A Proclamation of the King's Majesties most Gracious and General Pardon.

JAMES R.

W Hereas soon after Our Coronation, We had given Order for preparing of a Bill, containing Our most Gracious, General, and Free Pardon to Our Loving Subjects; with Intention to have passed the same into an Act in the first Session of Our Parliament, but were unhappily prevented therein by the late most unnatural Rebellion, which, since it hath pleased Almighty God by His Blessing upon Our Arms to suppress, We have thought fit to renew Our Princely Intentions of Grace and Mercy to Our Subjects, especially considering the steadfast Loyalty of the far greater number of Our Subjects, who continued firm in their Obedience to Us notwithstanding that Rebellion: And being persuaded that many of those who joined themselves in that Rebellion being poor Labourers and Handicraftsmen, were drawn and seduced thereto by the subtle and crafty Insinuations of some ill-disposed Persons of greater Note and Quality than themselves, and not from their Own Evil Rancour of Mind and Traiterous Aversion to Us or Our Government, whose Condition We in Our Princely Clemency commiserating; And to the end their Fears and Despair of Our Mercy may not betray them to Evil and Lewd Courses of Life, but that they may with safety return to their Obedience to Us, and to their former Habitations, Labours, and Employments. And that the Minds of other Our Subjects may be quieted, and that all Fears and Jealousies which may concern their Curiosity for any matter since Our Reign, or in the Reign of Our late Dear y beloved Brother, be removed and wholly taken away, as much as in Us lies, We of Our especial Grace and Tenderness to Our People, do hereby Publish and Declare this Our most Royal and Gracious Pardon; And We do hereby for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, Pardon, Acquit, Release and Discharge all and every Our Subjects (except Bodies Politick and Incorporate, and such other Persons who shall be herein or hereby excepted) of this Our Realm of England, Dominion of Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, their Heirs, Executors and Administrators, them and every of them against Us, Our Heirs and Successors, of, and from all manner of Treasons, Felonies, Misprisons of Treason or Felony, Treasonable or Seditious Words or Libels, Seditious and unlawful Meetings and Conventicles, all Offences whereby any Person may be Charged with the Penalty and Danger of Præmunire; All Riots, Routs, Offences, Contempts, Trespasses, and Misdemeanours and all Judgments and Convictions for not coming to Church, and of and from the Forfeitures and Penalties for the same, or any of them heretofore had, committed or done, except as herein or hereby after is excepted. And Our Will and Pleasure is, That neither Our said Subjects nor any of them, nor the Heirs, Executors, or Administrators of any of them, be, or shall be sued, vexed or disquieted in their Bodies, Goods or Chattels, Lands or Tenements, for any manner of Matter, Cause, Contempt, Misdemeanour, Forfeiture, Offence, or any other thing heretofore suffered, done, or committed or omitted against Us or Our late Brother, His or Our Crown, Dignity, Prerogative, Laws or Statutes, and not herein or hereby after excepted. And that this Our Grant of General Pardon, by the general Words, Clauses and Sentences before rehearsed, shall be reputed, deemed, adjudged, expounded, allowed and taken in all manner of Our Courts and elsewhere, most beneficially and liberally for Our said Subjects, thereby Pardoned in all things not hereafter excepted, as if their particular Persons and Crimes had herein been at large and fully expressed.

Excepted and always foreprized out of this Our Pardon, all Treasons Committed or Done in the Parts beyond the Seas, or in any other Place out of this Realm; And also Excepted all Offences in Forging or False Counterfeiting the Great or Privy Seal, Sign Manual, or Privy Signet, or any of Our Monies Currant within this Our Realm, or of unlawful Diminution of any of the said Monies by any ways or means whatsoever, and all Abetting, Aiding, Comforting, or Procuring the said Offences, or any of them.

And also Excepted all voluntary Murders, Petty Treasons, Wifful Poisonings, and all Offences of being accessory to the same, or any of them before the Fact committed; And also all Piracies and Robberies committed upon the Sea, Robberies upon the High ways, Burglaries, Houses, and all Offences of being Accessary to the said Offences, or any of them.

And also Excepted the detestable and abominable Vice of Buggery committed with Man or Beast; All Rape and Carnal Ravishments of Women. All Ravishments and Wilful taking away or Marring of any Maid, Widow or Damel against her will, or without the Consent or Agreement of her Parents, or of such as then had her in Custody, an all Offences of Aiding, Comforting, Abetting, or Procuring the said Offences, or any of them.

And also Excepted, all Offences of Perjury, Subornation of Witnesses, Razing, Forging or Counterfeiting in Deeds, Escrips, Inquisitions, Indentures of Appraisment or other Writings or Publishing the same, Forging or Counterfeiting any Examinations or Testimonies of any Witness or Witnes remaining to bring any Person or Persons into danger of his Life, and all Procuring and Counselling of any of the said Offences.

And also Except, all Treasons, Offences, Misdemeanour and Contempts, other then such for which Judgment of Præmunire hath or may be given or for not coming to Church, of, and for which any Indictments, Actions, Bill Plaint or Information, or other Process at any time within six years last past, hath been commenced, sued or depended in any of his Majesties Courts at Westminster, or other His Majesties Courts of Record held within the Cities of London and Westminster, and County of Middlesex, and is there depending or remaining to be prosecuted, or whereupon any Verdict, Judgment, Outlawry, or Decree is already given, Awarded or Entered, and all Fines, Forfeitures and Penalties thereupon now due or accrued, or which shall or may be due, accrue, or grow to the Kings Majesty, and all Executions for the same.

And also Except, all Informations and all Proceedings concerning High-ways and Bridges, or for Repairing County Goals, and all Fines and Issues set or Returned thereupon since the year One thousand six hundred seventy nine.

And also Except, all Offences in taking away, imbezzelling, or purloining any Goods, Money, Chattels, Jewels, Armour, Munition, Stores, Naval Provisions, Shipping Ordnance, or other Placiments of War belonging to Us or Our late Brother.

And also Except, all Offences of Incest, Dilapidations, or Simony.

And also Except, all Contempts and Process thereupon issuing in or out of any Court of Equity.

And also Except, all Recognizances, Conditions, and Covenants, and all Penalties, Titles, and Forfeitures of Offices, Conditions, or Covenants forfeited, accrued, or grown to Us, or to Our late Brother, by reason of the Breach or not performing of any Office, Covenant, or Condition whatsoever.

Also Excepted all Concealments, Frauds, Corruptions Misdemeanours, and Offences whereby We or Our late Brother

that had been decreed in the Collection, Payments, or Assignments of Our Revenues, or any part thereof, or any other Monies due to Us or received for Us or Lim, and all Forfeitures, Penalties, and Nomine penalties thereupon arising.

Provided always, That nothing in this Our Pardon contained shall extend or be construed to discharge any Fines, Sums of Money recovered by Judgment, Fines, pro Licentia concordandi Feoff Fines Issues, or Amerciaments lost, imposed, or assessed, set or entred, in any Court of Record whatsoever.

And also Except all Persons who are as to any pains, penalties, or disabilities whatsoever Excepted out of the Act of Free and General Pardon, Indemnity, and Oblivion, made in the Twelfth Year of Our late Brothers Reign, and also out of any other Act of Free and General Pardon since that time.

Excepted also all Persons who after Conviction or Attainder of or for any manner of Treason, or Misprisons of Treasons have been Transported, and such Attainted of other notorious Crimes or Felonies have been Ordered or Directed to be Transported into any of Our Foreign Plantations.

Except also all and every Person and Persons who in a Traiterous and Hostile manner Invaded this Our Realm with James Scott late Duke of Monmouth, and all and every other person or persons who in the time of the late Rebellion under the said late Duke of Monmouth were Officers or had the Name or Repute of being Officers in his Army.

Except also all Fugitives and persons fled from Our Justice into parts beyond the Seas or out of this Our Realm who shall not return and render themselves to Our Chief Justice or some Justice of the Peace before the Nine and twentieth Day of September next ensuing.

And also Excepted out of this Our Pardon the Persons hereafter particularly mentioned, viz. Provided that no Process of Utлары at the Suit of any person Plaintiff, shall be, by virtue of this Our Pardon stayed or avoided, unless the Defendant appear and put in Bail, where by Law Bail is necessary, and take forth a Writ of Scire facias against the Party at whose Suit he was Outlawed. And that this Our Pardon be not allowed to Discharge any Outlawry after Judgment, till Satisfaction or Agreement be made to or with the Party at whose Suit the Utлары was obtained. And Our Will and Pleas is, That this present Pardon shall be of as good Force and effect to Pardon and Discharge all and singular the Premises above mentioned, and intended to be Pardoned and Discharged, as if We should by Letters Patents under the Great Seal have Granted particular Pardons to every one of Our Subjects. And for the better manifestation of Our Gracious Intentions and Desire herein, We do give leave that any of Our Subjects not herein Excepted, may take and Sue out Our particular Pardon, pursuant to the Tenor hereof. And for that purpose We shall Direct Our Secretaries of State to present Warrants to Us for Our Signature, and give Order to Our Attorney General or Solicitor, to prepare Bills for passing Pardons to such as shall desire the same. Provided always, That this Our General Pardon shall not extend to any person that were in actual Arms against Us in the late Rebellion in the West, who, being now within this Realm, shall notwithstanding Three Months after the Publication hereof, lay bold of this Our Pardon, and Testifie the same by their peaceable returning to their former Habitations, Labours and Employments.

Warsaw, Febr. 1. The Palatin of *Poznanis*, chief of the Embassy to the Czars of *Moscovy*, has given the King an account of his arrival on the Frontiers, and that the advices he had receiv'd from *Moscow*, seem'd to promise a good success in his Negotiation at that Court. The King has named the Bishop of *Chehm* to go his Ambassador to the Pope. The Express that arriv'd lately from *Persia*, will be sent back with a Letter from the King of *Poland* to the Sophy, to confirm him in his Resolution of making War upon the *Turks*. The Letters from *Lemberg* tell us, that the *Turks* do draw together a great Body of Men on the Frontiers of this Kingdom, which obliges the Forces of the Crown to be upon their Guard.

Milan, Febr. 20. Our Governor the Count de *Melgar* having taken a review of the Troops in the Service of this Duchy, has Reformed Twelve *Spanish* and Three *German* Companies of Foot, and Four Troops of Horse; It was thought there would have been more Troops broken, according to the Orders that came lately from *Spain*, but his Excellency has thought fit to leave it to the Count de *Fuenfiliada* his Successor to finish this Reform.

Genova, Febr. 28. The Count de *Fuenfiliada* the new Governor of *Milan* is expected here from *Sardinia* the beginning of the next Month; during his stay in this City he will be lodged in the Palace of Prince *Doria*. Captain *Caratino* is fitting out the Ship he has bought of this Republick, with all the diligence imaginable; she will carry 60 pieces of Cannon, and will be ready to sail in a very short time. By a Vessel arriv'd in this Port from *Civita Vecchia* we are inform'd, that the Pope's Gallies design'd for the assistance of the *Venetians*, would be by the middle of the next Month in a condition to part from thence for the *Levant*, and that his Holiness had resolv'd to send a greater number of Land Forces on the said Gallies this year than he did the last. The Gallies of the Great Duke of *Tuscany* are likewise fitting with great diligence at *Leghorne*; they are design'd for the same Service, and will it's believed be ready to sail about the same time.

Venice, March 4. A great Convoy is preparing of above 30 Ships, which will be ready to sail the next week to joyn the Fleet, which according to our last advices was still at *Corfu*. Captain-General *Morosini* has written to the Senate that he intends to open the Campaign before the end of this Month, and therefore prays that the Troops and Provisions, which he expects, may be hasten'd to him. We have advice that the *Bacha* of *Lepanto* has reinforced the Garrison of *Navarino*, apprehending the *Venetians* have a design upon that place.

Vienna, March 3. The Sieur *Grunckow*, Commissary-General of the Forces which the Elector of *Brandenburg* is to send to the Emperor's assistance, arriv'd here the 28th. past; he has assur'd the Imperial Ministers that the said Forces will begin their March the 20th. of this Month. A Commissary is likewise come hither from *Dresden*, as well to regulate all Matters concerning the March of the Troops of *Saxony*, as to provide Magazines for them in *Hungary*. A great many Boats

pass daily down the *Danube* laden with all sorts of Ammunition and Provisions; and the Recruits arrive here in considerable Bodies, who after having refresh'd themselves, are sent for *Hungary*. Several Ingenieurs, and a great number of Gunneers and Miners, who came from *Moravia*, have been sent to *Raab* and *Comorra* to be employ'd in the making of Bombs, Carcasses, &c. Two dayes ago arriv'd here Lieutenant-Collonel *Corbelli*, being sent by Lieutenant-General de *Mercy* to give the Emperor an account of the condition *Zolnock* and the other places the *Imperialists* are possess'd of on that side, are in, and to solicit a sum of Money, as well for the making the necessary provision for the defence of those places, as for the payment of the Troops in Garrison there. All our advices from the Frontiers say, the *Turks* make great preparations for the Campaign; That the Grand Visier will come into *Hungary* with a very numerous Army, and that he will be joyn'd by a great Body of *Tartars*; That *Eali Bacha* is made Seraskier against the *Poles*, who with the Forces of *Moldavia* and *Valachia*, will it's said, have 80000 Men under his Command. The Emperor has nam'd the Baron de *Becke* to be Governor of *Philipsbourg* in the place of the Count de *Starenberg*, who with his Imperial Majesties leave, goes into the Service of the Elector Palatin, in the quality of General of his Forces. We have from several hands the confirmation of the account we gave you in our last, of the taking of the Forts of *St. Job* by the *Imperial* and *Hungarian* Troops commanded by General *Caraffa*.

Ratisbonne, Febr. 30. The Deputy of *Mentz* has propos'd to the Dyet, to take into consideration the Emperor's Letter, demanding the assistance of the Empire against the *Turks*, which the Electoral Colledge have resolv'd to do at their next meeting. There is likewise before the Dyet a Memorial presented by the Elector Palatin's Minister, concerning the Pretensions of the *Dutchets* of *Orleans* upon the Allodial Lands of the *Palatinate*, in which they have not yet taken any Resolution.

Cologne, March 15. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners have this week received new Orders from *Vienna* concerning, as it's believed, the persons that are now Prisoners here, some of the chief whereof, and particularly *Fuden*, have been since several times examin'd in order to the forming their Processes. The Children of *Sacks*, and several others, who promot'd the late disorders here, have been banish'd. They write from *Bonne*, that great preparations were making there for the Reception of the Elector of *Mentz*, who had let the Elector of *Cologne* know he intended to make him a Visit.

Hague, March 19. The Heer *Van Staremberg*, Ambassador from this State to his M. C. Majesty, who had leave to come home to look after his private Affairs, is order'd to hasten his return to that Court. The Count de *Nassau* is gone back to his Government of *Bolduc*. The Letters from *Hamburg* of the 15th instant, tell us the *Lunenburgh* Troops continued in the *Polls* they had taken within the Territories of that City.
