hear Caminico, with a defign to make an Incursion into the Polifb Territories, gave notice thereof to the Crown General, and defired fome Troops might be fent to his affifiance, which being done, he matched with these, and a Detathement of Coffacks, towards the Enemy, and fell upon them with that Courage and Success, that the Tartars were entirely routed, and the greateft part of them flain upon the place. We have Letters from Mof cow of the beginning of the last Month, which fo far confirm our former Advices, as to fay that there is a great disposition at that Court to adjust the Differences they have with this Crown about the Limits; but withal add, that according to all appearance, the Czars will not engage in the War against the Turks.

Rativbonne, Jan. 25. The Letters from Vienna of the soth Instant inform us, that the Deputies from the Prince and States of Transilvania (had the 16th Audience of the Emperor, to whom they represented the great Burthen that Principality at prefent lies under, by being obliged to give Winter-quarters to 8000 Men, and to raife befides Contributions in Money, and to furnish Provisions for the Imperial Troops quartered about Zolnocke, and prayed his Imperial Majefty to withdraw his faid Troops; That two or three days after they had another Audience of the Emperor, but it's not known what they then proposed. The Count de Herberstein, Governor of Carelstads, parted from thence the 31 of the last Month for Segna, to embark there on a Venetian Man of War which is to carry him to Malta , and the Count de Strafoldo is appointed by the Emperor to be Governor of Carelfladt, during the absence of the Count de Herberstein, who is to command the Gallies of Malta the next Summer against the Turks. The Forces which the Elector of Brandens burgh is to fend to the Emperor's affiltance, will confift in twelve Troops of Horle, fix Troops of Dragoons sand five Regiments of Foot, making together 7400 Men ; They will hegin their march the first of April. His Electoral Highness has likewise promised to affist the Emperor with feveral pieces of great Cannon and Mortars. They write from Hungary, that General Caprara had fent 1500 Foot to reinforce the Treops that block up the Caffie of Montgatz.

Hamburgb, Jan. 29. They write from Zell, that a Reform will be made in the Troops of the Dukes of Lunenburgh; Those Princes intending to keep in their Pay only 15000 Foot and 2000 Horfe, befides the Troops which the Duke of Hanouer has font to the Affistance of the Republick of Venice. The Differences between the Dake of Zell and this City, continucin the fame flate, all the Endeavors that, have been used to compose them, has ving been hitherto ineffectual. The Letters from. Poland hardly speak of any thing, but the preparations that are making there for the Campagac.

Hague, Febr. 8. The Letters from Vienna of the 27th paft, do not confirm the news we had by the Post before, of the Defeat of 3000 Turks near Segedim and of Mejor-General Heufier's being mortally wounded, but give the following Account. That Lieutenant-General dereadercy and General Heufter marched from Zolnoche, on the first of the

last Month, with 4000 Germans and Hungarians, and having raif d tome Contributions in th Encmi s Country, advanced towards Segedin, and after Yome refiltance, made themselves Masters of that Towas, which having Plundered and Burnt, the wet Weather hindering them from attacking the Calile, into which the Garilon had retired, they returned with the Booty they had got to Zolno ck.

The King intends, we are told, Paris, Febr. 8. that his Troops shall encamp this Summer, as they did the laft in three Bodies, one in Alface, another in the Franche Comte, and the third on the Saar. They write from Madrid, that the Pope's Nuncio at that Court has defired that the Money taken out of the French Snip at the Groyne, may be reftored to the Owners thereof, they giving fecurity at Madrid to fubmit to what his Holine's shall determine in that matter. The Letters from Cadiz tell us, that the Galcons are expected there in May.

Whiteball, Febr. 2. The Marquis de Capponi, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of Tufcany, hath had his Audiences of Leave of their Majeffics, being Conducted by Sir Charles Courel Master of the Ceremonies.
