ON Tuesday the 16th of July 1850, at half past six o'clock in the morning, the Remains of His late Royal Highness The DUKE OF CAMBRIDGE, seventh and youngest surviving Son of His Majesty King George the Third, were privately removed from Cambridge-House, in Piccadilly, for Interment in Kew Church, escorted by a detachment of the Second Life Guards.

A Guard of Honour from the Coldstream Guards mounted in the Court-yard in front of Cambridge-House.

The Funeral Procession reached Kew Green, at the residence of His late Royal Highness, at half past nine o'clock A. M.

His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner, with His two Supporters and Aide-de-Camp, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, attended by The Groom of the Stole, The Lord, Groom, and Equerry of His Royal Highness, His Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and The Lord-Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, &c. met the Funeral at the residence of His late Royal Highness on Kew Green.

The Chaplain and Medical Attendant at Kew, the Clerk of the Stables, the Pages and Servants of His late Royal Highness, also met the Funeral at the residence of His late Royal Highness.

Upon arrival at the residence of His late Royal Highness, on Kew Green, in front of which a Guard of Honour from the Coldstream Guards had mounted, the Body was removed from the Hearse, and those who accompanied it from London quitted the Carriages in which they were conveyed, and the Procession, flanked by the Coldstream Guards, moved in the following order to the Church, where The Body was met by the Revd. Richd. B. Byam, Vicar of the parish, and the Revd. James Hutchinson, one of His late Royal Highness's Chaplains; viz.—

Upon arrival at the Church, at Ten o'clock A.M. the Body was placed upon Tressels, in front of the Communion Table, and the Coronet and Cushion, and the Baton and Cushion, laid thereon. His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner, with his Supporters, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, and His Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, took their places at the Head of the Corpse; The Lord Chamberlain, The Vice Chamberlain, and the Gentleman Usher of the Sword of State, at the feet of the Corpse: The Supporters of the Pall being in their places. The other persons comprising the Procession were conducted into the Royal Gallery and into Pews provided for them in the Church.

There were also present in the Church the following Cabinet Ministers; viz: Lord John Russell, The Marquis of Lansdowne, The Earl of Minto, and Viscount Palmerston, together with The Duke of Wellington, The Earl of Jersey, and Lord Fitzroy Somerset.

The Burial Service then commenced, the Reverend James Hutchinson, one of His late Royal Highness's Chaplains, officiating, the Reverend Richard B. Byam, Vicar of the parish of Kew, being in his place at the Communion.

The part of the Scrvice before the Interment having been read, The Body was borne to the Vault at the West Entrance to the Church, followed by His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, His Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, The Lord Chamberlain, The Vice Chamberlain, &c. and was deposited therein. The Officiating Chaplain then concluded the Service.

After which His Royal Highness The Chief Mourner, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, and His Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, were conducted by the Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household out of the Church, followed by their Attendants and the others present at the Solemnity.

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
