Genoua, Fanuary 12. HE 10th inftant arrived here the Marquis de Marini from the Lourt of Erance; where he hath Relided fome time in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick. Madrid, fan. 17. The Count de Fuënfalida will part from hease very fud pry, to take possible of the Government of Mislan, though we do not yet hear that the Count de Melgar, has accepted of the Embassy to Rome. We have an account by an Express from Cadiz, that a Veffel was arrived there from the West Indies, with ad, ice, that the Galeons were lading with great dilig-nce, and that they may be expected at Cadiz before Mid'ummer.

Legborne, Fan 2. The Mafter of a French Ship arrived in this Port in 21 days from Alexandris, reports, that before his departure, three Turkifb Men of War and three Merchant Ships laden with Provisions, failed from thence for Conflaminople; And that about the fame time four other Turkish Ships arrived there, to lade Corn for the Morea. He confirms what we have heard from other Parts, concerning the great diforders which the Plague, the fearcity of Provisions, and the Mutinies of the Fanifaries do occasion at Constantinople, and in divers Provinces of the Othoman Empire. It is confirmed that Signior Delfino has made himfelf Malter of the Callle of Girapetra on the Coalt of Gandia, molt of the Turks that defended it, who were about 300, being flain, and the reft taken Prifoners. They write from Coron, that 2800 Turks having lately appeared in their Neighborhood, to hinder the In-Labitants from gathering their Olives, the Greeks immediately allembled together, and obliged them, to retire, after having killed above 100 of them, and taken divers Priloners.

Warfam, Fan. 5. The Popes Nuncio has employed the 300000 Floring that, were lately remitted to him from Rome, towards the carrying on the preparations for the Campagne, and has affured bis Majefly that the Pope will farth r affift him with confiderable fupplies. The Europy from the Cham of Tautar, who came to offer his Maffere Cham of Fartary, who came to offer his Mafters Mediation, and at the fame time to make Propofals of Peace, is gone back with this answer, as we told you in our last, That the King will not heatken to any Overtures of Peace, how advantageous foever they may be to him and his Kingdom, unlas they are made jointly to all the Allies. And on this occasion his Majefty has given fresh aflurances to the Imperial Minuster at this Court, that he will Religiously observe the League he is engaged in with the Emperor and the Republick of Venice. At the Meeting of the General Offi-cers at Lemburgh in November 1aft, it was refol-ved for the better, lubilit ace of the Forces of the Crowa to alligh them Quarters in the feveral Palatinates of this Ki gdom, and the diffri-bution of them was made accordingly, but this refolution his been fince altered, and the faid Troops are ordered to winter in the Frontier Troops are ordered to winter in the Frontier Provinces, as well as to fecure them against the Incursions of the Turtars, as to fave the time and trouble of their marching to and fro; but those Palatinates which by this means are freed from Winter-quarters, are in lied thereof to give a fum of money, which will be distributed a-mong the Troops. Letters from Gfar, and other places, confirm the account we had, that the Turkish Garifous in Buds, Agris, and Casija, do fuffer very much, tifough the want of Provisions We are told that a Detachement hath been fenf from flis ficit of thefe places, to guard a Convoy of Money and Provisions that was coming from Effecke, and that a Party of Huffars having notice of it, had laid an Ambush for them, of which we do not yet know the Succels. The Imperial Garifon of Kefsel, within the Territory of Fefprin, hath lately tut off a Party of Turks belonging to Canifs; And the Imperialifis of Salavar have defeated another Party of the lame Garifon. They write from Hungery, that Count Caraffa was marching with 3000 Men, to reinforce the Troops that block up Monsgatz, and that they would formally attack that For-trefs (which we are allured is not in a condition to make any long refiftance) to foon as the weather would fuffer them to bring their Cannon and Morta 3 against it. The Ecclesiafticks of the Heredicary Countries continue to fend hither their Contribettions for the War, which Cardinal Bonviff the Pope's Nuncio docs dispose of according to the Orders he has received from his Holincis. The Marquis de Corbon has obtained leave to raife Recruits for his Regiment in the Service of the Republick of Venice; Thole that are making for the Imperial Regiments advance as we are informed very fuccessfully, fo that it's not doubted but the Officers will have finished them within the time limited. The Marquis de Basson piere Lieutenant Colonel to the Baron de Mercy, is still here; He was sent by that General to give the Emperor a particular account of the late defeat of the Turks near Arach, in which Action the Hungarians behaved themfelves fo well, that the Emperor has refolved to form them intoRegiments, and to give them the fame Pay as to the reft of his Forces. The Electoral Prince Palatine has put off

his Journey for a Fortnight or three Weeks. Cologne, Jan. 26. The Imperial Sub-Commillioners have examined the informations againft feveral of the late Magistrates of this City, who its believed will be obliged to give an account of divers sums of money they received during their administration. The Deans of several Companics are summoned to appear before the faid Commillioners, being accused of having fomented the late diford rs. The three Prisoners are not yet removed from Dufeldorp to Mulbeim. The Prince de Croy General of the Imperial Artillery is so well recovered, that he is preparing to continue his Journey for Bruffe's; but the Prince de Maurbach continues very ill.

Hamburgh, Fan. 21. The Lettersfrom Berlin of the 19th inftant inform us, that the 8000 Men which the Elector of Brandenburgh is to fend to the Emperors affiftance, will begin their n a ch towards the latter end of the next month under the Command of Major General Schoning with a very good Train of Artillery; And that his E-lectoral Highnels has in the flead of these Troops refolved to raife eight new Regiments, four of Foot, three of Horfe, and Oue lof Dragoons, Thefe Letters tell us farther, that his Electoral Highnels intends to fend fome Troops towards the Country of Cleves to reinforce his Garilons on that fide. They write from, Copenbagen of the 16th infant, that an Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of Brandenburgh, and that he had had feveral conferences with the Miniflers of that Court concerning the prefent juncture of affairs. That the King of Denmark intends to take a Journy towards Holfein in the Spring, where

its believed he will plate part of the Summer, And that the Count de Cheverney Amballador from France was arrived at Copenhagen, and was preparing for his publick Entry. The Principal Officers who Command d the Lunenburgh Forces that ferved in Hungary the laft Summer, are come to Zell, and Hanouer having left their Troops in their Winter-quarters. We are told from Stockbolm, that an Alliance is treating between the Emperor and the King of Sueden.

Hague, Febr. 1. The Heer Van Dieft Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, has fince his late return from Cleves been leveral times in Conference with the Deputies of this State. The States of Holland are adjourned for a forthight. The Heer Van Citters is preparing for his return to England, to refide there on the part of this State.
