It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court until half-past one o'clock.

third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making additional provision for the cure of souls in the parishes of Heighington and Staindrop, in the county and diocese of Durham:

"Whereas, under the provisions of the said Act, we are empowered out of the lands, tithes and hereditaments thereby vested in us, or by an actual conveyance thereof, if it shall be deemed more expedient, to make additional provision for the cure of souls in parishes in which such assistance is most required: provided that in making any such additional provision out of tithes, or lands, or hereditaments allotted in lieu of tithes, and so vested in us, due consideration shall be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes arise or have arisen.

"And whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty, the township of Killerby, in the said parish of Heighington, was separated from the same parish and united to the chapelry district of Ingleton, in the parish of Staindrop, in the said county and diocese of Durham, and so much and such of the tithe rent charges belonging to the vicarage of Heighington, as arise and accrue within the townships of Killerby and Walworth, in the said parish of Heighington, were transferred to the said district chapelry of Ingleton for ever, whereby a diminution in the annual value of the said vicarage of Heighington, by the several sums of twenty pounds, being the tithe rent charge for the said township of Killerby, and thirty-one pounds being the tithe rent charge for the said township of Walworth, has been occasioned, and the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Durham, the patrons of the said vicarage, and the Reverend Wilson

Beckett, Clerk, the incumbent of the same, made it a condition in giving their consent to such arrangement that we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council, that additional provision for the cure of souls in the said parish of Heighington should be made in manner herein-after mentioned :

" And whereas, under the provisions of the first-mentioned Act, the rent charge payable in respect of the rectorial tithes, of the township of Redworth, in the said parish of Heighington, being of the annual value of fifty-four pounds ten shillings, is now vested in us.

" We therefore humbly recommend and propose that all our estate and interest in all that the yearly rent charge or sum of fifty-four pounds ten shillings, lately belonging to the second canonry in the cathedral church of Durham, awarded to the Right Reverend John Bird Bishop of Chester, the then holder of such canonry, and his successors, in lieu of the rectorial tithes arising or growing within the township of Redworth, in the parish of Heighington, in the county of Durham, and apportioned upon the lands lying within the said township, shall forthwith, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, become and be vested in the said Wilson Beckett, Clerk, Vicar of Heighington aforesaid, and his successors, Vicars of Heighington, for ever.

" And we further recommend and propose that the half yearly amount, receivable by us on the first day of January last, in respect of the said last-mentioned rent charge, shall be accounted for by us to the said Wilson Beckett, his executors, administrators, and assigns.

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the prebendary of Stratford, otherwise Stratford-sub-Castle, in the cathedral church of Salisbury, for the property belonging to his prebend.

" Whereas, by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said prebend will (excepting any right of patronage), upon the first avoidance of the said prebend, become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

" And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the hand of any prebendary of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such prebendary, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes or other hereditaments:

" And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend William Short, Master of Arts, the present prebendary of the said prebend, that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

" We therefore, with the consent of the said William Short, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of such gazetting, all lands, tithes and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of patronage) now belonging to the said prebend of Stratford, otherwise Stratford-sub-Castle, as aforesaid, or to or in which he has or ought to have any estate, right, title or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title and interest therein (except as aforesaid), be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said William Short to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration

of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said William Short so long as he shall continue to be the prebendary of the same prebend, and no longer, the annual sum of sixty-eight pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the fifth day of February and the fifth day of August, and that the first such half-yearly payment shall be made on the fifth day of August next; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease, of the said lands, tithes or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall, since the twenty-first day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, have been or shall be granted or made by the said William Short, or any of his predecessors, prebendaries of the said prebend; and that if the next avoidance of the said prebend shall happen on any other day than one of the said two half-yearly days of payment, then a proportionate sum only shall be paid to the said William Short, or his representatives:

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,” or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in the words following; viz.:

“Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Saint Michael, near Saint Albans, in the county of Hertford, and of Abbots Langley and Hemel Hempstead, in the same county, all being situate in the diocese of Rochester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said three parishes and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Leverstock

Green, in the said parish of Saint Michael, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled ‘An Act for the further amendment of ‘the Church Building Acts,’ or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the ‘Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Leverstock ‘Green,’ with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned;

“The consolidated chapelry of Leverstock Green commences in the centre of the Saint Albans-road, opposite Hardy Field, and proceeds easterly as far as Leverstock Green, keeping the centre of the Green as far as Wood-lane End; thence continues easterly up the centre of Pest-house-lane to Woodwells, then northerly up Bunce-lane to the boundary of Hemel Hempstead parish; then easterly, keeping the lane (which is the boundary of the said parish) as far as the lane leading to Bottom House Farm, still keeping the centre of the lane straight on by Megdell Farm, as far as the eastern fence of a field in the said parish of Saint Michael, marked No. 357 (a), on the tithe apportionment map of such last-named parish; then follows the said fence to field No. 360 on the same map, keeping the eastern fence of the same to field No. 362 on the same map (of which last-mentioned field, about half the northern side forms part of the boundary of the said proposed consolidated chapelry of Leverstock Green); then keeping the eastern fence of the said field, No. 362, as far as the palings of the western side of Gorhambury Park, and following the same palings down to the centre of the Hill End-lane as far as the beech-tree; then keeping the lane leading to Potter's Crouch as far as the south-east corner of the field No. 149, on the said map; then turning south-westerly, taking the southern fence of the said field, No. 149, down to the wood marked on the said map No. 162, keeping the southern fence of the said wood for about sixty yards; then along the eastern fence of the Spinney, No. 163, on the said map (about thirty yards); then following the southern fence of No. 163 down to the elbow of Pimlico-lane; then down such lane, crossing the boundary of the parish of Abbots Langley to the end of the said lane, where it meets the road leading from Bedmont to Leverstock Green, keeping in the middle of the said road towards Leverstock Green, meeting and following the boundary of the said parish of Abbots Langley to High Wood Hall-lane, turning south-westerly and following High Wood Hall-lane down to Nash Mills, and from the centre of the bottom of the said lane proceeds in a direction due west to a stone placed as a boundary mark at the edge of the stream, forming the Mill-head to Nash Mills, to the centre of the said stream, and thence to the centre of the Grand Junction Canal, which is the boundary of the said parish of Abbots Langley; then following such boundary to the boundary of the Box Moor district, in the said parish of Hemel Hempstead; then following the boundary of such last-named parish north-easterly up to the Tile Kiln Farm; then in a north-westerly direction along the fence of an enclosure, marked No. 1221 on the tithe commutation map, of the said parish of Hemel Hempstead; thence along the north-western sides of the enclosures severally marked on such map Nos. 1223, 1226, 1225, 1214, to the Bennets End-lane; then up such lane to No. 1213 on the said map, keeping the north-western side

of No. 1213, and of Bennets End Farm-house, and also of Nos. 1211 and 1245, to the Crab-tree-lane; then up such lane to No. 1510, and along the north-western side thereof, and also of No. 1511, and part of No. 1512, as far as Hardy Field, No. 1474; then along the south and west sides thereof, to the centre of the road opposite to Hardy Field, where the proposed consolidated chapelry or Leverstock Green commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, green, and pink:

"That the consents of the Right Reverend George Lord Bishop of Rochester (as the Bishop of the said diocese), of the Right Honourable James Walter Earl of Verulam (as the patron of the parish church of the said parish of Saint Michael), of the Reverend Richard Gee, of Abbots Langley aforesaid, Clerk (as the patron of the parish church of the said parish of Abbots Langley), and of the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Lincoln (as the patron, in right of his see, of the parish church of the said parish of Hemel Hempstead), have been severally obtained to the formation of the hereinbefore-proposed consolidated chapelry of Leverstock Green, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof the said George Lord Bishop of Rochester, James Walter Earl of Verulam, Richard Gee, and John Lord Bishop of Lincoln, have signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it has been mutually agreed between the said James Walter Earl of Verulam, Richard Gee, and John Lord Bishop of Lincoln (as such respective patrons as aforesaid), testified as aforesaid, with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said George Lord Bishop of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Leverstock Green aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said James Walter Earl of Verulam, his heirs and assigns for ever:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation of a consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent, or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

Whereas by the "Nuisances' Removal and Diseases' Prevention Act, 1848," it was enacted, that when any part of the United Kingdom should appear to be threatened by any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord

President of the Council or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), might by Order or Orders to be by them made, direct that the provisions contained in the said Act for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, be put in force in Great Britain, and that every such order should be in force for six calendar months, or for such shorter period as in such Order should be expressed;

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, being one, bearing date the 28th day of September 1848, the said provisions of the said recited Act were directed to be put in force throughout the whole of Great Britain for a period of six calendar months thence next ensuing; and whereas by another Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Most Honourable the Lord President of the said Council being one, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, the said recited Order of the 28th day of September 1848 was renewed for a period of six calendar months from the date of the said last-mentioned Order; and whereas by another Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Most Honourable the Lord President of the said Council being one, bearing date the 25th day of September 1849, the said first-mentioned Order was renewed for a further period of six calendar months from the said 25th day of September 1849, which said last-mentioned Order is now in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; and whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the thirteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Nuisances' Removal and Diseases' Prevention Act, 1848," it was enacted, that it should be lawful for the General Board of Health to cause inquiry to be made by a superintending inspector, or by such other ways and means as the General Board of Health might deem fit to direct, into the state of the burial grounds in any part of England or Wales excepted from the powers of the Public Health Act, 1848, or in any populous city, town, or place, in England or Wales to which for the time being the said Act had not been applied, and if it appeared to the General Board of Health that any such burial ground was in such a state as to be dangerous to the health of the persons living in the neighbourhood thereof, it should be lawful for the said General Board of Health in England and Wales, under the seal of the said Board, and under the hands of two or more members thereof, to issue such orders as the said Board might think fit, for the application of such disinfecting substances, and for the adoption of such other measures of precaution in relation to the premises as might, in the opinion of the said Board, tend to lessen or remove the danger to health; and whereas after the issuing of the said above-recited Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and whilst the same have continued in force, the General Board of Health have caused inquiry to be made by Robert Rawlinson, Esq. a superintending inspector to the said Board, into the state of a certain burial ground forming the churchyard belonging to the parish church of Penrith, in the county of Cumberland, being a part of England to which the Public Health Act, 1848, has not been applied; and whereas it now appears to us, the said General Board of Health, upon the report of the said Robert Rawlinson, upon and after the inquiry made by him as aforesaid, that the said burial ground is in such a state as to be dangerous to

the health of the persons living in the neighbourhood thereof; now We, the said General Board of Health, being of opinion that the adoption of the measures of precaution herein-after specified would tend to lessen the aforesaid danger to health, do hereby, in exercise of the power vested in us by the above-recited Acts, order and direct you, the Churchwardens of the said parish, and all other persons (if any there be) having the care and control of the said burial ground, to do and cause to be done the following works and matters in and in relation to the said burial ground, and the mode of interment therein; that is to say:

1. That not more than one corpse shall be buried or deposited in any grave in the said churchyard, and every grave in which any corpse shall be buried or deposited shall be filled up to the level of the ordinary surface of the said burial ground immediately upon the corpse being buried or deposited therein, and no further burial shall take place in the same grave, nor shall any other corpse be deposited therein.

2. That no corpse shall be buried or deposited in any grave in the said burial ground at a less distance than two feet and six inches from any other grave, such distance to be computed from that part of the coffin containing such corpse which is nearest to such other grave.

3. That no corpse shall be buried or deposited in any grave in the said burial ground in which after the burial or deposit thereof there shall not be at least five feet of earth remaining between the ordinary surface of the said burial ground and the upper part of the coffin in which such corpse shall be contained.

4. Provided always, that the foregoing directions and regulations, which are respectively numbered 1, 2, and 3, shall not apply to burials in stone or brick graves, vaults, or catacombs.

5. That no corpse shall be deposited in any stone or brick grave, vault, or catacomb, in the said burial ground, or in any vault or receptacle connected therewith unless such corpse shall be enclosed in a coffin made of, or lined with lead of the weight of at least six pounds to every superficial square foot, and of the thickness throughout of one-tenth of an inch, nor unless such coffin or lining be soldered up, or otherwise secured so as to be perfectly air-tight.

6. That no grave shall be made or dug, nor shall the ground, for any purpose or upon any pretence, be opened in any part of the said burial ground where a corpse has been buried or deposited within ten years now last past.

And we do further order and direct that this Order shall take effect on the day of the date hereof, and the works and matters above specified shall continue to be done, acted upon, and executed by you, the said Churchwardens and other persons (if any) until further or other Order be made in relation to the premises.
