Letter's from Gfar, and other places, confirm the account we had, that the Turkish Garisons in Buds, Agris, and Carija, do luffer very much, tifough the want of Provisions We are told that a Detachement hath been fenf from flic ficil of these places, to guard a Convoy of Money and Provisions that was coming from Effecke, and that a Party of Huffars having notice of it, had laid an Ambush for them, of which we do not yet know the Success. The Imperial Garison of Kefsel, within the Territory of Fefrin, hath lately tut off a Party of Turks belonging to Canifa; And the Imperialists of Salavar have descated another Party of the same Garison. They write from Hungary, that Count Caraffa was marching with 3000 Men, to reinforce the Troops that block up Monsgatz, and that they would formally attack that For-tress (which we are assured is not in a condition to make any long refillance) to foon as the weather would fuffer them to bring their Cannon and Morta 3 against it. The Ecclesiasticks of the Heredirary Countries continue to fend hither their Contributions for the War, which Cardinal Bowiff the Pope's Muncio does dispose of according to the Orders he has received from his Holincis. The Marquis de Corbon has obtained leave to raise Recruits for his Regiment in the Service of the Republick of Venice; Those that are making for the Imperial Regiments advance as we are informed very successfully, so that it's not doubted but the Officers will have finished them within the time limited. The Marquis de Bassom-piere Lieutenant Colonel to the Baron de Mercy, is still here; He was sent by that General to give the Emperor a particular account of the late defeat of the Turks near Arach, in which Action the Hungarians behaved themselves so well, that the Emperor has resolved to form them into Regiments, and to give them the same Pay as to the rest of his Forces. The Electoral Prince Palatine has put off his Journey for a Fortnight or three Weeks.

The Letters from Berlin of the 19th instant inform us, that the 8000 Men which the Elector of Brandenburgh is to fend to the Emperors assistance, will begin their n a ch towards the latter end of the next month under the Command of Major General Schoning with a very good Train of Artillery; And that his E-lectoral Highness has in the stead of these Troops resolved to raise eight new Regiments, four of Foot, three of Horse, and one of Dragoons, These Letters tell us farther, that his Electoral Highness intends to fend some Troops towards the Country of Cleves to reinforce his Garisons on that fide. They write from, Copenbagen of the 16th instant, that an Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of Brandenburgh, and that he had had several conferences with the Ministers of that Court concerning the present juncture of affairs. That the King of Denmark intends to take a Journy towards Ho fein in the Spring, where

its believed he will pass part of the Summer; And that the Count de Cheverney Ambassador from France was arrived at Copenhagen, and was preparing for his publick Entry. The Principal Officers who Commanded the Lunenburgh Forces that ferved in Hungary the last Summer, are come to Zell, and Hungary thaving lest their Troops in their Winter-quarters. We are told from Stock. bolm, that an Alliance is treating between the Emperor and the King of Sueden.
