from that Court assuring us, that there is a great disposition to enter into a strict Alliance with this Crown.

*Vienna, Jan. 10.* The States of the *Lower Austria* are now assembled here; The 8th Instant the Chancellor of the Court demanded of them in the Name of the Emperor, who was there present, a Supply towards the supporting the great charge of the War, which he told them his Imperial Majesty was resolved to prosecute with all the Vigor possible; The said States have taken this matter into their deliberation, and it's not doubted but they will give a Supply proportionable to the present exigency of Affairs. The Imperial Troops in *Hungary* and *Croatia* are now very quiet in their Winter-quarters, and in all appearance will continue so, the last Letters from *Zolnocke* assuring us, that the *Turks* are under that fear, since their late defeat near *Arach*, that they dare not stir out of their Garisons; That of *Gyula* is said to be in a very ill condition, wanting both Provisions and Ammunition, which is the reason that General *Mercy* has sent hither to desire a reinforcement of 2000 Men, with which, and the Troops he has already under his Command, he seems confident of taking that place. General *Caraffa* has settled his Troops in the Quarters they have taken in *Transilvania*, and besides is treating with Prince *Abassii*, and the States of that Countrey, concerning the Contributions they are to pay in Money, and the Provisions and Forage they are to provide for the subsistence of the said Troops. The Ambassadors which that Prince is sending hither, are daily expected; It seems their Journey has been retarded, by the Indisposition of one of them, but we hear they are now on their way hither; in the mean time there are various Reports concerning the Errand they are sent upon, some saying it is only to solicit an Exemption of Winter-quarters, others, that they come to make Proposals of Peace, and others again, that they are to negotiate an Alliance with the Emperor. General *Starembergh* will, it's said, part from hence the next Month for *Croatia*, to give the necessary Orders on that side, the Emperor having appointed him to command his Forces there the next Campaigne. The Advices from *Turky* tell us, great preparations are made for the War, and that the *Turks* give out, they shall have much greater Armies in the Field this Summer than they had the last.

*Hamburg, Jan. 18.* The Letters from *Berlin* give an account, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has already named the principal Officers that are to command the 6000 Men with which he is to assist the Emperor, and that his Electoral Highness intends to send with them a good Train of Artillery; They will begin their march about the latter end of the next Month, and will be composed of 4000 Foot, and 2000 Horse and Dragoons. The *Lunenburg* Forces that served in *Hungary* the last Campaign, have taken their Winter-quarters in the Countreys of *Pinebourg* and *Tecklenbourg*, notwithstanding the opposition of the Inhabitants, who refused to receive them. The Count *de Noſtitz*, the Imperial Minister, is arrived at *Stockholm*; And we are told that there is a Treaty on foot between the Emperor and the King of *Sueden*. The Letters from *Zolkiew* tell us, that the King of *Poland* hath declared to the Pope's Nuncio at his Court, that he intends to be in the Field at the Head of his Army in the beginning of the Month of *May*.

*Hague, Jan. 20.* The Treaty of defensive Alliance, which, we are told, is renewed for twenty years, between the Crown of *Sueden* and this State, hath been sent to the several Provinces, in order to have their consent to the Ratification of it. The Heer *Van Odyke* will part from hence the next Week, to be present at the Assembly of the States of that Province, who are to meet the 26th of this Month. The Deputies of the Admiralties are gone home, after having had several Conferences with those of the *States General*.
