

Letters from *Stettin*, and other places, confirm the account we had, that the *Turkish* Garrisons in *Buda*, *Agriz*, and *Casija*, do suffer very much, through the want of Provisions. We are told that a Detachment hath been sent from the first of these places, to guard a Convoy of Money and Provisions that was coming from *Essecke*, and that a Party of *Hussars* having notice of it, had laid an Ambush for them, of which we do not yet know the Success. The Imperial Garrison of *Kesfel*, within the Territory of *Vesprin*, hath lately cut off a Party of *Turks* belonging to *Canis*; And the *Imperialists* of *Salavay* have defeated another Party of the same Garrison. They write from *Hungary*, that Count *Carassa* was marching with 3000 Men, to reinforce the Troops that block up *Montgratz*, and that they would formally attack that Fortress (which we are assured is not in a condition to make any long resistance) so soon as the weather would suffer them to bring their Cannon and Mortars against it. The Ecclesiasticks of the Hereditary Countries continue to send hither their Contributions for the War, which Cardinal *Bonvisi* the Pope's Nuncio does dispose of according to the Orders he has received from his Holiness. The Marquis *de Carbon* has obtained leave to raise Recruits for his Regiment in the Service of the Republick of *Venice*; Those that are making for the Imperial Regiments advance as we are informed very successfully, so that it's not doubted but the Officers will have finished them within the time limited. The Marquis *de Bassompierre* Lieutenant Colonel to the Baron *de Mercy*, is still here; He was sent by that General to give the Emperor a particular account of the late defeat of the *Turks* near *Arach*, in which Action the *Hungarians* behaved themselves so well, that the Emperor has resolved to form them into Regiments, and to give them the same Pay as to the rest of his Forces. The Electoral Prince Palatine has put off his Journey for a Fortnight or three Weeks.

*Cologne*, Jan. 26. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners have examined the informations against several of the late Magistrates of this City, who its believed will be obliged to give an account of divers sums of money they received during their administration. The Deans of several Companies are summoned to appear before the said Commissioners, being accused of having fomented the late disorders. The three Prisoners are not yet removed from *Duiseldorp* to *Mulheim*. The Prince *de Crov* General of the Imperial Artillery is so well recovered, that he is preparing to continue his Journey for *Brussels*; but the Prince *de Mourbach* continues very ill.

*Hamburg*, Jan. 21. The Letters from *Berlin* of the 19th instant inform us, that the 8000 Men which the Elector of *Brandenburg* is to send to the Emperors assistance, will begin their march towards the latter end of the next month under the Command of Major General *Schoning* with a very good Train of Artillery; And that his Electoral Highness has in the stead of these Troops resolved to raise eight new Regiments, four of Foot, three of Horse, and one of Dragoons. These Letters tell us farther, that his Electoral Highness intends to send some Troops towards the Country of *Cleves* to reinforce his Garrisons on that side. They write from *Copenhagen* of the 16th instant, that an Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and that he had had several conferences with the Ministers of that Court concerning the present juncture of affairs. That the King of *Denmark* intends to take a Journey towards *Holslein* in the Spring, where

its believed he will pass part of the Summer. And that the Count *de Cheverny* Ambassador from *France* was arrived at *Copenhagen*, and was preparing for his publick Entry. The Principal Officers who Commanded the *Lunenburgh* Forces that served in *Hungary* the last Summer, are come to *Zell*, and *Hannover* having left their Troops in their Winter-quarters. We are told from *Stockholm*, that an Alliance is treating between the Emperor and the King of *Sweden*.

*Hague*, Febr. 1. The Heer Van *Diest* Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has since his late return from *Cleves* been several times in Conference with the Deputies of this State. The States of *Holland* are adjourned for a fortnight. The Heer Van *Cisters* is preparing for his return to *England*, to reside there on the part of this State.

*Portsmouth*, Jan. 28. Yesterday Sailed from *Spirithead*, His Majesties Ship the *Happy Return* having on board Sir *William Soame*, His Majesties Ambassador to the Grand Signior. The same day came into Harbor the *Rose* Frigate from the Downs.
