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Vienna, Febr. 3.

THE Treaty with the Elector of Saxony is concluded for 6000 Men, which are to begin their march the next Month. The Officer who arrived here the last Week from Berlin, has adjusted all things concerning the march of the Brandenburg Forces, and the Emperor has appointed Commissaries to provide for their subsistence from the time they enter into his Territories. The Elector of Bavaria has caused Magazines to be made in several places in Hungary near the Danube, that his Troops may be plentifully furnished with Provisions and all other Necessaries during the Campaign. The Venetian Ambassador having obtained the Emperor's leave to raise two Regiments in the Empire for the Service of the Republick, is now treating with several German Officers for that purpose. The advices from the Turkish Quarters, as well as from Hungary, say, that the Grand Signior has declared Count Teckelej Prince of Transylvania, and of Upper Hungary, and that he will be at the Head of a Body of Ten or Twelve thousand Men, so soon as the Season will permit it; upon which the Emperor has sent Orders to his Officers commanding in Upper Hungary, to be upon their Guard, that they may not be surprized in their Quarters. General Caprara, as the last Letters from Cassebau inform us, has sent another Detachment to reinforce the Imperial Troops that block up Montatz, the Garison whereof, upon the news of Teckelej's liberty, have taken new Courage, and have, it's said, bound themselves by Oath to defend that place to the last extremity. We have advyce from Adrianople of the death of the Grand Visier, and that the Grand Signior had made choice of Solymen Bassa (who commanded against the Poles the last Summer) to succeed him in that station, and had withal declared, that he should command the Ottoman Forces in Hungary the next Campaign. That the Grand Signior had caused several Millions to be taken out of the Seraglio, to advance the new Levies he had ordered to be made, which notwithstanding went on very slowly, by reason of the great Consternation that's spread through the whole Ottoman Empire.

Vienna, Febr. 7. This week arrived here an Express from Poland, with advyce; That an Envoy was come to that Court from Persia, who had assured the King of Poland, that the Sophy his Master had declared War against the Turks, and that 80000 Men of his Forces were marching with a resolution to besiege Babylon. We are likewise informed, that the Czars of Moscovy have resolved to enter into the League against the Turks, upon condition the Poles do quit their Pretensions upon Rioviz, and some other places, formerly belong-

ing to that Crown, but now in the possession of the Moscovites; whereupon the Emperor has ordered the Count de Nostritz, residing at present at the Court of Sweden, to go his Ambassador to Moscow, to assist the Ambassadors of Poland in their Negotiation at that Court. The Envoys from Prince Abasti, and the States of Transylvania, continue their Conferences with the Imperial Ministers; And we hope to be able in a very short time to tell you, that they have concluded an Alliance against the Turks. We have an account from Hungary, that a Party of the Garison of Buda having made an Incurision into the Imperial Territories, and advanced so far as to carry away some Cattle out of the Neighborhood of Raab, in their return they were fallen upon by the Hussars of Felprin and Paps, who defeated the Turks, and recovered the Booty they had taken. We have likewise advyce, that a Party of 30 Foot and 20 Horse, came lately out of Montatz in the Night, with a design to make an Incurision into the neighbouring Countrey, but being discover'd by the Imperialists, most of them were killed or taken. Several Brigades of Horse, very well mounted and equipped, have within these few days pass'd through this City in their march to Hungary, to recruit the Imperial Regiments that are now quartered there; And great quantities of Ammunition of all sorts have been sent from hence by water, to fill the Magazines that are making on that side. We have advyce that 6000 Turks have lately joined the Ottoman Troops appointed for the guard of the Bridge of Essecke, under the Command of four Bassa's and that the Garison of Temispaer has been reinforced with 1200 Men.

Ratisbonne, Jan. 30. The Imperial Commissioners have, in the Name of the Emperor, demanded of the States of the Empire assembled here, an extraordinary Subsidy for the War against the Turks. The Minister from the Elector Palatin has presented a long Memorial to the Dyet concerning the Pretensions of the Dukes of Orleans upon the Allodial Lands of the Palatinate. The States of Franconia are separated, having, among other matters, resolved to recruit their Troops at present in the Emperor's Service.

Hamburg, Febr. 5. Yesterday about 10 in the morning, the Magistrates of this City had the Alarm, that 2000 Men of the Duke of Zell's Forces, who had pass't the Elbe 3 or 4 German Miles above this place, were come into part of their Territories, called, *The Four Lands*, and had taken a little Town called Barsdorf, that some had been wounded on both sides, and that the Governor was retired with several of the Townsmen into the Castle, which still held out. Upon this News, the Magistrates caused the Burghers to meet, and it was resolved to raise Men, and to send to Colonel Franke, who commands the Lunenburgh Forces, to know the reason of his invading their Territories; he returned

returned this Answer, That the Duke of Zell was informed some other Prince had a design which he thought fit to prevent. Expresses have been sent to give the King of Denmark and the Elector of Brandenburg an account of what has hapned.

Hamburg, Febr. 12. Our Magistrates having in two days raised about 1000 Men, to reinforce the Troops they have constantly in their Pay, a Detachment was sent out the 6th Instant to relieve the Castle of *Barsdorf*, but falling into an Ambush, several of them were taken Prisoners, and the rest obliged to return without executing their Orders. Yesterday 800 Men were again sent out, but they came too late to succor the Castle, which the Governor had upon Summons surrendered the day before, not being in a condition to defend it. This Afternoon the *Lunenburghers* advanced nearer to us, and attacked, with 2000 Foot and Dragoons, a little Fort called *Heckenkatzen*, about a quarter of a German mile on this side *Barsdorf*, in which were between 40 and 50 men, commanded by Capt. *Aldersey*, an English man, who very bravely defended it; the *Lunenburghers* were twice repulsed with very considerable loss, but at the third Assault they entered the Fort, Captain *Aldersey* and most of his men being slain, the rest were made Prisoners. The same day were sent out 800 men, and afterwards 1000 more, with 8 pieces of Cannon, under the Command of Major General *Mancken*, and Captain *Petersen*, to succour the said Fort, as well as to secure a Passage, called, *The Red Bridge*; and had they performed their part as they ought, the *Lunenburghers* would have ran great danger of being all cut off, for which reason those two Officers, upon their return hither, were secured, and, its said, they will be Tryed by a Council of War. Since that, several Parties have been sent out, but there has hapned no farther Action. The Commander of the *Lunenburghers* has sent hither to let the Magistrates know that if they do not furnish Provisions for his Troops, they must expect to see their fine Summer-Houses and Gardens destroyed; upon which the Council of Thirty have declared that whosoever of this City shall supply the *Lunenburghers* with any Provisions, shall be lookt upon as a Traytor to this Government. The Duke of *Holstein Gottorp* went from hence on Friday last. We have this day advice that 8000 of the King of Denmark's Forces are on their march to oblige the *Lunenburghers* to retire. Captain *Tamon*, who is possted with several Chaloups on the *Elbe*, has taken two *Lunenburgh* Vessels laden with Provisions.

Brussels, Febr. 15. An Envoy is arrived here from the Electoral Prince Palatine, to compliment his Excellency upon his being confirmed in this Government. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, that the Treaty between the Emperor and the Elector of *Saxony* is concluded, by which his Electoral Highness promises to assist his Imperial Majesty with 6000 Men against the *Turks*, in consideration whereof he is to receive 300000 Florins. They write from *Vienna*, that they had advice by an Express from the Emperor's Ambassador at the Court of *Poland*, that the Sophy of *Persia* had declared War against the *Turks*, and that his Forces were marching to besiege *Bagdet*.

Brussels, Febr. 19. The last Letters from *Madrid* told us, that the Galeons are not expected at *Cadiz* till *June*, but that they will bring home a greater Treasure than they have done for many years, their Lading being valued at 35 Millions. It is confirmed by the last Advices from *Hungary*,

That Count *Teckelej* is not only at Liberty, but that he will appear very suddenly at the Head of a considerable Army; And that the Grand Signior intends to make him Prince of *Trahisvania* in the place of Prince *Abasti*, whom the *Turks* are much dissatisfied with.

Deale, Febr. 11. Yesterday the Wind coming at E. N. E. the Ships in the *Downes* outward bound set Sail, among which were eight *English East-India* Men, and about 10 *Dutch* Merchant Ships under the Convoy of two Men of War.

Westminster, Febr. 12. This day *Thomas Saxton*, convicted of *Wilful Perjury*, was brought to the King's Bench Bar, to receive the Judgment of the Court, which was; That he stand in the Pillory to morrow for the space of an hour before *Westminster-hall* Gate, and on Monday next at *Temple-Bar*; That he be whipt on Tuesday, from *Ludgate* to *Westminster*; That he stand in the Pillory on Wednesday, against the *Royal Exchange*; That he be whipt on Friday, from *Newgate* to *Tyburn*; That he pay a Fine of Five hundred Marks, and remain in Prison till he has paid the same.

Whitehall, Febr. 13. The King has been pleased to Constitute Sir *Thomas Fenner*, one of His Majesties Sergeants at Law, and late Recorder of *London*, one of the Barons of the Exchequer, in the place of Sir *William Gregory*; And Sir *Henry Bedingfield*, likewise His Majesties Sergeant at Law, one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas, in the place of Sir *Creswel Levins*. And *John Holt* of *Grays-Inn* Esquire, (upon whom His Majesty has been pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood) is made Recorder of *London*.
