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Madrid, January 18.

THE Government of *Sardinia*, vacant by the removal of the Count de *Fuenfalida* to that of *Milan*, is not yet disposed of. The 10th Instant was performed the Ceremony of giving the *Golden Fleece* to Count *Mansfelt*, the Emperor's Ambassador at this Court, at which all the Knights of that Order, which were here, assisted. The King has ratified the Treaty the Count de *Melgar*, Governour of the *Milaneze*, hath lately concluded, with the State of *Venice* for 3000 Men, which are to be sent to the assistance of that Republick. By a Vessel arrived at *Cadix* from the *West-Indies*, we have Advice, that the Gallions would be ready to sail from *Cartagena* in the beginning of *March*, and that their Lading would amount to 20000 Millions in Silver, besides Merchandizes; And that most of the Pyrats who went into the South were destroyed. The extraordinary Council that was held the last week in the King's presence, was, we are told, to regulate several matters concerning his Majesties Revenues.

Genova, Jan. 14. The Duke of *Monaco* is still here, but intends to part from hence the beginning of the next week for *France*. The Marquis de *Martini*, late Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick at the Court of *France*, arrived here two or three days ago in a Gally from *Marseiller*. By a Vessel arrived from the Coast of *Barbary*, we are informed that six Men of War of *Tripoli*, who had served in the Grand Signior's Fleet the last Summer, were returned home, and that two of them were gone out again to cruise.

Lisbon, Jan. 12. The 19th of the last Month the Sieur *Amelot*, Ambassador of *France*, had his Publick Audience of the King of *Portugal* (who is perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition) and afterwards of the Infanta. We have Advice that two *Portuguese* Ships bound for *Brazile* and *Angola*, have been cast away near *O Porto*, their Lading, which was all lost, being valued at 50000 Crowns.

Legborne, Jan. 16. The Great Duke of *Tuscany* has given Orders for the arming four Gallies at *Pisa*, which are to cruise on these Coasts, to secure them against the Pyrats of *Barbary*. Five *English* Merchant Ships arrived here this week.

Venice, Jan. 18. The 12th Instant the Senate made choice of Prince *Maximilian* of *Brunswicke*, to be General of the Forces of the Republick, with a yearly Pension of 6000 Ducats; And the

same day gave a Commission to Colonel *Marati*, to raise 1000 Men in the Isle of *Corsica*; The Senate have likewise appointed three extraordinary Governors of the Gallies, who are Signior *Birtolomeo Costarini*, Signior *Philippo Doria*, and Signior *Alessandro Beremani*. We have Advice, that the two thousand Turks which we told you in our last, had appeared in the Neighborhood of *Coron*, increasing afterwards to 4000, had formed a design upon *Coron*, for which purpose they expected some Cannon from *Modon*; but that Signior *Molino*, who was Cruising with a Squadron of Men of War in the Gulph of *Coron*, having notice thereof, he had, after having taken the necessary measures with the Governour of *Coron*, sent an Officer ashore to assemble the *Greeks* and *Maynotes*, of which having got together a considerable Body, he caused them to embark in small Boats which he had provided, and to land again in the Night not far from *Coron*, who being joined by the Garilon of that place, they environed the Turks, and charged them so vigorously, that most of them were killed or taken Prisoners, and the rest put to flight, the *Venetians* remaining Masters of their Baggage, and a great quantity of Arms and Ammunition. The Letters from *Rome* of the 12th of this Month tell us, that the Pope's Indisposition still kept him from giving any Audiences; And that his Holiness had for some days been troubled with the Gout in his hand.

Warsaw, Jan. 10. The Turks, as the last Letters from *Zolkiew* inform us, do endeavor to amuse the Court of *Poland*, and to slacken the Preparations that are making in this Kingdom, by their repeated Overtures of Peace, which they have not only made by the hands of the *Polish* Minister at *Adrianople* (where he has been detained ever since the present War) and the Envoy of the *Cham* of *Tartary*, but likewise by other ways; but they have been all rejected in a manner that will let the *Ottomans* see how vainly they endeavor to divert the King from a vigorous prosecution of the War, or to separate him from his Allies. The *Polish* Officers are now making their Recruits, besides which several new Regiments will be raised; Towards the charge whereof, the Pope has by his Nuncio at this Court, contributed a considerable Sum of Money, and has given the King an assurance of yet greater Supplies. It is certain the Campaign will be begun on this side much sooner this year than it hath yet been since the War; And, it is said, that the 12th of *May* is already appointed for the general Rendezvous of the Army. We have an account from *Lembergh*, that the Sieur *Mobilis*, General of the *Cossacks*, in the Service of this Crown, understanding that 3000 *Tatars* were drawn together near

near *Caminet*, with a design to make an Incurſion into the *Polish Territories*, gave notice thereof to the Crown General, and deſired ſome Troops might be ſent to his aſſiſtance, which being done, he marched with theſe, and a Detachment of *Coffacks*, towards the Enemy, and fell upon them with that Courage and Succeſs, that the *Tartars* were entirely routed, and the greateſt part of them ſlain upon the place. We have Letters from *Moscow* of the beginning of the laſt Month, which ſo far confirm our former Advices, as to ſay that there is a great diſpoſition at that Court to adjuſt the Differences they have with this Crown about the Limits; but withal add, that according to all appearance, the Czars will not engage in the War againſt the *Turks*.

Ratisbonne, Jan. 25. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 20th Inſtant inform us, that the Deputies from the Prince and States of *Transylvania*, had the 16th Audience of the Emperor, to whom they repreſented the great Burthen that Principality at preſent lies under, by being obliged to give Winter-quarters to 8000 Men, and to raiſe beſides Contributions in Money, and to furniſh Proviſions for the Imperial Troops quartered about *Zolnocke*, and prayed his Imperial Maſteſty to withdraw his ſaid Troops; That two or three days after they had another Audience of the Emperor, but it's not known what they then propoſed. The Count de *Herberſtein*, Governor of *Careſtſtadt*, parted from thence the 31 of the laſt Month for *Segna*, to embark there on a *Venetian Man of War* which is to carry him to *Malta*, and the Count de *Strafoldo* is appointed by the Emperor to be Governor of *Careſtſtadt*, during the abſence of the Count de *Herberſtein*, who is to command the Gallies of *Malta* the next Summer againſt the *Turks*. The Forces which the Elector of *Brandenburg* is to ſend to the Emperor's aſſiſtance, will conſiſt in twelve Troops of Horſe, ſix Troops of Dragoons, and five Regiments of Foot, making together 7400 Men; They will begin their march the firſt of *April*. His Electoral Highneſs has likewiſe promiſed to aſſiſt the Emperor with ſeveral pieces of great Cannon and Mortars. They write from *Hungary*, that General *Caprara* had ſent 1500 Foot to reinforce the Troops that block up the Caſtle of *Montatz*.

Hamburg, Jan. 29. They write from *Zell*, that a Reform will be made in the Troops of the Dukes of *Lunenburgh*; Thoſe Princes intending to keep in their Pay only 15000 Foot and 2000 Horſe, beſides the Troops which the Duke of *Hanover* has ſent to the Aſſiſtance of the Republick of *Venice*. The Differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City, continue in the ſame ſtate, all the Endeavors that have been uſed to compoſe them, having been hitherto ineffectual. The Letters from *Poland* hardly ſpeak of any thing, but the preparations that are making there for the Campaign.

Hague, Febr. 8. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 27th paſt, do not confirm the news we had by the Poſt before, of the Deſcat of 3000 *Turks* near *Segedin*, and of Major-General *Heuſler's* being mortally wounded, but give the following Account. That Lieutenant-General de *Wibercy* and General *Heuſler* marched from *Zolnocke*, on the firſt of the

laſt Month, with 4000 *German*s and *Hungarian*s, and having raiſ'd ſome Contributions in the Enemy's Country, advanced towards *Segedin*, and after ſome reſiſtance, made themſelves Maſters of that Town, which having Plundered and Burnt, the wet Weather hindering them from attacking the Caſtle, into which the Garriſon had retired, they returned with the Booty they had got to *Zolnock*.

Paris, Febr. 8. The King intends, we are told, that his Troops ſhall encamp this Summer, as they did the laſt in three Bodies, one in *Alſace*, another in the *Franche Comte*, and the third on the *Saar*. They write from *Madrid*, that the Pope's Nuncio at that Court has deſired that the Money taken out of the *French Snip* at the *Groyne*, may be reſtored to the Owners thereof, they giving ſecurity at *Madrid* to ſubmit to what his Holineſs ſhall determine in that matter. The Letters from *Cadiz* tell us, that the *Galcons* are expected there in *May*.

Whitehall, Febr. 2. The Marquis de *Capponi*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of *Tuſcany*, hath had his Audiences of Leave of their Maſteſties, being Conduſted by Sir *Charles Cotrel* Maſter of the Ceremonies.
