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Zolkiew, Fanuary 6.

HE Count de Schaftgotz, who hath for some time resided at this Courtas Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, parted from hence this Week for Moldavia and Valachia, having acquainted the king of Poland, that he had Orders from his Imperial Majesty, to sollicite those Princes to cast off the Subjection whey are under to the Ottoman Port, and to join their Arms with those of the Emperor and his Allies. The Envoy from the Cham of Tartary, though the Proposals he made on the part of the Turks are absolutely rejected, is still here, and, it's believed, he will not be sent back, till we have an account of the arrival of the Polish Ambassadors at Moscow, and of the Success they are like to have in their Negotiation there, according to which, it's probable, some Overtures may be made to the Tartars, to separate them from the Tarks. Several Persons who come from Persia, report, that that King having heard of the great Successes of the Christians against the Turks, had resolved likewise to make War upon them, and that his Forces began to march for that purpose towards Bagdet. The King continues in his Resolution to command his Army in Person the next Campagne, and has again affured the Pope's Nuncio, in an Audience he had of his Majesty this week, That he will be in the Field before the end of May.

The Devonshire, the Reserve, the Mary and Thomas, and the Samuel, are on their departure for Leghorne, and the Enston for By a Vessel arrived in this Port from Toulon, we have advice, that several light Frigats are fitting out there, to cruise against the Pyrats of Sally. The Prince of Monaco parted from hence the 15th Instant in one of this States Gallies,

to return home.

Venice, Fan. 26. Captain General Morosini has fent hither a great many Vessels which are to transport the Soldiers that arrive daily at the Lido, as well as Provisions to Corfou. The Duke of Hanouer has let the Senate know, that 2600 Men of his Troops are marching towards the place where they are to embark for the Morea, part of which are to recruit those he has already in the Service of this Republick. The Troops of the Milaneze are expected the next Monthat the Lido, the Difficulties that remained about the execution of the Treaty concluded with the Count de Melgar, being wholly removed. The Landtgrave of Hesse-Cassell has, we are told, likewise promifed to affift the Republick with 2000 Men; And with these Succors, and the Troops now raising by this State, we are assured the Republick will have the next Compagne on Army of 30000 fighting Men. The Captain General Morofini has formed a Regiment of Maynotes, which is composed of 24 Sompanies, 100 Men in each, of which he has

made Signior Paolo Maeri Colonel. They write from Castaro, that the Heydukes and Morlaques continue their Incursions into the Ottoman Territories, from whence they return for the most part laden with Plunder. We have received Letter! from Coron, which give a more particular Account than we had before of the Action that lately hap-pened in their Neighborhood. They tell us, that the Turks having drawn together to the number of 4000 Men, posted themselves not far from Coron, with an intention to attack that place, of which the Governor Signior Grioti having given notice to Signior Molino, who was Cruiling in those Seas with the Ships under his Command, he sailed towards Calamata, and took on Board his Ships 800 Men of that Garifon, and a confiderable number of Grecians and Maynotes, who very readily offered their Service in this occasion, which he afterwards landed again near Coron, with 600 Men drawn out of his Ships, with rhele joined 1500 of the Garison of Coron; The Turks in the mean time made several Retrenchments to secure their Camp, bur were of able to defend them when attacked by the criffians who in a short time made themselves Masters of those Works, and then engaging the Enomies Horse, entirely routed them, above 500 of the Turks were killed upon the place, as many wer raken Prisoners, and the rest fled in great confusion, leaving their Baggage, and a great quantity of Arms and Provisions in the hands of the Christians.

Vienna, Jan. 24. The Emperor has appointed Commissioners to treat with the Envoys from Transilvania, who, we are told, offer a Sum of Money to free that Country from Winter-quar-ters; but it is still believed, that this is not the onely Bufine's they are fent hither upon. General Caraffa has intercepted a Letter from Count Teckeley, written with his own hand, to his Wife the Princess Rugotzi, in which he acquaints her, that he was reliored to his Liberty, and should return very suddenly, but this is lookt upon as a politick Contrivance of the Turks, who, it's believed, obliged Teckeley to write this Letter, and then ordered it so, that it should fall into the hands of the Imperialists, thereby to dispose this Court to accept of their Proposals of Peace. An Express arrived here this week from Berlin, with a List of the Troops his Electoral Highness intends to send to the Emperor's affiftance, in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between them, which will be commanded by General Schoning, and will begin their march the first of April; But we do not hear that the Treaty with the Elector of Saxony for 6000 Men is yet concluded. The Count de Herberstein, who is to command the Gallies of Malta the next Summer against the Turks, embarked the 6th Instant at Zeng; And the Count de Strosoldo is made Governor of Carelstade during his absence.
