Malta, Fanuary 2. HE great Malter has given Orders for the firting out with all diligence eight Gallies, which are to serve against the Turks the next Summers, under the Command of the Coun de Herberstein: They will have on Board them 900 Land-Soldiers, and a Company of 100 Knights; And will be ready to fall about the end of April. A Naples; Fangu. Yelferday failed from hence three Marcha & Ships bound for Caliz, having on

Board 500 Soldiers raised in this Kingdom, to recruit the Neapolitan Regim nts in the Service of the Spanish Nerberlands; At Cadiz they are to embark on other Vellels for Oftend. The Watch Convoy who arrived hore the last week, dailed again the 27th Instant, bound for Smirns. The Marquis de Flori, who has at his own Charge fitted out a Ship of so Guns to ferve again't the Turks, is now in this Port, to supply himself with Provisions and other Necessaries. The Duke of Turfis is arrived at Gaeta with the Squadron of Gallies under his Command to pass the rest of the Winter there.

Milan, Febr. 6. The Treaty our Governor lately concluded with the Senate of Venice being ratified by the King of Spain, and the Republick, the Troops his Excellency was thereby obliged to fend to the affiftance of that State, began their march the last week, consisting in three Regimen's of Foot, and one of Dragoons, making together 3300

Venice, Febr. 9. The Letters from Corfou, by the way of Otranto, inform us, that the Captain General having refitted h s Ships and Gallies, had refulyed to fail from thence with the whole Fleet to attack, as was reported, Napoli de Malvafia; And that he had in the mean time fent Signior Delfino to cruife with 15 Men of War in the Archipe-lagos By a Saique arrived from Zara, we have advice, that notwithstanding the continual Rainsthey have had of late in those Parts, the Morlaques had made an Incursion into the Turkish Territories, and advanced as far as Lapan; That they had plundered and burnt three or four confiderable places; and returned with 2000 Head of Cattle, and a great quantity of Forage, and other confiderable Booty.

Gracom, Fan, 27. The Letters from Me Court at Zolkiew inform us, that an Express arrived there the 22d Instant with Letters from the, Rglish Resident in Persia, wherein he gives the King an account, that the Sophy having heard of the raifing of the Siege of Vienna, and of the entire Defeat of the Outman Army commanded by the Grand Visier, which he did not do till a year after, had thereupon resolved to break with the Tanks? that accordingly be had declared Wari against stoem, and had commanded his Generals to march with all his Forces towards the Turkish Territories to beliege Babylon; And the faid Express says, he met above 30000 Persian Horse that were marching to

the General Rendezvous. He adds, that publishing this important News in his pallage through Moscowy, the great Men of that Countrey did very much rejoyce at it, and that coming to Mascow, some of the Czar's chief Ministers hal fent for him, and seeming very well pleased with the account he gave them, had charged him with a Commidium, to defire the Amba ladors of this Crown; in case he met them, to halten their Journey to Moscow, which he had performed, having met them on the Frantiers of Moscovy. The preparations that are making in this Kingdom for the profecution of the Warsone (carried on with all the vigor and application imaginable; The King will be very early in the fields He will) not begin the Campagne with the Siege of Gaminies, as has been reported, but intends to pass the Niesler, and to advance in-to Moldavia and Valachia, to bring those two Provinces under the subjection of this Crown; And for that purpole Boats are providing to make a Hy-

ing Bridge on the Niester.
Vienna, Febr. 10. They write from Opper
Hungary, that several Turkish Troops were come to Lippa, and that it was faid Count Teckeley was with them to try to regain the Hungarians that have abandoned him fince his Imprisonment. The Emperor has given the Count de Peterbass, for his late good Services, a Gold Chain, and his Picture fet with Diamonds, and has ordered Presents for all the Officers, according to their feveral Queities, and three Months Pay for the Soldiers, under his Command; The Pope's Nuncio has likewise made the Count de Peterhasi a Present of a Gold We have an account from Agria, that the Turls of that place fearing they shall be attackt at the opening of the Campagne, work night and day to put themselves into the best posture of defence, they can; That they have undermined all their Works, and have our down all the Trees and Vines round the Town, They write from Zaimar, that General Caraffa, who has his Quarters there, was preparing for some important Enterprize, which we expect a farther account of in sew days. We are told from Croatia, that there is such a Dearth in those Parts, that the Inhabitants of several Villages joining together, had forced one or two Callles where the Gen-lemen, to whom they belonged, had secured their Corn, upon which fome froops had been feet out to difperfe them. The last Letters from Polands confirmed the News of the Persuns having heatin a Wan against the Turks; And say sursher a that they have great hopes the Moscovites will thoseupon enter into an offentive and desentive Alliance with the Crown of Poland.

(Cologne, Febr. 22. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners particle found beinge the 1-3th Instant for Duseldorpe, once more to examine the three Prifoners Gulicke, Sacks and Mechovius, who returned hither the 17th; And yesterday the said Prisoners

were

were brought from Dufeldorpe to Mulbeim, where Sentence of Death was the same day pronounced against them; And, it's said, they will be executed to morrow. The Letters from Vienna of the 13th Instant say, they had advice from Vipper Hungary, that Count Teckeley was come to Lippa at the Head of a considerable Body of Turks, and that he had from thence sent to the Princess Ragouzi, to let her know that he should be very suddenly in a condition to relieve Montgatz.

Hamburgh, Febr. 19. The Duke of Zell has

written a Letter to the Magistrates of this City, wherein he tells them, that the Orders he had given for the quartering some of his Forces within their Territories, would feem lefs strange to them, if they confidered with what undutifulness they have flighted the several Orders and Mandates of the Emperor, and how infufferable their carriage has been towards him (the Duke of Zell) having continued the Prohibition of all manner of Commerce with his Dominions, notwithstanding his repeated Admonitions to them to the contrary, and his Declaration that he would release their Ships; And that the way to keep things from coming to the last Extremities, is for them to yield due Ob:dience to the Emperor's Mandates; and particularly to that which requires them to restore the Councellor Meurer to his Estate and Employment, and to make him (the Duke of Zell) speedy reparation for what is past; adding, that he expected from them a politive Answer, and such as he might rely upon; and that he had given farther directions in these matters to Monsieur Chauves Lieutenant-General of his Forces, who would appoint some of his Officers to meet and confer with -fuch persons as should be by them deputed for that purpole. This Letter being read in the Senate, and in the Council of Thirty, after a long debate, it was refolved to fend back the Messenger without any answer to it. The Letters from Copenhagen affure us, that the King of Denmark hath order'd 7 or 8 Batallions, and some Dragoons, to march this way. And we are told from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburgh, if there be occasion, will likewise affift this City. These Magistrates, in the mean time, continue to raise Men; They have already a confiderable Body in their Service, which is posted about two English Miles from hence, and several small Vessels have been armed out to cruise on the-Elbe.

Hague, Febr. 19. The States of Holland and Welffriesland are now affembled, and, it's believed, before they separate, they will take a final resolution about the discharging the Debts contracted during the last War The Sieur Humicken, who resides-here on the part of the Duke of Hanouer, presented this week a Memorial to the States Gemeral, demanding the payment of the Arrears of Subsidies due to his Master from this State. Prince Waldecke arrived here the 1th Instant from Germany.

Hague, Febr. 26. The States of Holland have not yet been able to agree about the raising a Pond to discharge the Debts contracted during the last War, and, it's believed, they will adjourn again without coming to a final resolution in this matter. The States General have ordered that Copies of the Memorial lately presented to them by the Sieur Hunnicken, the Lunenburgh Minister, shall be sent to the several Provinces, and that it be at the same time very earnestly recommended to them to take care that the Arrears of Subsidies due to the Duke of Hanouer from this State may be forthwith paid The Deputies of the Admiralties have had several Conferences with those of the States General and upon their report, the said States have, we well rewarded.

are told, refolved that a Squadron of 7 or 8 Mch of War sha I be fitted out, and sent to the Streights, under the Command of the Count de Stirum, for the security of our Commerce against the Pyrats of Barbary. The Heer Van Spaen, Lieutenant General of the Elector of Brandenburgh's Forces, arrived here on Friday last from Cleves; It is faid that his Electoral Highness is going to form a Camp of 14 or 15000 Men on that fide; There is likewise a discourse, that part of the Forces of this State will encamp this Summer near Breda. Prince Waldecke is preparing for his return to Vienna, being to command the Imperial Forces in Hungary under the Duke of Lorrain; he is treating with several Ingeniers and Bombardiers, who are defirous to enter the Emperor's Service. The last Letters from Hamburgh told us, that the Lunenburgh Troops had quitted Heskenkaten Fort, as likewite a Work they had cast up to secure a Pass called, The Red Bridge; And that they drew their whole Force together near Barsdorf, which, it's believed, they have done, upon the News of the march of the Danish Forces.
