FUNERAL OF HER LATE MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY THE QUEEN DOWAGER.

HER late Most Excellent Majesty The QUEEN DOWAGER having desired that the Interment of Her Remains might take place in a most private manner, and without any State, the Queen was pleased to sanction a departure from the usual Ceremony observed in the Funerals of the Kings and Queens of the Realm; and the Earl Marshal having received the Royal Commands accordingly, the following limited Ceremonial was observed in conformity with Her late Majesty's express wishes:

On Thursday morning, the 13th instant, at eight o'clock, the Remains of Her late Most Excellent Majesty ADELAIDE The Queen Dowager were privately removed from Bentley Priory to Windsor; in the following Order:

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Senior Page, two Dressers, and Wardrobe Maid to Her late Majesty;

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Vice-Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household;

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Master of the Horse, the Lord Chamberlain, the Vice Chamberlain, and the Equerry to Her late Majesty;

Her late Majesty's Carriage, drawn by six horses, conveying Captain Taylor, Equerry to Her late Majesty, bearing Her late Majesty's Crown on a black velvet Cushion.

THE HEARSE

adorned with three Escocheons of Her late Majesty's Arms, and drawn by eight horses, each also adorned with the like Escocheons, escorted by a squadron of the 2nd Regiment of Life Guards, which, upon arriving at Uxbridge, was relieved by a squadron of the 1st Regiment of Life Guards.

On the arrival of the Body at Slough, the proceeding was joined by

Another Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, immediately following the Hearse, and conveying the Countess Brownlow, Lady in Waiting, the Honourable Miss Hudson, Maid of Honour, and Mrs. Cornwall, Woman of the Bedchamber in Waiting, to Her late Majesty;

The Carriage of The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, conveying Lord Marcus Hill (acting for and in the absence of the Earl Fortescue, Lord Steward of Her Majesty's Household); the Marquess of Breadalbane, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, and the Duke of Norfolk (Earl Marshal), Master of the Horse to Her Majesty;

Another Royal Carriage, conveying the Marchioness of Douro, Lady in Waiting, the Earl of Morley, Lord in Waiting, and John R. Ormsby Gore, Esq. Groom in Waiting to Her Majesty;

Another Royal Carriage, conveying the Honourable Amelia Murray, and the Honourable Flora Macdonald, Maids of Honour, Viscountess Forbes, Bedchamber Woman, and Lord Charles Fitzroy, Equerry in Waiting to Her Majesty;

After entering the Castle Gate, and approaching near the entrance to St. George's Chapel, the Royal Body was received by a Guard of Honour of the Grenadier Guards, and on reaching the South Porch of St. George's Chapel was removed from the Hearse, and received at the entrance by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Canons and Choir of Windsor, and being placed upon the Platform, the Crown and Cushion were laid upon the Coffin by Captain Taylor, who had carried the same. The Supporters of the Pall having taken their places, ten Sailors, appointed for that purpose by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Admiralty, under the command of Commander William Crispin, advanced to propel the Body to the Grave.

Upon entering the Choir, the Chief Mourner took her seat in a chair at the head of the Corpse, and the Lady in attendance on a stool on her left-hand side; the Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household took his place at the feet, and the Vice Chamberlain stood near his Lordship.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge, their Serene Highnesses Prince Edward of Saxe Weimar, and Prince Gustav of Saxe Weimar, and the other Persons following the Royal Remains stood, during the service, behind the Chief Mourner.

The Archbishop of Canterbury read the Service, and the part before the Interment, and the Anthem being performed, the Royal Body was deposited in the Vault, and the Service being concluded, Garter standing near the Grave pronounced the Style of Her late Majesty, as follows:

“ Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy
“ the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Princess ADELAIDE The QUEEN
“ DOWAGER, Relict of His Majesty KING WILLIAM THE FOURTH, Uncle to Her Most
“ Excellent Majesty VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain
“ and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, whom God bless and preserve with long life,
“ health, and honour, and all worldly happiness.”

The Lord Chamberlain and the Vice Chamberlain of Her late Majesty's Household then advanced from their places to the grave, broke their staves, and kneeling deposited them upon the Royal Coffin.

His Royal Highness The Prince Albert was present in His Royal Highness's Stall; and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge occupied His Stall.

There were present in the Royal Closet on this melancholy occasion, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, attended by Lady Fanny Howard, and Colonel Sir George Couper, Bart. C.B. K.H.; Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cambridge, attended by Lady Augusta Cadogan; Her Serene Highness the Duchess of Saxe Weimar, attended by the Countess Howe; Their Serene Highnesses the Princess Anne of Saxe Weimar and the Princess Amelie of Saxe Weimar.
