HE Treaty with the Elector of Saxomy is concluded for 6000 Men, which are to begin their march the next The Officer who arrived here the last Week from Berlin, has adjusted all things concerning the march of the Brandenburgh Forces, and the Emperor has appointed Commissaries to provide for their subfiftence from the time they enter into his Territories. The Elector of Bavaria has caused Magazines to be made in several places in Hungary near the Danube, that his Troops may be plentifully furnished with Provisions and all other Necessaries during the Campagne. The Venetian Ambassador having obtained the Emperor's leave to raise two Regiments in the Empire for the Service of the Republick, is now treating with feveral German Officers for that purpole. The advices from the Officers for that purpote. Turkish Quarters, as well as from Hungary, say, that the Grand Signior has declared Count Teckeley Prince of Translivanta, and of Upper Hungary, and that he will be at the Head of a Body of Ten or Twelve thousand Men, so soon as the Scasod will permit it; upon which the Emperor has sent Orders to his Officers commanding in Opper Hungary, to be upon their Guard, that they may not be surprized in their Quarters. General Caprara, as the last Letters from Caschaw informus, has sent another Detachement to reinforce the Imperial Troops that block up Monigatz, the Garison whereof, upon the news of Teckeley's liberty, have taken new Courage, and have, it's fald, bound themselves by Oath to defend that place to the last extremity. We have advice from Adrianople of the death of the Grand Vifier, and that the Grand Signior had made choice of Solyman Bassa (who commanded against the Poles the last Summer) to fucceed him in that flation, and had withal declared, that he should command the Onoman Forces in Hungary the next Campagne. That the Grand Signior had caused several Millions to be taken out of the Seraglio, to advance the new Levies he had ordered to be made, which notwithflanding went on very flowly, by reason of the great Consternation that's spread through the whol f Ottoman Empite.

Vienna, Febr. 72. This week arrived hete an Express from Poland, with advice; That an Envoy was come to that Court from Persia, who had assured the king of Poland, that the Sophy his Matured the King of Poland the King of P fler had declared War against the Turks, and that 80000 Men of his Forces were marching with a resolution to besiege Babylon. We are likewise informed, that the Czars of Moscowy have resolved to enter into the League against the Turks, upon condition the Poles do quit their Pretentions upon Riovia, and some wiher places, formerly belong-

ing to that Crown, but now in the possession of the Moscovites; whereupon the Emperor has ordered the Count de Nostitz, residing at present at the Court of Sueden, to go his Ambassador to Mescow, to assist the Ambassadors of Poland in these Negotiation at that Court. The Envoys from Prince Abafti, and the States of Transilvania, continue their Conferences with the Imperial Mini-flers i And we hope to be able in a very short time to tell you, that they have concluded an Alliance against the Turks We have an account from Hun. gary, that a Party of the Garison of Buda having made an Incursion into the Imperial Territories, and advanced to far as to carry away fome Cattle out of the Neighborhood of Raab, in their return they were fallen upon by the Hulfars of Velpria and Papa, who defeated the Turks, and recovered the Booty they had taken. We have likewife advice. that a Party of 30 Foot and 20 Horse, came lately out, of Montgatz in the Night, with a delign to make an Incursion into the neighbouring Countrey, but being discover'd by the Imperialists, most of them were killed or taken. Several Brigades of Horse, very well mounted and equipped, have within these sew days passed through this City in their march to Hungary, to recruit the Imperial Regiments that are now quartered there; And great quantities of Ammun tion of all forts have been tent from hence by water, to fill the Magazines that are making on that fide. We have advice that 6000 Turks have lately joined the Oitomen Troops appointed for the guard of the Bridge of Effecke, under the Command of four Baffa's and that the Garison of Temispaer has been reinforced with 1200 Men.

Ratibound, Fun. 30. The Impetial Commis-fioners have, in the Name of the Emperor. de-manded of the States of the Empire affembled here, an extraordinary Sublidy for the War against the Turks. The Minister stem the Elector Palatin has presented a long Memorial to the Dyet concerning the Pretentions of the Durchels, of Gr-leans upon the Allodial Lands of the Pala inate, The States of Franconia are leparated, having, among other matters, resolved to recruit their Troops at

Hariburgh, Febr. 5. Hamburgh, Febr, 12. Our Magistrates having in two days raised about 1000 Men, to reinforce the Troops they have constantly in their Pay, a Detachement was fent out the 6th Instant to relieve the Castle of Barsdorf, but falling into an Ambush, several of them were taken Prisoners, and the rest obliged to return without executing their Orders. Yesterday 800 Men were again sent out, but they came too late to foccor the Cassle, which the Governor had upon Summons surrendred the day before, not being in a condition to defend it. This Afternoon the Lunenburghers advanced nearer to us, and attacked, with 2000 Foot and Dragoons, a little Fort colled Heskenkasen, about a quarter of a German mile on this side Barsdorf, in which were between 40 and 50 men, commanded by Capt. Aldersey, an English ma, who very bravely defendedit; the Lunenburgers were twice repulled with very confiderable loss, but at the third Assault they entred the Fort, Captain Aldersey and most of his men being flain, the rest were made Prisoners. The same day were sent out 800 meu, and afterwards 1000 more, with 8 pieces of Cannon, under the Command of Major General Mancken, and Captain Petersen, to succour the said Fort, as well asto secure a Passage, called, The Red Bridge; and had they performed their part as they ought, the Lunenburgers would have ran great danger of being all cut off, for which reason those two Officers, upon their return hither, were secured, and, its said, they will be Tryed by a Council of War. Since that, several Parties have been sent out, but there has happed no farther Action. The Commander of the Lunenburghers has fent hither to let the Magistrates know that if they do not furnish Provisions for his Troops, they must expect to see their fine Summer-Houses and Gardens destroyed; upon which the Council of Thirty have de-clared that who so ever of this City shall supply the Lunenburgers with any Provisions, shall be lookt upon as a Traytor to this Government. The Duke of Holftein Gottorp went from hence on Friday last. We have this day advice that 8000 of the King of Denmark's Forces are on their march to oblige the Lunenburgers to retire. Captain Tamon, who is possed with several Chaloups on the Elbe, has taken two Zunenburgh Veffels laden with Provisions.
