REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES, AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on the *Mondays previous* to the Levees on 26th February instant and 26th March next, and on the *Tuesday previous* to the Levee on 6th March next, on each day *before twelve o'clock*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having Petitions or Addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come) to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Mondays previous* to the Levees on 26th February instant and 26th March next, and on the *Tuesday previous* to the Levee on 6th March next; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to

Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

THIS day the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the city of Dublin, waited upon Her Majesty to present the following Address; which Her Majesty was graciously pleased to receive on the Throne:

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.  
The humble, loyal, and dutiful Address of the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Dublin.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects, representatives of the citizens of Dublin in Cor-

porate Council, having learned with alarm that it is the intention of your Majesty's Ministers to submit to Parliament a measure for the abolition of the office of Lord Lieutenant, approach your Majesty to implore, at the foot of the Throne, that your Majesty will be pleased to avert from us a measure, destructive of the property of the inhabitants of your loyal city of Dublin, and prejudicial to the interests of the entire country.

We feel that the abolition of the office would lead to the rapid decay and ruin of property created under its influence, but there are other grounds on which we object to this measure.

The Vice-Regal office is coeval with and continuous from the introduction of the English Monarchy into Ireland, as evidenced for centuries by the appointments of successive Chief Governors of Ireland by your Royal predecessors, and to our days by your Most Gracious Majesty, so that the office of a resident Chief Governor of Ireland forms part of the constitution under which we live.

We prize the institution of the office of Lord Lieutenant because it has been the connecting link between the Crown and the people of Ireland. Under it have the arts and sciences been fostered, civilization has progressed, and social improvements been advanced; moreover, the representative of Majesty once removed, no guarantee would then remain as to the judicious exercise of the executive authority in Ireland. The advantage of a residence among and personal communion with our people would be lost, while that wholesome public opinion which has been found so useful in a free country would be weakened and destroyed. Reiterating our unabated loyal and devoted attachment to your Majesty's Throne and Government,

We implore of your Majesty not to permit an interference with your Majesty's prerogative in the constitutional appointment of a Viceroy, or allow that office to be abolished in the reign of a sovereign who has ever manifested a deep interest for the welfare of Ireland, and the existence of which has been respected and continued by your Majesty's Royal predecessors, but rather let us indulge the hope that at some future period you may be graciously pleased to appoint one of the Royal Princes as your representative in Ireland, and thus unite more closely with your Royal family a people devotedly attached to your Majesty's Throne.

To which Address Her Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

"I receive with much gratification your expressions of loyal and devoted attachment to my Throne and Government.

"I gladly assure you of my warm and unabated interest in all that concerns the happiness and prosperity of my people in Ireland, and you may rely upon my giving full consideration to their wishes and feelings on a subject deeply involving the welfare of that part of the United Kingdom."

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the

"poll at county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for his Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace for the southern division of the county of Derby, in quarter sessions assembled, at Derby, in the said county, on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, representing that the number of polling places within the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that the town of Matlock may be a polling place for the said division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said first-mentioned Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said place named in the said petition, namely, the town of Matlock, shall be a polling place for the southern division of the county of Derby; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as in the said Act secondly above mentioned is mentioned, shall, conformably to that Act, divide the said southern division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power vested in the said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, in the words following, viz:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to

your Majesty that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Winkfield, Old Windsor, and Sunninghill, all in the county of Berks, and diocese of Oxford, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes of Winkfield, Old Windsor, and Sunninghill, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry, for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Cranbourne, in the said parish of Winkfield, under and by virtue of the power and authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the 'Church Building Acts,' or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that the same should be called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Cranbourne,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned :

"The boundary of the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne commences at New Lodge, the northern extremity of the parish of Winkfield, continuing south-eastwardly by the boundary line of the parishes of Winkfield and Bray, as far as Winkfield-place; thence continuing the same boundary, and also the boundaries between the parishes of Clewer and New Windsor on the east, and Winkfield on the west, including the whole of Cranbourne Wood, in the parish of Winkfield, and forming the north-east corner of that parish; thence following the boundary of Winkfield and Old Windsor on the west, and New Windsor on the east, as far as the south-west extremity of the latter parish; thence crossing the public road leading from Bray to New Windsor into and across certain fields, the property of Ann Cator, in the parish of Old Windsor, adjoining an old enclosure, in the parish of Winkfield, and numbered 564 on the enclosure award map of that parish, as far as the parish boundary; thence continuing by the boundary line between Winkfield on the south and Old Windsor on the north, in an easterly direction, as far as the north-east portion of the parish of Winkfield; thence southward continuing the said boundary line of the said parishes as far as Mill-hill, at the south-eastern extremity of Winkfield parish, thence taking the boundary line between the parishes of Winkfield and Sunninghill in a westerly direction as far as a certain fence adjoining properties known as 'The Stroud,' and being the southern boundary of a certain orchard, the property of G. H. Crutchley; thence in a south-westerly direction into the parish of Sunninghill through the property of G. H. Crutchley, taking as boundary the north-west fence of Sunninghill-park, as far as the lodge entrance near the northern extremity of Ascot Heath, including the said lodge within the boundary; thence northwards as far as the Cross-roads at the northern extremity of Ascot Heath; thence taking the centre of road from Windsor to Bagshot as far as the south-west corner of Ascot Heath; thence continuing west along the centre of the Wokingham and Sunninghill turnpike-roads, crossing the boundary line of the Sunninghill and Winkfield parishes, into the southern division of the latter parish; thence taking a fence in a northerly direction, and being the boundary of allotments Nos. 1353 on the east, and 1354 on the west, continuing north by boundary of allotments Nos. 1358, 1359, 1360, and 1361 on the east, and on the west by similar allotments, Nos. 1355, 1356, and

1357; thence eastward, by boundary of allotments Nos. 1363 (a) on the north, and 1361 on the south; thence north, between allotments Nos. 1363 (a) on the west, and 1363 on the east, into a private road, numbered on the said map 13, and thence in a north-easterly direction by a fence between the allotments Nos. 1327 on the north-west, and 1328 and 1328 (a) on the south, into the road leading from Winkfield-row to Sunninghill; thence north, across the said allotment No. 1327, up a green ride to the Winkfield Row-road, opposite the south lodge entrance to Winkfield-place; thence in a north-easterly direction as far as the Sunninghill parish boundary; thence west, along a certain watercourse, as far as a fence, running northwards by the said fence, being the boundary between an old enclosure, No. 685, and allotment No. 1246; thence by a fence being the boundary on the north and north-east of old enclosures Nos. 645, 646, 664, 665, 673, 674, and 675, and on the south and south-west, by old enclosures Nos. 685 and 676 (a) reaching the Windsor and Wokingham roads, near Plaistow Green; thence west, along the centre of the said road, as far as a certain occupation road, No. 3, on the said inclosure award map, to the north-west extremity of such occupation road, continuing in the same direction as far as a certain parish drain or brook, continuing by the same southwards through allotment No. 1108; thence west, between allotments Nos. 1105 on the south, and 1108 and an old enclosure, No. 204, on the north; thence north, between old enclosure, No. 204 on the east, and 218 on the west; thence west, between allotment No. 205 on the north and an old enclosure, No. 218, on the south; thence north, between allotments Nos. 205 and 206 on the east and old enclosures, Nos. 216 and 217 on the west; thence northwards, between old enclosures, Nos. 206 and 211, on the east and Nos. 213, 215, and 216 on the west; thence west, by a fence dividing old enclosures No. 212 on the north and Nos. 213 and 214 on the south, as far as Winkfield-lane; thence, in a north-easterly direction, along the centre of road to the corner of Couch-lane; thence north-west, along the centre of old enclosure No. 149 to the western extremity of that enclosure; thence north-west, by the boundaries of old enclosures, Nos. 151 and 152, on the north, and No. 143 on the south; thence, north-east, along a certain fence, being the boundary between old enclosures, Nos. 152, 153, 75, 63, and 61 on the east, and on the west by Nos. 85, 56, 57, 58, 60 and 59, as far as the northern boundary of the said parish of Winkfield; thence east, following the parish boundary between the parishes of Winkfield and Bray, including the new lodge farm-house in such boundary, and as such consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured yellow, pink, and blue.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, of the Very Reverend Henry Parr Hamilton, Master of Arts, Dean of the cathedral church of Saint Mary the Virgin, at Salisbury, and the Chapter of the same church (patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Winkfield), of the Right Honourable Thomas, Baron Truro, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (patron in right of the Crown of the parish church of the said parish of Old Windsor), and of the Master, Fellows and Scholars of the college of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge (patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Sunninghill), have been severally obtained to the formation

of the said consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, as required by the Act and Section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford and Thomas, Baron Truro, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, have signed and sealed this representation, the said Dean and Chapter have hereto affixed their common or capitular seal, and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars have hereto affixed their common or college seal.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it has been mutually agreed between the said Dean and Chapter, Thomas, Baron Truro, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars (as such respective patrons of the said parish churches of Winkfield, Old Windsor, and Sunninghill, testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford, testified as aforesaid, that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Peter, at Cranbourne aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford, and by his successors, bishops of the said diocese of Oxford, for ever:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into a consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church and consolidated chapelry be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in the said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of February 1851, in the words following, that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Fletching

and Horsted Keynes, in the county of Sussex, and within the diocese of Chichester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Dane Hill, in the said parish of Fletching, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners, by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The consolidated chapelry of 'Dane Hill,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned.

"The boundary of the consolidated chapelry of Dane Hill commences at the northernmost point of the said parish of Fletching, and proceeds in a southerly direction along the boundary of that parish until it crosses a brook called Annewood Brook, along the western side of which brook the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry will then proceed southerly to the lake in Sheffield Forest, and continuing along the western margin of that lake to the bottom of it, when the boundary will then turn in a westerly direction and proceed up a lane called Sheffield Mill-lane, leading from the said lake to the turnpike-road from Lewes to East Grinstead, which road it crosses and proceeds along another lane, called Sliders-lane, in a westerly and south-westerly direction, and enters into another lane, called Ketches-lane, leading from Fletching to Lindfield, up which said latter lane it then proceeds north-westerly to a brook forming the boundary of the said parish of Fletching, then following this boundary north-easterly along the brook to a farm called Kitburrow, in the parish of Horsted Keynes, the southern boundary of which farm it proceeds along, following the hedge-rows westerly of the fields numbered 155, and northerly and north-westerly of fields numbered 155, 161, 163, and 164, in the parish map of Horsted Keynes, until it reaches the lane leading from Freshfield to Dane Hill, up which lane it proceeds north-easterly into another lane leading by Latchetts Farmhouse, then up the latter lane in a northerly direction until it comes to a brook called Danehill Brook, and north-easterly along that brook up to the point where the brook crosses the boundary of the said parish of Fletching, it then leaves the brook and follows the boundary of the said parish of Fletching up to its northernmost point where the boundary of the said consolidated chapelry of Dane Hill commenced, which is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink and blue.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, of the Right Honourable George Augustus Frederick Charles Earl of Sheffield, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Fletching, and Thomas Austen, of Kippington, near Sevenoaks, in the county of Kent, Esquire, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Horsted Keynes, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Dane Hill, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore-mentioned, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it has been mutually agreed between the said George Augustus Frederick Charles Earl of Sheffield and Thomas Austen, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter-mentioned, and also of the said Ashhurst Turner, bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, testified as aforesaid, that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Dane Hill aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the said George Augustus Frederick Charles Earl of Sheffield, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into a consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is hereby pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Pinchbeck, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district

should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Bartholomew, situate at West Pinchbeck, in the said parish of Pinchbeck, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also under and by virtue of the power and authority contained in the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be called 'The District Chapelry of West Pinchbeck,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

ried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

**Manchester and Salford Education Bill.—  
Session 1851.**

(Providing for the formation of School Districts and the Establishment and Management of Schools, authorising the Levying of Rates and the making of Bye-laws).

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the present session, for an Act to promote education in the municipal boroughs of Manchester and Salford, and for such purpose to constitute the said municipal boroughs, or some part or parts thereof respectively, school districts; and to



provide for the election of school committees for such districts respectively, and for the appointment and remuneration of secretaries and other officers; and also to empower such school district committees to make bye-laws and special regulations affecting the schools within their districts, or otherwise, for carrying the purposes of the intended Act into effect.

And it is also proposed by the said intended Act, to provide for the admission of existing schools into union with the said district committees, and for the appointment, in certain cases, of new school committees or managers of such schools, and also to declare schools in union with the said district committees to be free schools; to prescribe and regulate the terms of union, and in the case of certain children to require their attendance at such schools.

And it is further proposed by the said intended Act to make provision for bringing unoccupied school rooms into use—for assisting in the repair of school rooms—for defraying the salaries of teachers and other expenses connected with the schools—for affording additional school accommodation in necessitous places—for regulating the appointment of committees of management, and the election, removal, and remuneration of teachers, and for the examination of the scholars.

And it is also proposed by the said intended Act to provide for the annexation, for the purposes of the said Act, to the said municipal boroughs or either of them, or some part or parts thereof respectively, of any contiguous township or townships, and to authorise the imposition of rates for the purposes of the said Act, on any township or townships so annexed; and all such other provisions will be inserted in the said intended Act as may be requisite or advisable for the promotion of education in the said municipal boroughs, or for otherwise carrying the objects and purposes of the said intended Act into effect.

**ART. 2.** That every person appointed to the office of vestry clerk in the said parish shall give to the guardians of the poor of the Holbeach Union, in the county of Lincoln, a bond, in the penal sum of one hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent.

Provided that the guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any poor law officer.

**ART. 3.** That the auditor of the district comprising the said union shall, in the statement required by the general order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said union, include the name of the vestry clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority hereof, together with the particulars in the said general order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

**ART. 4.** That a copy of this order shall be published in the London Gazette.
