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Madrid, Jan. 31.

THE 19th Instant the private Council, composed of the Cardinal of Toledo, the Conde d'Oropesa, the Constable and Admiral of Castile, the Duke of Alva, and the Conde de Humanes, met again in the King's presence, to finish the Proj-ct they had before them, for the putting his Majesties Revenues on another foot than they are at present. The Pope's Nuncio continues his offices for the composing the difference about the Money taken out of the French Ship at the Groyne, with great hopes of success. But as for the Instances he has made in the name of his Holiness, that the Gallies of this Kingdom, or at least part of them may join the next Summer with those of Venice against the Turks, he has, it's said, been answered, that the King's Affairs will not permit him to send his Gallies this year to the Levant. The Count de Melgar has accepted of the Embassy to Rome; And the Conde de Fuensalida will part from hence the next Month for Milan, to take possession of that Government. We have fresh Advices from the West-Indies, which say, we may expect the Galeons in some of the Ports of this Kingdom in May or June next at farthest, and that their Lading will be about 26 Millions in Silver, and six Millions in Merchandizes.

Legborne, Febr. 2. The Master of a French Ship arrived in this Port in 24 days from Alexandria, reports, that before his departure, three Turkish Men of War, and three Merchant Ships laden with Provisions, sailed from thence for Constantinople, and that about the same time four other Turkish Ships arrived there to lade Corn for the Morea.

Venice, Febr. 9. Prince Maximilian of Brunswick, General of the Forces of the Republick, arrived here this week with Signior Alessandro Berengani, Governor Extraordinary of the Galeasces, and several other Noble Venetians from the Levant, whither they intend to return after the Carnival. We have an account that the Troops of the Milaneze have, in pursuance of the Treaty the Count de Melgar has made with this State, begun their march, consisting in 3000 Foot, and 500 Dragoons. In the mean time Vessels are preparing here to transport these and the other Auxiliary Troops, that are daily expected at the Lido, to the Fleet. By a Vessel arrived from the Morea, we are informed that a very considerable number of

Greeks and Mainotes have of late put themselves into the Service of the Republick, and that the Governor of Corow was forming them into Regiments, according to the Orders he had received from the Captain General. We have advice from the Levant, that 8000 Arabs were in Arms about Aleppo and Damascus, the Bissas of those places not being strong enough to suppress them, or to hinder the Ravages they commit within their Governments. The Letters from Rome of the 2d Instant tell us, that the Pope was perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, but had not however yet given any Publick Audiences.

Warsaw, Jan. 29. We have Advice from the Frontiers, that the Sieur Mohila, General of the Cossacks in the service of this Crown, being informed that 3000 Tartars were drawn together near Caminiec, with a design to make an Incurision into the Polish Territories, he marched with his Cossacks, and a Detachment of Poles, which the Crown General had sent to his assistance, and falling upon the Tartars, entirely routed them, the greatest part of them being slain upon the place. Several Officers are come hither to raise their Recruits, which they are to have complete by the 12th of May, the King intending to be in the Field before the end of that month. The Pope's Nuncio has employed the 50000 Florins that were lately remitted to him from Rome, towards the carrying on the Preparations for the Campaign, and has assured his Majesty that the Pope will farther assist him with considerable Supplies. The Palatinates of this Kingdom which have been freed from Winter-quarters, have, in lieu thereof, been obliged to give a Sum of Money which has been distributed among the Troops. The last Letters from Zolkiew said there was a report of a private Treaty between the Tartars and the Moscovites.

Vienna, Febr. 10. The differences are adjusted with the Deputies of Transylvania concerning the Winter-quarters which the Imperial Troops have taken in that Country; but as to the Alliance which has been proposed to them against the Turks, it's said they alledge, that it is not yet time for Prince Abafsi openly to declare against the Ottoman Port, seeing the Turks are possessed of all the Frontier places of that Country, which they can therefore when they please plunder and burn; however it's believed that the news of Teckeley's Liberty, and his being declared Prince of Transylvania, will make Prince Abafsi take other Resolutions. The Elector of Saxony will not, we are assured, command in Person the Forces which he is to send to the Emperor's assistance; They

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are to be 6000 Men, who, as we are told from *Dresden*, will begin their march as soon as the Emperor desires it. This week a considerable Sum of Money was brought hither from *Bohemia*, of the Contributions that have been raised upon the Clergy of that Kingdom, part of which was immediately paid to some Officers who had not yet received all their Money for their Recruits, and the rest was ordered to be sent to General *Caprara*, for the Service of the Imperial Forces in *Upper Hungary*. The last Letters from thence told us, that the Garison of *Montatz*, which, though the place is very small, consists, it's said, in 3000 Men, being encouraged by the promises they have from Count *Terkeley* of a speedy Relief, have made several Sallics upon the Imperial Troops that block up that Fortrela, upon which General *Caprara* has sent a Detachment to reinforce them. We have advice that the Grand Signior has resolv'd to send a solemn Embassy to the Emperor with new Proposals of Peace; And that these Ambassadors are very suddenly expected at *Buda*, where they are to stay till they have the necessary Passports from this Court, but it needs a Confirmation. The Conference appointed to be held at *Nuremberg* in *March* between the Ministers of several Princes of the Empire, is put off till the month following, at which the Count *de Hobenloe* is to assist on the part of the Emperor. The Electoral Prince Palatin intends to pass the Car naval here.

Ratisbonne, Febr. 14. Great preparations are making for the Campaign in *Hungary*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is obliged by the late Treaty he has made with the Emperor, to assist his Imperial Majesty with 8000 Men, and the Elector of *Saxony* with 6000. The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* offers 4000, and the Elector of *Bavaria* will have a Body of 15 or 16000 Men of his own Troops in *Hungary* the next Summer, which he intends to command in Person: The Letters from *Hungary* say, the Imperialists are making preparations to attack *Agria*.

Berlin, Febr. 8. The Heer *Van Stille* is returned hither from the *Hague*, having received the first payment of the Arrears of Subsidies pursuant to the late Treaty concluded between our Elector, and the *States General*. His Electoral Highness has named the General Officers that are to command the 8000 Men with which he is to assist the Emperor, and we are assured that these Forces will begin their march some time the next Month. We are told that the Elector of *Saxony* intends very suddenly to make our Elector a visit at *Potsdam*, to confer with him about the present Juncture of Affairs. All the Letters from *Poland* assure us, That they will have the next Campaign a greater Army on that side, than they have yet had since this War.

Hague, Febr. 26. The Heer *Van Dieß*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has, since his late Return from *Cleves*, been several times in Conference with the Deputies of this State. The Letters from *Stockholm* of the 13th Instant tell us, that the Count *de Noßitz*, the Imperial Minister had made a Treaty with the King of *Sueden* for a Body of Men, which are to serve the next Campaign in *Hungary*.

Paris, Febr. 27. The King has been troubled for some days with the Gout in his Left Foot, but is at present pretty well again. We are told that a Squadron of Men of War is fitting out, to be commanded by the Count *d'Estree* Vice-Admiral of *France*; And that the Duke of *Mortemar* is to command the Gallies that are fitting at *Marseilles*.

The French Envoy at *Genoua* has demanded leave of that Senate to carry 4000 Measures of Corn through their Territories to *Pignero* and *Cazal* which they granted. Yesterday dyed here the Marechal *d'Estrevez*, in the 84th year of his Age.
