Venice, *Febr. 2.* The Senate have sent an Of-
ficer to *Milan*, to hasten the march of the Troops,
for which they have treated with the Count *de*
Melgar; And in the mean time Vessels are prepara-
ring here to transport them to the Elect. Several
new raised Troops arrive daily at the *Lido*; and,
it's said, that 1000 *Suiffers* are on their march,
which are expected there about the middle of
this Month. By a Vessel arrived from the *Morea*,
we have advice, that the Governor of *Coron* has
formed 45 Companies of *Greeks*, who voluntarily
entred into the Service of the Republick; And that
the Governor of *Calamata* has listed 4000 *Mainotes*,
without reckoning those that joined the Forces of
this State before they went into their Winter-
quarters. By another Vessel come from *Corſou*,
we are informed, that the *Venetian* Ships and Gal-
lies are resitting there with great diligence, and that
the Captain General intends to be at Sea again
before the end of the next Month. There are Let-
ters from *Constantinople*, which give an account
of the Death of the Grand Visier, and that the
Grand Signior had made choice of *Solyman* Bassa,
(who commanded the last Campaign against the
Poles) to succeed him.

Vienna, *Febr. 7.* The Prince *de Piccolomini* ar-
rived here three or four days ago from *Upper Hun-*
gary, being sent by General *Caprara*, to sollicite a
Sum of Money for the furnishing a Train of Ar-
tillery, and providing Magazines, and Cloaths for
the Troops under his Orders. He confirms the

News we had before of Count *Teckely's* liberty, and of his having written to the principal *Hungarians* that were formerly of his Party to draw them again from their Obedience to the Emperor, to which they returned, upon his being made a Prisoner at *Waradin*, but withal assures us, that all his Promises and Exhortations have not had any effect, unless it be upon the Garrison of *Montgat*, who are since grown more obstinate in their Rebellion, having sworn among themselves to defend the place to the last Extremity; General *Caprara* makes in the mean time the necessary preparations to attack them, so soon as the weather is more favourable. The Emperor having received an account from General *de Mercy*, that the Imperial Troops quartered on the *Teiffe* under his Command, are very much harassed, having been continually either in action, or upon marches since they came to their Quarters, has sent Orders to the said General, not to engage in any new Enterprize, that the Troops may have time to rest against the Campaign, which will be begun very early. By the Treaty concluded with the Elector of *Saxony*, it is agreed, that his Electoral Highness, if he commands the Forces he is to assist the Emperor with in person, shall come with 10000 Men, otherwise shall send 6000 under the Command of one of his General Officers, for which Troops, and their subsistence, he is to receive 300000 Florins in three Payments. The Envoys from *Transilvania* have, we are told, made an Agreement concerning the Quarters for the Imperial Troops; And we expect to hear very suddenly, that they have concluded an offensive and defensive Alliance against the *Turks*.

Hamburg, Febr. 15. There has not been since our last, any Action between the Troops of this City, and the *Lunenburghers*; The latter have entrenched themselves, but the want of Provisions will, its believed, force them in few daies to decamp. In the mean time these Magistrates continue their Levies, intending to raise 4000 Foot and some Horse. Seven *Danish* Regiments are marching this way, and we are told, that the Elector of *Brandenburgh* has likewise promised to assist this City. On the other side, Monsieur *Charvet* General of the Duke of *Zells* Forces, is Posted with a considerable Body of Horse and Foot near the *Elbe*, to succor the *Lunenburghers* if there be occasion for it.

Brussels, Febr. 22. His Excellency has caused a Placet to be published, by which all Officers in the Service of these Provinces, are required to repair immediately to their respective Garrisons. Deputies are arrived here from the States of *Flanders*, who have had Audience of his Excellency. The *French*, it's said, are making great Magazines in their Frontier places. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 10th Instant say, That their last advices from *Upper Hungary* gave an account, that a considerable Body of *Turks* was advanced to *Lippa*, with Count *Teckely* at the head of them. That the Garrison of *Temeswaer* had been lately reinforced with 2000 Men, and that the *Bassa* was preparing to take the Field with a strong detachment; And that General *Caprara* upon notice thereof, had ordered all the Imperial Regiments on that side to be in a readiness to march, and had sent to General *Mercy*, who has his Quarters at *Zolnock*, to have a watchful Eye upon the Enemy.

Paris, Febr. 22. The King has been indisposed and obliged to keep his Bed for two or three days, but is at present very well again.

Dublin, Febr. 8. The 6th Instant, being the day of our Gracious Sovereign's happy Accession to the

Crown, was Celebrated here with great Solemnity. In the Morning his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom went to *Christ-Church*, attended by the Nobility, Privy Counsellors, Judges and Barons of the Exchequer, and all His Majesty's Officers, who attend his Excellency on Solemn Occasions, the Proceeding being led by Two Troops of Grenadiers, followed by Two Troops of Horse, and the Guard of Battle-Axes, and the Streets being lined with the Regiment of Foot-Guards. His Excellency returned in the same manner from Church to the Castle, where the chief of the Nobility dined with him; At the bringing up of the second Course, the King of Arms proclaimed in *Latin*, *French*, and *English*, His Majesty's Stile, the Serjeants and other Officers attending; which done, the Trumpets sounded, and the great Guns were discharged, with Volleys of Small-shot, and the Day concluded with Ringing of Bells, Fire-Works, and all other Expressions of Joy.
