Warsaw, March 8.

THE last Letters from Moscow gave an account of the arrival of the Ambassadors of this Crown, who made their Publick Entry into that City the 20th of the last Month, with great State and Magnificence, being accompanied with above 300 Gentlemen; They had not yet had Audience of the Czars, but the manner of their Publick Reception, and the Conferences they had had with some of the chief Ministers of that Court, gave them ground to believe the Commission they were sent upon would be well received by them. The Letters from Zolkiew of the 18th past tell us, that the King of Poland had been ill with a Cold, but was pretty well again; That some of the Senators had taken that occasion to dissuade him from going into the Field himself this Summer, but that his Majesty was fixed in his Resolution, and had again declared, that if he had his health, he would command his Army in Person. The same Letters tell us, that among the other preparations for the Campaign, a great number of Batts is preparing to be employed on the Nieser and the Pruth, as well for Carriage, as for the making of Bridges. The Advices from the Frontiers say, that the Garison of Sniatin had fallen upon and defeated a Party of Tartars, who returned from an Incurtion they had made into the Province of Podolia, and had taken from them several hundred Wagons laden with their Plunder, which they were carrying to Caminiec; That the Turks have supplied this place with Provisions, and reinforced the Garison; And that the Chain of Tartary has assured the Turks he will join them with a greater Army the next Campaign, than he has yet done since the War.

Venice, March 5. This week several Vessels which had on Board 1000 new raised Foot, parted from the Lido to joyn the Fleet at Corfou; and a greater Convoy is preparing, which will be ready to sail in a very short time. The Count de Coningsmarke, who is to command the Land-Forces of this Republick, is arrived here with divers Suedish Gentlemen, who intend to serve as Volunteers. By a Vessel come from Corfou we have advice, that Captain-General Morosini had sent two Squadrons of Men of War to cruise in the Archipelago, to endeavour to intercept the Turkish Convoys that are sent with Troops and Provisions from Alexandria to Thessalonique. We are informed by the same way, that the Captain-General having taken a Review of his Land-Forces, found them to be 12000 fighting Men, which, with the Auxiliary Forces, and the other Troops raised for the service of this State, will make a very considerable Army. Yesterday was mustered at the Lido the Regiment of Dragoons commanded by Count Bernabo Visconti and the other Troops of the Militia.

Venice, March 9. This week arrived here a Vessel from Corfou, with Letters from Captain General Morosini of the 16th of the last Month, by which we were informed, that the Fleet would be ready to sail about the middle of this Month; That the General intended to direct his Court to Prevesa, and from thence to Zamp, to take on Board the Troops that have their quarters there; And that he would stay at this last place for the Troops of Milan, and the other Auxiliary Forces which he expects from hence. Those that are already arrived at the Lido, will part from thence the next week, and will be followed soon after by a great Convoy of Ammunition and Provisions. We have advice from the Morea, that 1500 Turks having got together with a design to take revenge upon the Maynotes, who had made several Incurtions into the Ottoman Territories, these, upon the notice they had of their March, drew together, and laid an Ambush in a Wood the Turks were to pass, which succeeded so well, that they surprized the Enemy, killed most of them, and put the rest to flight. Count Coningsmarke has, since his arrival here, received the usual Compliments, and is preparing for his departure to joyn the Fleet. They write from Dalmatia, that the new Basia of Bissina did assemble all the Force he could to make an incurtion towards Zara; And that Signior Michiel, General of the Venetian Cavalry, and the Chevalier Franco, General of the Morlaques, were preparing on their side to go and meet him. The Marquis de Courbon, Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons, Signior Alcenago, and the Ingenier Muttoni, will part from hence in few days for Corfou.

Genoa, March 9. By a French Vessel which came from the Coast of Barbary, we have an account, that 16 Algerines are now abroad; and that the Dutch Consul fearing a Rupture, was retired from Argiers; These Ships have, its said, leave to cruise two Months, and after that, are to go to the Levant to joyn the Grand Signior's Fleet. The Merchants here are in some pain for a Ship of 700 Tuns belonging to this State, which sailed from Alicant about the latter end of January, being very richly Laden for this place, they fearing she is fallen into the hands of the Pyrats.

Copenhagen, March 16. The King intends to part from hence about the middle of the next Month for Holstein, where, it's said, his Majesty will pass most of the Summer. Twelve Frigats are sitting here, which, we are told, are to cruise in the Baltick. They write from Stockholm, that the King of Sweden has promised to assist the Emperor with 8000 Men; That these Troops are to Rendezvous in Livonia, and from thence are to march through Courland, Poland and Silesia, to Hungary.

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Vienna, March 14. A Spy that was lately sent into the *Turkish* quarters is come back, and confirms our former Advices concerning Count *Tetkeley*, and the Changes that have been made at *Adrianople* in the chief Offices of that Empire, and in the principal Commands in the Army and Governments in *Hungary*; He adds, that there are 15,000 Men in Garrison in *Buda*; but that from *Belgrade* to *Buda*, and in all their Frontier places, there is so great a scarcity of Provisions and Forage, that the Troops are hardly able to subsist. The last Letters from General *Caprara* laid, that the 9th Instant was the day fixed on for the beginning the attack of *Montgaz*, the Conduct whereof will be left to General *Caraffa*; General *Caprara* having, its said; Orders to return hither, to assist at the Councils of War that will be held here the beginning of the next Month, for the regulating the Operations of the Campaign. There has been spread a report this week, that greatest part of the City and Suburbs of *Great Waradin* hath been burnt down by a fire which broke out there in five several places at the same time; And that *Tetkeley* was fallen again into disgrace with the *Turks*, who finding he had, to regain his Liberty, sed them with promises which he could not perform, had carried him back to *Belgrade* under a Guard of 4000 Men, but as well the one as the other needs a Confirmation. Count *Maximilian* of *Staremberg*, late Governor of *Philipsburg*, is gone to serve the Elector Palatin as General of his Forces; before his departure, the Emperor made him one of his Council of State. A considerable Sum of Money has been lately sent to *Raab* and *Newbeusel*, to be employed in repairing the Fortifications of those places; Those of *Newbeusel* are very much advanced, and will in a short time be in a much better condition than they were when the *Imperialists* set down before that place the last year. Ministers are now here from several Princes of the Empire, to treat about the Troops they are willing to assist the Emperor with. The Commissaries sent hither by the Elector of *Brandenburg*, make great provision for the Forces of that Prince, which, we are assured, will be in *Hungary* about the middle of the next Month.

Cologne, March 23. They write from *Strasbourg*, that the *French* have forbid the carrying of Corn out of *Alsace*; That they make great Magazines at *Strasbourg*, *Brisac*, *Schlestadt*, and *Eriburgh*; And that they will have two Camps on that side this Summer, one on the *Sarre*, and the other near *Landau* in the *Lower Alsace*. The Electoral Prince Palatin parted from *Heidelberg* the 19th of the last Month with his Brother the Bishop of *Breslaw* for *Dusseldorpe*. The last Letters from *Vienna* laid, That the Duke of *Lorraine* intended, before he returned to *Vienna*, to go and make the Elector of *Bavaria* a Visit at *Munick*; And that his Highness was expected at *Vienna* about the 10th of the next Month. That the *Imperialists* had formally besieged the Castle of *Montgaz*, having brought their Cannon and Mortars before it the 9th instant, and that they doubted not to be in a short time Masters of that place. That the Emperor had given Orders for the fortifying *Schwar*, and putting a good Garrison into it, under the command of the Count de *Caraldin*, to cover the *Imperial* Territories on that side against the Enemies Incurfions. That they had advice, that the new Grand Vizier *Solyman* is expected at *Belgrade* in *April*; That he had ordered the old Troops which served against the Crown of *Poland* the last year, to march for *Hungary*; And that in the mean time his great care was to secure the Bridge of

Effecke, by causing a very strong Guard to be posted there.

Hague, March 29. The Heer *Van Moering*, who has resided several years on the part of this State at the Court of *Denmark*, being on his Return home, has Orders to stop at *Hamburg*, to employ his Offices for the composing the differences between the Duke of *Zell* and that City. The Marquis de *Castel Moncayo* will part from hence the next week for *Brussels*, and continue his Journey from thence to *Venice*, where he is to reside as Ambassador from the King of *Spain*. The Prince of *Orange* came hither on Monday last; and is this day gone back to *Dieren*. They write from *Maeffricht*, of the 22d Instant, that two Regiments arrived there some days before to reinforce that Garrison; And that the Inhabitants had Orders to furnish themselves with Provisions for a year. The States of *Holland* are adjourned for three or four days, and the Deputies of the Towns are gone home to receive farther Instructions from their Principals, upon the matters that are before them. The Letters from *Hamburg*, of the 26th instant say, That Colonel *Bancken* was shot to death the 24th, according to the Sentence pronounced against him by the Council of War; And that *Pieterfen*, after that his Sword had been broken over his Head, was Banished. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 17th of this Month, contradict the Report of *Tetkeley's* being carried back to *Belgrade*; He was, according to their last Advices from *Upper Hungary*, still in the Neighborhood of *Waradin*, having with him about 800 *Hungarians*, and 6000 *Turks* commanded by a *Bassa*, who had a very watchful Eye upon him. General *Caprara* was before *Montgaz*.

Whitehall, March 24. His Majesty was pleased, in consideration of the long and good Services of Major *Martin Beckman*, His Majesties chief Engineer, to confer upon him on Saturday last the Honour of Knighthood.
