## Naple's, Fanuary 1.

HE Squadron of Gallies commanded by the Duke of Turfs is still here, but 10 foon as they have got their Provisions on Boltd, will fail for Gaets, where they are to winter. Two Dutch Merchant Ships are expected here from Legborne., being hired to transport fome Troops to Sardinia. Our Viceroy has given Orders for the hiring two Velfels more, which are to carry 500 Men from hence to Offend, to recruit the Neapolitan Regiment in the Service of the Spanifh Netherlands, under the Command of the Marquis de Torrecufa. Three Companies of Foot, and a Troop of Horfe have been lent to the new Fort in the Province of Abruzzo, wh re they are to remain in Garifon, to hinder the Incurfions of the Banditi.

Legborne, Fun. 9. We have an account by a Veffel arrived in this Port in three Weeks from Argiers, that Ten Ships belonging to that Government were returned from the Levant, where they had ferred in the Grand Signior's Fleet, but that one of them was caft away in the Road of Argiers, and most of her Men lost. By another Veffel come from Tunia, we are informed that the two Brothers Mehemet and Solyman Beys, have been lately reinforced with feveral thouland Men from Argiers, but that the Dey of Tunia continues to make a very vigorons defence, and to reject all Propofals of an Accommodation.

Venice, fan. 19. We have advice that the great Convoy, commanded by Signior Gioleppo Morolini, is fafely arrived at Corfon, after having palled through a great deal of bad weather ; And that the Captain General hath prefented the Officer, who fo bravely behaved himfelf against the Conspirators, with a Gold Chain and Medal, and hath befides given him the Command of a Ship of confiderable Force. By a Veffel arrived from Spalatro, we are informed that Signior Vallier, Proveditor General of Dalmatia, had, with a Body of Morlagues, plundered and burnt the Suburbs of Majco, after having obliged the Turks that were quartered there, to retire into the Caffle. That another Party of Morlaques had made an Incurfion rowards Narenta, and burnt feveral Villages; That in their Return they were attacked by the Garifon of Altfbergh, but the Morlaques defended themfelves fo well, that many of the Turks were killed, and the

reft forced to retire in great diforder. Vienna, Jan. 21. The Letters from Upper Hungary give an account of the great Conffernation the Turks are in, occasioned by their late Defeat near Arach; That they have abandoned feveral small Forts and Caffles about Temesmaer and Gyula; And that the chief Inhabitants of thefe and other neighbouring places, not thinking themfelves fecure there, were retired with their beft Goods to Belgrade. The report of the Serafquier's having been strangled at Belgrade, is contradicted by the last Advices from thoic Parts, which fay it

was the Baffa who commanded the Ottoman Forces near Effecke the last Summer, when that place was taken and burnt by the Imperialifis, that was lately firangled by Order of the Grand Signior ; That the Serasquier Ibrahim is indeed in dilgrace, and deprived of his Command, for not having relieved Newbeusel, but that his Life is spared, in confideration of his good Service in preferving Bu-da the year before. The Vilier of Buda is, it's faid, to fucceed him in that Command; An I Achmet Baffa is madeViher of Buda.Major General Waflis who was fent with a Detachment to view Great Waradin, reports that the place is fortified with a frong Wall, and a deep wet Ditch: That the Cafile is built after the Hungarian manner ; And that the Garifon is composed of about 4000 Men. The Emperor, we are told, has refolved to raile four new Regiments of Foot, each of 1000 Mcn.

Vienna, Jan. 14. The Emperor has received an account by an Express which arrived here oh Tuesday last from the Velt Mareschal Caprara, that the Baron de Mercy and Major General Heusler having refolved to attack Segedin, as well to fecure their Quarters on that fide, as to deprive the Encmy of the paffage they had there over the River Their, they drew together the Hungarians commanded by Peterbafi, and the Imperial Troops quartered about Zolwocke; General Heufler marched with the Horfe, while the Foot palfed down the River in finall Boats ; And being advanced near that place, was informed that 3000 Turks were marching thither with a great Convoy of Money and Provisions, which they had brought from Transilvania, and had Orders to conduct to Buda; whereupon he fent a Party of Light Horfe to amule the Enemy with Skirmishes, till he could join them with the reft of his Troops, which having done foon after, there enfued a very bloody Pight, the Turks defended themfelves with great Courage and Re-folution, and rallied feveral times when they were fallen into diforder, but, God continuing to blefs the Christian Arms; they were at fast totally defeated, most of them being flain, and the rest taken Prilbners; Of the Imperialifs and Hungarians above 1500 were killed, among whom General Heufler was found mortally wounded. After the Fight, the Impertalists advanced towards Segedin, the Hotfe by Land, and the Foot by Water; the Garilon being weakned by a Detachement they had fent out to meet the faid Convoy, and being full of fear upon the defeat of their Troops; made no great reliftance, fo that the Imperialities became with little difficulty Masters of that place, and be-fides posselled themselves of the Caliles of Peffered and Bachaz. Of which happy Success we are expecting a more particular Relation by an Express from General de Mercy. Agria will be now very much flraitned; And we have advice that things are there already in much diforder, the Garifon having mutined, and cut in pieces fome of the Officers who had the charge of the Provisions, for that they

they threatned the Baffa, who endeavoured to appeale them, with a like Treatment.

Cologne, Fan. 27. The Imperial Sub-Commiffioners intend to go the next week to Dufelderpe once more to examine the three Prifoners, who, it's blieved, will after that be removed to Mulbeim. Two days ago was found in feveral places of this City, a very leandalous Libel against the faid Commiffioners, which has been burnt by the hands of the Common Executioner, and the Magiltrates have offered a Reward of 1000 Growns to any perfon that shall difcover the Author of it. The States of the Circle of Franconia which are alfembled at Nuremberg, have written a circular Letter to the Elector of Bavaria, to the Directors of the Circles of Suabia and the Upper Rhine, to the Dukes of Jaze Weymar and Saze Gotha, and to the States of Westerwaldt, wherein, after having reprefented the dangers to which the Empire has been for many years exposed, especially on the fide of the Turks, they fhew that the late Victories obtained against the Outomans, though very great and fignal, have not however fo fecured the Empire on that fide, as that the means to oppose the new Efforts which the Turks may make to repair their unhappy Succeffes during the late Campagnes in Hungary, ought to be neglected. And that feeing the Point of the Publick Security, which has lay'n to long before the Dyet at Raif bonne, is not yet concluded; That even the Articles of the late Treaty of Truce between the Empire and the Crown of France, about fetling the Limits, are not yet executed, and that this Delay may prove very prejudicial to the Peace of the Empire, they think it necessary to renew the Treatics of Union and Defence that are ready to expire, for the fedurity of the States that shall enter into the fame, purluant to the Conffitutions of the Empire. They propose the City of Nuremberg as a convenient place for the Conferences to be held on this Subject; And have refolved to confer with the Minifters of the Emperor, and the Princes and States of the Empire, about framing fuch a Project of Union in the interim till the Dyct at Rativbonne shall take a Resolution concerning the execution of the Treaty of Truce, and the other Points that concern the Publick Security.

Hamburgh, Fan. 27. They write from Berlin, that the 8000 Men which the Elector of Brandenburgh fends to the Emperor's affiftance, will begin their match about the middle of the next Month; but we hear nothing farther of his Electoral Highneffes giving out Commissions for the raising any new Regiments. The Letters from Cracow, of the 6th Inflant, tell us, that the King of Poland hath appointed the general Rendezvous of the Forces of the Crown to be on the 12th of May; That g eat Preparations are making in the mean time for the War; And that the King has refolved to raife 6000 Men, befides the Troops which the Palatins and other great Men have undertaken to raife at their own charge. They write from Stetin, that the Marcieral de Coningfmarke parted from thence the 16th of this Month for Venice, from whence

the will pass to the Morea, to command the Forces of that Republick. Hague, Febr. 5. The Heer Van Odyke parted from hence the 3d Inftant for Zealand, to be pre-lent at the meeting of the States of that Pro-vince; And we are told that Deputies will be fent thither this week from the States General. The Letters from Vienna of the 24th past, give an ac-count of another Victory which the Imperialists have lately obtained against the Turks, the Particu-Date of the States of

they had retrenched their Allowance, and that ] lars they tell us, are, That Gene al Mercy having advice that the Turks were conducting a Convoy of 100 Wagons laden with Money and Ammunition from Transilvania to Buda, alfembled the Imperial Troops quartered at and about Zolmocke, and the Hungarians under the Orders of General Pcterbafe, who making a Body of between 4 and 5000 Men, commanded by Major General Heufler, and the faid Peterbasi, advanced towards Segedin, a small Town on the Their, where the said Convoy was to pais that River ; being come near that place, General Heusler sent out a Detachement of Light Horfe, who discovered the faid Convoy marching to Segedin under a Guard of 3000 Turks, with whom they skirmifhed, and entertained them fo long, till the reft of the Imperial Troops came up; The Turks made a very obstinate desence, but after a very bloody Fight, most of them being flain, the Chriffians remained Mafters of the Field, and of the faid Convoy; Segedin was afterwards taken with little opposition, as like-wile the Callles of *Peffered* and *Bachaz*. It's faid that of the Imperialis there were near 2000 killed in this Action, General Heufler being of that number, which had leffened the joy of this great Succefs, his lofs being greatly regretted as well by the Hungarians as the Imperialist.
