He ill successes of the Ottoman Arms during the last Campagne in Hungary have caused a great change at the Court of the Grand Signior. So food as he heard of the defeat of his Army near Gran by the Duke of Lorrain, of the taking of Newbeusel, and the burning of part of the Bridge of Effect, he condemned Cheitan Ibrahim Bacha Serajkier, or General of his Forces in Hungary, to lose his Head; His fignal services in the former Wars against the Crown of Poland, and particularly that performed by him the last year in Hungary, in supporting the City of Buda a-gainst the Imperial its who besieged it, might have prevailed with the Grand Signfor to spare his life, had he not been likewise accused of having discontented the Troops under his Command, in keeping their Pay from them. So an Officer was sent to Hungary, with Orders to bring his Head to Adrizaople, and the Heads of the chief Officers of the Army who were accused of not having behaved themselves as they ought in the battle of Gran. The Grand Visier Kara Ibrahim Bacha proposed afterwards to the Grand Signior Soliman Bacha, who Command ed the last year against the Poles, as a very sit person to be Seraskier of his F rees in Hungary the next Campigne; The Grand Signior approved of him, and Orders were fent to him to repair to Courr, and that he might come thither with the greater latisfaction, the Grand Viller writ to him, that the Grand Signior, in confideration of his Services, intended to reffore him to the place of Caimsken, from which he was removed about two years ago. Solyman Bacha at his arrival at Adrianople was much surprized, when the Grand Visier declared to him, that he was named by the Grand Signior to Command his Forces in Hungary the next Campagne, but dissembled his discontent, till he had an opportunity to prefent himfelf before the Grand Signior, as if were to receive his Orders before his departure, when casting himself at his Feet, be humbly prayed to be excused from so difficult an Employment, in which he could not hope his Services would have any fuccess, and took the liberty to fay, that foresceing from the present state of Asfairs, that the Campagne would end with the loss of his Head, he prayed the Grand Signior rather to cause himto be now put to death, than to fend him to Hungary. The Grand Signlor Com-manded him to declare the Reasons he had to refuse the Command of his Armies; which he did very particularly. He represented, that the ill fuccess of the last Campagne came from thence, that the Troops were not paid, and that the Grand Visier had failed in many things of great importance to his Schwice. At last he offered to

take upon him the Command in Hungary, If the Grand Signior would himselfgo thither and appear at the head of his Forces, as the Sultans his Predecessors had some This Discourse had such an effect upon the Grand Signiot, that he sent to the Grand Visier who kept his Bed under p. etence of being indisposed, to know whether he was in a condition to make the Campagne in Hundry whether He intended to be in person. The gary, whither He intended to go in person. The Grand Viller exculed himfelf in regard of the ill flace of his Health; Whereupon the Grand Signior related to Depole him; and ordered solyman Bacha to prefide in the Davan. Some days after the Grand Signior sent an Officer to the Grand Visier to demand of him the Scal, which is the mark of this First Dignity in the Ottoman Empire; The Grand Visier was at Table, who taking the Seal out of his Bolom, after having killed it, delivered it to the Offic-r, of whom he asked whether he had any other Orders, and understanding that he had not, and that his Life was grant. ed him, with part of his Estace, he dismissed most, of his Servants, and Ioon after parted himfelf from Adrianople, and is now at his House
on the Canal of the Black Sea hear to Sentaret. The Seal having been brought to the
Grand Signior, he immediately gave it to Solyman Bacha, and made him Grand Vizi r. It is faid, that at the receiving of it, He declared that he accepted this great Honor with hopes that the Grand Signior would march himself to Hungary at the Head of his Athry, which is however yet very uncertain. The new Grand Visies, was formerly Kiaia or Lieutenant to the Grand Visiter Caproli Oglu, and, it's faid, that he has sent for Mustapha Bacha Caproli, who is at \$cio, 10 give him some considerable Employment, as an acknowledgment of the kindness he received from his Brother. The Gallies and Ships of the Grand Signior's Fleet arrived here in the Beginning of December in a very ill condition, the Commanders put the Soldiers that were on Board the Ships into the Gallies, to make the accustomed Shuges as they passed by the Kiosque of the Grand Signior, which stands on the Water side, that so they might conteal their want of Men. Misser Ogli is declared Capitan Bacha, or Admiral of the Fleet, in the place of the Grand Signior's Son-in-law. The Sieur Girardin. Amballador from France, arri-ved here the 11th Inflant. The Grand Visis will part from Adrianople for Belgrade in the beginning of April; He has already paid the Spabi's all that was due to them.
