• HE 19th Inflant the private Council, composed of the Carniaal of Toledo, the Conde d'Oropef1, the Constable and Admiral of Castile, the Duke of Alva, and the Conde de Humanes, met again in the King's prefence, to finish the Broj-et they had before them, for the putting his Majeflies Revenues on another foot than they are at prefent. The Pope's Nuncio continues his offices for the compoling the difference about the Money taken out of the French Ship at the Groyne, with great hopes of fuccels. But as for the Inflances he has made in the name of his Holinefs, that the Gallies of this Kingdom, or at least part, of them may join the next Summer with those of Venice against the Turks, he has, it's faid, been answered, that the King's Affairs will not permit him to fend his Gallies this year to the Levant. The Count de Melger has accepted of the Embally to Rome ; And the Conde de Fuenfalida will part from hence the next Month for Milan, to take polleffion of that Government. We have fresh Advices from the West-Indies, which fay, we may expect the Galcons in fome of the Ports of this Kingdom in May or June next at fartheft, and that their Lading will be about 26 Millions in Silver, and fix Millions in Merchandizcs.

Legborne, Febr. 2. The Master of a French Ship arrived in this Port in 21 days from Alexandria, reports, that before his departure, three Turkish Men of War, and three Merchant Ships laden with Provisions, lailed from thence for Constantinople, and that about the same time four other Turkish Ships arrived there to lade Corn for the Morea.

Venice, Febr. 9. Prince Maximilian of Brunf wicke, General of the Forces of the Republick, arrived here this week with Signior Alefandro Beregani, Governor Extraordinary of the Galeaffes, and feveral other Noble Venetians from the Levant, whither they intend to return after the Carnaval. We have an account that the Troops of the Milaneze have, in purfuance of the Treaty the Count de Melgar has made with this State, begun their march, confifting in 3000 Foot, and yoo Dragoons. In the mean time Veffels are preparing here to transport these and the other Auxiliary Troops, that are daily expected at the Lido, to the Fleet. By a Veffel arrived from the Morea, we are informed that a very confilerable number of

Greeks and Mainores have of late put themfelves into the Service of the Republick, and that the Governor of Coron was forming them into Regiments, according to the Orders he had received from the Captain General. We have advice from the Leuist, that 8000 Arabs were in Arms about Aleppo and Damafers, the Biffa's of those places not being throng enough to suppress them, or to hinder the Ravages they commit within their Guvernments. The Letters from Rome of the 2d Inflant tell us, that the Pope was perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, but had not however y t given any Publick Audiences.

Warfuw, Fan. 29. We have Advice from the Frontiers, that the Sieur Mohila, General of the Coffacks in the fervice of this Crown, being informed that 3000 Tartars were drawn together near Caminiee, with a defign to make an Incurfion into the Polish Territories, he marched with his Coffarks, and a Detachement of Poles, which the Crown General had fent to his affiftance, and falling upon the Tartars, entirely routed them, the greatest part of them being flain upon the place. Several Officers are come hither to raise their Recruits, which they are to have complete by the 12th of May, the King intending to be in the Field before the end of that month. The Pope's Nuncio has employed the 500000 Florins that were lately remitted to him from Rome, towards the carrying on the Preparations for the Campagne, and has allured his Majefty that the Pope will farther affilt him with confiderable Supplies. The Palatinates of this Kingdom which have been freed from Winter-quarters, have, in lieu thereof, been obliged to give a Sum of Money which has been distributed among the Troops. The last Letters from Zolkiew faid there was a report of a private Treaty between the Tartars and the Mofcovites.

Vienna, Febr. 10. The differences are adjusted with the Deputies of Translivania concerning the Winter-quarters which the Imperial Troops have taken in that Countrey; but as to the Alliance which has been proposed to them against the Turks, it's faid they alledge, that it is not yet time for-Prince Absfiti openly to declare against the Ottoman Port, feeing the Tarks are possified of all the Frontier places of that Country, which they can therefore when they please plunder and burn; however it's believed that the news of Teckeley's Liberty, and his being declared Prince of Translivania, will make Prince Abastit take other Reiolutions. The Elector of Saxony will not, we are assured, command in Person the Forces which he is to fend to the Emperor's affishance; They are

are to be 6000 Men, who, as we are told from Drefden, will begin their march as foon as the Emperor defires it. This week a confiderable Sum of Money was brought hither from Bobemie, of the Contributions that have been raifed upon the Clergy of that Kingdom, part of which was immediately paid to fome Officers who had not yet received all their Money for their Recruits, and the reft was ordered to be fent to General Caprara, for the Service of the Imperial Forces in Upper Hungary. The laft Letters from thence told us, that the Garifon of *Montgatz*, which, though the place is very fmall, confilts, it's faid, in 3000 Men, being encouraged by the promifes they have from Count Teckeley of a speedy Relief, have made feveral Sallies upon the Imperial Troops that block up that Fortres, upon which General Gaprara has fent a Detachement to reinforce them. We have advice that the Grand Signior has refolved to fend a folemn Embally to the Emperor with "new Propolals of Peace ; And that these Ambalfadors are very fuddenly expected at Buda, where they are to flay till they have the necessary Palsports from this Court, but it needs a Confirma-The Conference appointed to be held at tion. Nuremberg in March between the Ministers of feveral Princes of the Empire, is put off till the month following, at which the Count de Hobenloe is to affift on the part of the Emperor. The Electoral Prince Palatin intends to pass the Car naval here.

Ratubonne, Febr. 14: Great preparations are making for the Campagne in Hungary. The Elector of Brandenburgh is obliged by the late Treaty he has made with the Emperor, to affilt his Imperial Majelty with 8000 Men, and the Elector of Saxony with 6000. The Landtgrave of Heffe-Caffel offers 4000, and the Elector of Bavaria will have a Body of 15 or 16000 Men of his own Troops in Hungary the next Summer, which he intends to command in Perfoni The Letters from Hungary fay, the Imperialifts are making preparations to attack Agria.

Berlin, Febr. 8. The Heer Van Stilte is returned hither from the Hague, having received the first payment of the Arrears of Sublidics purfuant to the late Treaty concluded between our Elector, and the States General. His Electoral Highnels bas named the General Officers that are to command the 8000 Men with which he is to affift the Emperor, and we are affured that these Forces will begin their march fome time the next Month. Wc are told that the Elector of Saxony intends very fuddenly to make our Elector a visit at Polidam. to confer with him about the prefent Juncture of Affairs. All the Letters from Poland affure us, That they will have the next Campagne a greater Army on that fide, than they have yet had fince this Ŵar.

Hague, Febr. 26. The Heer Van Dieft, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburgh, has, fince his late Return from Cleves, been feveral times in Conference with the Deputies, of this State. The Letters from Stockbolme of the 13th Inftant tell us, that the Count de Noffitz, the Imperial Minifler had made a Treaty with the King of Sueden for a Body of Mea, which are to ferve the next Campagne in Hungary.

Paris, Febr. 27. The King has been troubled for fome days with the Gout in his Left Foot, but is at prefent pretty well again. We are told that a Squadron of Men of War is fitting out, to be commanded by the Count d'Efirée Vice-Admiral of France; And that the Duke of Mortemar is to command the Gallics that are fitting at Marfeilles. The French Envoy at Genoua has demanded leave of that Senate to carry 4000 Measures of Corn through their Territories to Pignerol and Cazal which they granted. Yesterday dyed here the Marcschal d'Estrades, in the 84th year of his Age.
