Warfaw, Fan. 30. HE Council of War has, fince the beginning of this month, met several times in the presence of the King of Poland at Zolkiew, to direct the preparations for the Campagne, and in pursuance of the Refolutions there taken, Orders have been fent to the several Palatinates, and to the Officers comman ling the Forces of the Crown in their Winter-quarters, to have their Troops ready to take the Field in the beginning of May. The advices from the Ottoman Quarters fay, the Turks make their preparations for the Campagne with extraordinary diligence, that they may be in the Field as foon, if not before the Poles; That the Cham of Tarrary has promifed to join them with 50000 Men the next Summer; And that they have put both Men and Provisions into Caminiec, which place they think now sufficiently provided with all things pecessary for The Coffacks, in the Service of this its defence. Crown; have fent some of their Officers to Zolkiew, to sollicite the payment of the Sums of money that have been promiled them, that they may be able to put themselves into a condition to continue their Services; The Pope's Nuncio, its faid, has given them 50000 Florins, and has assured them that they shall have 50000 Florins more before they bogin the Campagne.

The Huffars of this place, Co-Raab, Febr. 17. morra, Gran, and Vefprin, having joined together to the number of about 800 Men, made lately an Incursion into the Turkish Territories, towards the Bridge of Effecke, from whence they returned with 600 head of Cattle, and 60 Prisoners, notwithflanding they passed between Buda and Alba-Regalia. The Prisoners report, that the Turks have quite repaired that part of the Bridge of Effecke which the Imperialifts burnt the last year, and that there are polled 6000 Men for the guard

Vienna, Pebr. 28. A Treaty is at last concluded with the Transituanian Deputies, the chief Arricles of it are; That the Principality of Transituania shall be under the Emperor's Protection; That Prince Abafti, and his lawful Heirs, shall be confirmed in the Hereditary Succession thereof; And the States in all their Rights and Priviledges. confideration of which, they promife to pay to his Imperial Majesty yearly 100000 Crowns, and 100000 Measures of Wheat, and the same quantity of Oats, for the sublistence of his Troops. The Letters from Zolnocke of the 15th, and from Cafchaw of the 17th Instant, say, that the 4000 Turks which had advanced towards Gyula, were retired towards Lippa, and had repassed the River Maros, upon the News they had that General Garaffa was marching towards them with 6000 M.n. That General Caprara had reinforced the Blockade of

the Sieur Huffant General of Battalia; And was preparing a Train of Artillery, in order to attack that place, which, we are told, he intends to do in the beginning of the next Mouth, They write from Gran, that 1000 Turks are arrived at Buda, from the Bridge of Ellecke; And that the Viner of that place had fent a Detachement to Agria, to reinforce the Garifon there, which, it's faid, confifts at present in 4000 Men. The City of Debrecen, upon the first News of Teckeley's arrival at Waradin, made some difficulty to pay their Contributions to the Imperialists, but have since continued their Payments as before; It's faid, that some Hungarians that were quartered there, a e gone back to Teckeley; And that some others who attempted it, have been taken by the Imperialists. By a Courier arrived this afternoon from . Hungary, we have advice, that General Caraffa having with the Troops under his Command attacked the Fortress of Sr, Feb, a Body of Turks commanded by Teckeley and a Bassa, endeavoured to relieve it, but were so vigorously received by the Imperialists, that they were forced to retire with confiderable loss; after which, the said Cassle was surrendred to General Carafa upon Articles.

Berlin, March 2. The great Chancellor of Po-France; His business at this Court is, to demand succors against the Turks. The Troops our Elector is to fend to the Emperor's affiliance, will certainly begin their march before the end of this month; The Sieur Granken is gone to Fienna, to make the necessary Provision for them.

Cologne, March 9. The 5th Instant dyed here the Prince of Mourbach, after a long Sickness; He was Great Master and Chamberlain to the Elector of Cologne, and Prevolt of the Cathedral Churchi of this City. The Bishop of Straburgh, who is at present at the Court of France, will, it's not doubted, upon the News of the death of his Nephew, hasten his return hither. The Imperial Commissioners have this week examined some of the chief of those that are now Prisoners here, and particularly the late Secretary Fuden, whose Process they have ordered to be made. The Hopsey Gulicke lived in is demolithing, and upon the Rulnes of it will be erected a Pillar, with an Inscription, shewing his Crime and Punishments We are told from Dufeldorpe, that the Electoral Prince Palath is expected there the 20th inflant. from Vienna, to be present at the Assembly of their States of that Countrey, which are appointed to meet the 25th. After they are separated, it's believed his Highness will return to Heydelberg, and from thence to Flenna. The Letters from Base of the 4th instant tell us, that the 13 Suisse Cantons have at their General Dyet at Baden, promised mutually to affift each other, in case any of them be attacked upon any Pretence whatever. And that Mongatz with 4000 Men, under the Command of the Cantons of Zurick, Beine, Bafel and Schaf

Shansen, were kinding several Thousand Men to Geneva, for the defence of that City in case of

Hague, March 12. Her Royal Highness parted from lience yesterday for Dieren, whither the Prince went on Thursday last. Prince Waldecke is gone to his house at Culembourgh: And Lieurenant General Spaen will return the next week to Cleves. Four Men of War are fitting at Amsterdam, one at Rotterdam, and one in Zealand, which are designed for the Streights, under the command of the Count de Stirum. We are told that the Magistrates of Hamburgh have written to this State, and to leveral Princes of the Empire, in Answer to the Letters they had received from them, to thank them for their offered Mediation, and to declare their readiness to accept of the fame, and to agree to a Conference, in order to compole amicably the Differences depending be-tween the Duke of Zell, and their City, so soon as the faid Duke shall have withdrawn his Troops out of their Territories. The Marquis de Castel Moneayo, the Spanish Envoy, is gone to Amsterdam, where he intends to stay a few days, after which he will return hither, and take his leave of the States General. The Heer Worff having presented a Memorial concerning some Disputes aright, about the City of Liegs and that of Maestrick, about their respective jurisdictions, an America been given him thereunto by Order of the States General. The Letters from Vienna tell us, that a Treaty was concluded with the Envoys from Tranfluinia, by which Prince Abafii, and the States of that Countrey, do accept of the Emperor's Protection, and promise in consideration thereof a yearly Tribute; And that General Garaffa had taken the Cassie of St. Job, having first deseated 1500 Turks who came to the Relief of it under the

Command of Count Teckeley, Bruffels, March 12, Out Governor General, who went the 6th Instant to Malines, and from thence to Answerp, to settle the payment of the Billshe received by the last Courier from Madrid, returned hither the 9th, and parted again this Evening for Flanders, intending to be to morrow if the Afternoon at Oftend, to see a new Ship of 60 Guns launched there; In his return, his Excel, lency will stay one day at Bruges, and two at Gaunt, and is expected back, here in the beginning of the next week. that the Gallies that are fitting out at Marfeilles will be commanded by the Duke of Mortemar, and that with these will join Seven or Eight men of War from Toulon; And that the Mareschal d'Estree is to command in the Ocean a Squadron of 12 men of War; whereof Six are fitting at Breft, Four at Rochefore, and Two at Havre de Grace. We are told from Cob entz, that 1500 Men are daily at work to fortify the Caffle of Herenbresteyn, which belongs to the Elector of Trier, and that the Garilon has been lately reinforced with 200 The Letters from Vienna of the 28th of the last month tell us, that a Treaty was concluded with the Transitvanian Deputies, by which, Prince Abafti and the States of that Countrey, have put themselves under the Emperor's protection, and have promifed to pay yearly for the sublistence of the Imperial Troops, that inall have their Winter-quarters on that side, 100000 Crowns in mony, and 200000 Measures of Corn. The advices from Upper Hungary say, that the Inhabitants of Debrecen being informed of Teckeleys arrival ac Great Waradin, had refused to pay their Contributions according to the Agreem nt they had made with the Imperialists, but that understanding of eiward that Teckeley was mot strong enough to proteat them, they had taken other Resolutions. That General Caraffa having attacked St. Fob, Teckeley with 1500 Men endeavored to succor it, but was beasen back by the Imperialists, who having afterwards with their Bombs for the Magazine within the place on Fire, the Turks were obliged to capitul lare, and marching out 600 firong, were conducted to Great Waradin.

Park, March 13.
