## Naples, Jun. 6.

Ur Viceroy's three years being expired, we expect the next Letters from Madrid will tell us, that the King has named his Succeffor, though many are of opinion that his Excellency will be continued in this Government for three years longer. The Venetian Ofcers are now making their Levy of 2000 Men in this Kingdom, which they hope to have compleat in a fhort time. A Convoy of Provisions hath been lately fent to the new Fort in the Province of Abruzzo, in which will be conftantly kept a Ga-rifon of 300 Men to fecure those quarters against the Banditi. Our Viceroy has remi ted 50000 Crowns to the Governor of Milan, in purfuance of the Orders he had received from the Court of Spain, and is preparing to fend him a farther fupply, which is to be employed towards the paying of the Forces of that State.

Milan, Fan. 17 The King of Spain having ratified the Treaty our Governor the Count de Melgar lately concluded with the Republick of Venice, the Troops he is thereby obliged to lend to the Alfiftance of that State, will now very fuddenly begin their march. His Excellency has, we are told, received Orders from Spain, to make a further Reform of the Troops in the Service of this Durchy.

Vienna, Jan. 31. The Envoys from Prince Abafti and the States of Iranfylvania have had feveral Conferences with the Ministers of this Court, but we do not know the fubject of them, further than what is faid of their folliciting an exemption of Winter Quarters. The Emperor has fent a very rich Pretent to the Count de Peterbasi, his Officers are to have each a Gold Chain, and a Months pay will be given to the Soldiers under his Command, for the good Services performed by them in feveral late occasions, and particularly in the Fight near Arach. There are Letters from Hungary which fay, that one of Teckeley's Officers, who had been with him at Belgrade was returned to Warsdin, with Letters from Teckley to fome of the chief of his Party, wherein he gives them an account that he was at liberty, and promifes to relieve Monigatz, but we can give no great credit to this Advice, unless it comes from more authentick hands than as yet it does. The Emperor is fending the Count de Berka to the Princes of Italy, to demand their affili-ance against the Turks. And we are told that the Count de Nostitz, the Imperial Minister in Sue-

den, is ordered to pass to the Court of Moscouy, in Quality of the Emperor's Ambassador. They write from Newbeusel, that the Ballions ruined during the late Siege, are quite replaced; And that the new Works they are making for the greater fccurity of that place, are very much advanced; but that the Houfes are not yet rebuilt, fo that greatelt part of the Garifon is fill obliged to lodge in Barraques; The Letters from Gran, and other places, confirm that the Garilons of Buda, Agria. Canifa, and other Turkif places, do fuffer very much through the want of Provisions, and that the Soldiers grow very mutinous; The Ecclefiasticks of the Hereditary Countries continue to fend hither their Contributions for the War, which Cardinal Bonviss, the Pope's Nuncio at this Court, does difpole of according to the Orders he has re-ceived from his Holiack. The Marquis de Corbon has obtained leave to raile 500 Men to recruit his Regiment in the Service of the Republick of Venice. The Recruits that are railing for the Imperial Regiments advance very fuccefsfally, fo that it's not doubted but the Officers will have finished them within the time limited. The Buke of Lorrain is expected here in the beginning of March from Inspruck, and then a great Council of War will be held to concert the Operations of the next Campagne.

Restisbonne, Febr. 5. The Elector of Bavaria makes given Preparations for the Campagne, and continues refulved to Command his Forces in Perfon. The Elector of Brandenburgh has, we are told, affured the Emperor, that his Troops fhall be in Hungary before the 12th of May, about which time will be held the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army. We expect every day to hear that the Treaty between the Emperor, and the Eletor of Saxony, about the 6000 Men which the latter is to fend to the Affiftance of his Imperial Majefty, is concluded.

Hamburgb, Febr.5. Yefterday 2000 Men of the Lunenburgb Troops paffed the Elbe, and took their Quarters in feveral Villages within the Jurifdiction of this City, which, it's faid, they have done by the Emperor's Order. They write from Berlin, That the Suedifb Envoy advances very fuccefsfully in his Negotiation, for the adjuiling the differences about the Limits in Pomeren, in which he is affifted by the Imp. rial Minifter. And that the King of Poland hath written to the Elector of Brandenburgb, to defire him to haften the march of the Iroops with which he is to affift that Crown. The laft Letters from Cracom told us, that the King of Poland had received Advice, that the Sophy of Perfia had refolved to declare War agains the Turks,
