Severn Steam Tug Company.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application will be made to Parliament in the next session thereof, for leave to bring in a Bill for the following purposes, or some of them; namely:

1st. To incorporate a Company, and to transfer to that Company certain of the privileges granted by letters patent, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dated the twelfth day of October, in the thirteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, to Cornelius Bonell, Engineer, his executors, administrators, and assigns, "for the sole use of his invention of certain improvements in Rotatory Engines to be worked by Steam, or other means, and also in the construction of Carriages, Vessels, or other Vehicles to be worked or propelled by the said improvements in Rotatory Engines, or other Motive power, and for the Machinery to be connected therewith."

2. 4. And especially to lay down, make fast, and maintain any chains, ropes, and apparatus necessary for the use of the said invention in the River Severn, between the entrance lock of the Gloucester and Berkeley Canal, in the east branch of the said river at the city of Gloucester, and the town of Welshpool, in Montgomeryshire, and also between the said town and the entrance lock of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal, in the west branch of the said river near Gloucester, and for that purpose to enter into any agreements with the Commissioners or others having the controul of the said river within the limits aforesaid, and to make provision for the maintenance and protection of such chains, ropes, and apparatus, from injury or destruction.

Dewsbury Gas Act.

(Amendment of Act. Extension of Limits. Lighting streets. Increase of Capital.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session for an Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of the Dewsbury Gas Act, being an Act passed in the third year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for better lighting and supplying with gas the town and neighbourhood of Dewsbury, in the West Riding of the county of York," or otherwise to repeal the provisions of the said Act, and to make other provisions instead thereof.

And it is proposed by the said intended Act to make the limits thereof commensurate with the parish of Dewsbury and the township of Batley, in the parish of Batley, all in the West Riding of the county of York, and to confer upon the Company incorporated by the said Dewsbury Gas Act, or which may be incorporated by the said intended Act, all necessary powers for supplying gas within the said limits, or which may be necessary or proper for enabling them to lay down and construct mains, pipes, and other works for affording such supply of gas, and to confer upon the said Company and upon the trustees, surveyors, or other person or persons having the control, direction, or management of the several streets, roads, lanes, bridges, and other public passages and places, or any of them, within such parts of the said intended limits, as are not comprised within the limits of the said existing Act, all the powers, rights, authorities and privileges which are conferred by the 67th section of the said existing Act, upon the Company incorporated by such Act, and the trustees, surveyors, or other person or persons having the control, direction, or management of the several streets, roads, lanes, bridges, and other public passages and places, or any of them, within the limits of such Act, and to alter the highway and other rates within such parts as aforesaid of the said intended limits, so far as may be necessary to give full effect to the exercise of such powers, rights, authorities, and privileges.

And it is proposed by the said intended Act to authorise the Company incorporated by the said Dewsbury Gas Act, or which may be incorporated by the said intended Act, to raise by the creation of shares and by mortgage, further sums of money, and to attach certain privileges in respect of dividend, to all or any of the shares to be created by them, and to levy rates, rents, and charges within all or any part or parts of the said intended limits, and to alter the existing rates, rents, and charges, and to confer, vary, and extinguish exemptions from the payment of rates, rents, and charges, and to purchase lands and buildings by agreement for the purposes of their works, and it is also proposed to vary or extinguish all rights and privileges which would impede or interfere with carrying into full and complete effect the objects and purposes of the said intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

Rivers Thames and Medway Conservancy.
