Madrid , February 23. HE King has recalled the Duke d'of-Jung to Court, from whence he retired fume time ago by His Majeffies Command, and has, 'n confideration of his Services, given him a place in the Council of State; But as for the Office of Mafter of the Horfe to the Queen, which was upon his difgrace taken from him, and given to the Marquis de los Ba baces, there is little likelihood at prefent of his being reflored to it. Copies of the Project of the Reform that was refolved on in the Extraordinary Council that met feyeral times in the King's prefence, have been fent to the feveral Councils, in order to its being put in execution. We are told from Cadiz, that 16 Men of War are fitting there, which are to go and meet the Galcons that are expected home in June. The Heer Van Heemskerken Amballador from the States General of the United Provinces, has given in a Memorial, demanding the payment of the Subfidles that remain due from this Crown to the Admiralties of Holland ever fince the laft War. His Catholick Majefty has ordered 100000 Crowns to be remitted to the Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, for the fervice of those Provinces.

Dantzick, March 6. The Letters from Poland fay, that the Envoy which hately arrived at Zolkiew from the Cham of Tartary, continued fill there, the King being defirous before he fend him back, to hear from his Ambassadors at Moscow, what fuccess they have in their Negotiation at that Court, according to which, it's believed; fome Overtures will be made to the Cham, to divert him from joining his Troops with those of the Grand Signior the next Summer; That the Preparations for the Campagne are carried on with great diligence, and that to quicken them yet more, the Pope's Nuncio had allured the King of a very confiderable Supply from his Holineis, in cale the Army of that Grown is in the Field before the end of? May 5 That the new Levies advance very fuccelsfully, feveral Officers having already finished their Recruits, and that it's not doubted but all the reft will have compleated theirs within the time limited; That the Officers which the Coffacks in the Service of the Crown fent to Zolkiew to follicite the payment of fome Money that was promifed them, to put them in a condition to ferve the next Campagne, had been fent back very well fan At the meeting of the General Officers at tisfied. Lembergb in December laft, it was ordered, for the better fublilience of the Polifb Forces, that Quarters should be affigned them in the feveral Palatinates of the Kingdom, and the distribution of them was made accordingly, but this Refolution was afterwards changed, and the faid Troops were appointed to winter in the Frontier Provinces, but the Palatinates, which by this means were

a Sum of Money in lieu thereof; which they have accordingly done, and this Money has been diffria buted among the Troops. We have advice from the Frontiers of *Podolia*; that the *Tartars* have again made an Incurfion on the fide of *Czerienia*; and that they carried away a great deal of Booty? On the other hand the Garifon of *Sniatin* have, it's faid, taken 800 Wagons that were going with Provitions to *Caminice*. The Bilhop of *Chelm* is preparing for his Embaffy to *Rome*.

Vienna, March 3. The Letters we had by the laft Courier f. on Upper Hungary, gave an account, That Count Terkerey, having been hindred by the march of General Caraffa from executing the defign he had to advance towards the Teyffe to furprize the Imperialists in some of their Quarters; and afterwards to succor Montgatz, retired to Gyula, whither the Vifier of Buda was come with feveral thousand Turks, to confer with him as well concerning the Operations of the Campagne in Upper Hungary, as the means that ought to be employed for the regaining the Hungarians to his Party. General de Mercy adds in a Letter by the fame Courier, that the Tarks were on that fide 9 or 10000 firong, and that he believed they had their Eye upon Saravas, where Major General Heufler has his Quarters; That many of the Hungarians that were quartered at Diofeeke deferted, and returned to Teckeley, for want of Provisions and their Pay; That a Party of Imperialijis had taken Prifoner a Chiaux that was going from Waradin to Buda, who faid, that before his departure from Waradin, the Ottomam Troops, who had been drawn together by the Balla of that place, having notice that the Christians were come out of their Quarters to observe them, separated, and marched back to their respective Garisons. This day arri-ved here an Officer from Upper Hungary, who confirms the account we gave you in our last of the taking of Stl Job, and that the Garifon, confifting in 600 Men, was, according to the Capitulation, conducted to Great Waradin. The Pope's Nuncio has defigited a Fond of 100000 Crowns of the Subfidies and Tenth's railed upon the Ecclefiallicks in the Hereditary Countries, for the recruiting the Regiments quattered in Upper Hungary, which are very much weakned by the continual Service they have been in during this Winter. A Fond has been likewife fetled for the Expencer of the Artillery, which are very great. The Spanifb Ingenier intends in few days to make a Tryal before the Emperor of his new invented Cannon and Mortars. The Duke of Lorgin is expected here about the 25th of this Month, and then a great Council of. War will be held; In the mean time all things are preparing for an early Campagne, and the common difcourse is, that the Imperialifes will beliege Buda and Agria at the fame time.

Berlin, March 10. The Elector of Brandenlurgh has, we are told, written to the Duke of Zell, and to the Magistrates of Hamburgh, on the occasion of the Lunenburgh Troops entring into the Territories of that City, carneftly recommending to them an accommodation of their Differences. At the fame time we are informed, that his Electoral Highness has ordered his Troops which are quartered in the Countreys of Mecklenburg and Lawenburg, in cafe things fhould come to extremi tics, to advance towards Hamburgh, and to affift that City, but according to all appearance Mat-ters will be amicably composed. The great Chancellor of Poland who is come hither in his return home from France, has demanded of his Electoral Highnels Succors against the Turks, but we do not yet know with what Succefs.All things are preparing for the march of the Troops that are to ferve in Hungary, which we are affured they will begin before the end of this Month.

Cologne, March 15. We are told from Heydelburgh, that an Envoy was come thither from France. in the place of the Abbot Morel, but that he had not yet declared his Commission ; That the Electoral Prince was expected there the 12th inflant from Vienna, that he intended to make no flay there, but to continue his Journey to Dufeldorpe with what haste he could, that he may be at the Meet-ing of the States, who are to allemble there the 20th of this Month. The Elector Palatine will have three of his Sons in Hungary the next Campagne, Prince Louis Great Malter of the Tentonick Order, Prince Charles Governor of Waradin, and Prince Philippe. The Elector of Mentz is expected at Bonne about the end of this Month, to confer, with the Elector of Cologne concerning the prefent Juncture of Affairs; Great Preparations are making there for his Reception. The Letters from Vienna of the 3d inftant tell us, that the Emperor had altered his Refolution about fending an Embaffy to the Sophy of Perfia, intending to leave the Conduct of Affairson that fide to the King of Poland, who has already a Minister at Hispahan,

Hague, March 22. The Marquis de Gastel Moncayo, who has refided feveral years here as Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain, and is now named by his Catholick Majefty to go his Ambaffador to the Republick of Venice, has taken his leave of the States-General.
