Warfaw, March 3. A HE last Letters from Molcow gave an account of the arrival of the Ambaffadors of this Crown, who made their Publick Entry into that Ci-ty the zoth of the laft Month, with great State and Magnificence . being accompanied with above 300 Gentlemen; They had not yet had Audience of the Czars, but the manner of their Pub-lick Reception, and the Conferences they had had with some of the chief Ministers of that Court, gave them ground to believe the Commission they were fent upon would be well received by them, The Letters from Zolkiew of the 18th paft tell us, that the King of Poland had been ill with a Cold, but was pretty well again; That fome of the Senators had taken that occafion to diffuade him from going into the Field himfelf this Summer, but that his Majefty was fixed in his Refolution, and had again declared, that if he had his health, he would command his Aimy in Perfon. The fame Lotters tell us, that among the other preparations for the Campagne, a great number of B ats is preparing to be employed on the Niefler and the Pruth, as well for Carriage, as for the making of Bridges. The Advices from the Frontiers fay, that the Garifon of Sniatin had fallen upon and defeated a Party of Tartars, who returned from an Incurfion they had made into the Province of Podolia, and had taken from them feyeral bundred Wagons laden with their Plunder, which they were carrying to Caminiec; That the Turks have supplied this place with Provilions, and reinforced the Garison; And that the Chain of Tartary has allured the Turks he will join then with a greater Army the next Campagne, than he has yet done lince the War.

Venice, March 5. This week feveral Veffels which had on Board 1000 hew raifed Foot, parted from the Lido to joyn the Fleet at Corfou ; and a greater Convoy is preparing, which will be ready to fail in a very ihort time. The Count de Coningfindrke, who, is to command the Land-Forces of this Republick, is arrived here with divers Suedich Gentlemen, who intend to ferve as Volontiers. . By a Veffel come from Corfon we have advice, that Captain-General Morofini had fent two Squadrons of Men of War to cruize in the Archipelago, to endeavour to intercept the Turkilh Convoys that are fent with Troops and Provisions from Alexandria to Theffalonique. We are informed by the fame way, that the Captain-General having ta-ken a Review of his Land-Forces, found them to be 12000 fighting Men, which, with the Auxiliary Forces, and the other Troops railed for the fervice of this State, will make a very confiderable Ar-my. Yestorday was muffered at the Lido the Regiment of Dragoons commanded by Count Bernabo Visconti and the other Troops of the Mi-Wheze:

Venice, March y. This week arrived here a Vellel from Corfon, with Letters from Caprain General Mordini of the 18th of the laft Month, by which we were informed, that the Flece would be ready to fail about the middle of this Month \$ That the General intended to direct his Courle to Prevefa, and from thence to Zane, to take on B. ard the Troops that have their quarters there ; And that he would flay at this last place for the Troops of Milan, and the other Auxiliary Forces' which he expects from hence. - Thole that are already arrived at the Lido, will part from thence the next week, and will be followed foon after by a great Convoy of Ammunition and Provi-We have advice from the Mored, that fions. 1500 Turks having got together with a delign, to take revenge upon the Maynotes, who had made feveral incurfions into the Outoman Territories, thefe, upon the notice they had of their Match, drew together, and laid an Ambalil in a Wood the Turks were to pais, which fucceded fo well, that they furprized the Enemy, killed molt of them, and put the reft to flight. Count Coningf-marke has, finde his arrival here, received the ultral Compliments, and is preparing for his depar-ture to joyn the Fleet. They write from Dalmax-tia, that the new Balla of Boffink did alfemble alf the Force he could to make an incurfion towards Zara; And that Signior Michiel, General of the Venetian Cavalry, and the Chevalier Fanco, Gener ral of the Morlaques, were preparing on their file to go and meet him. The Marquis de Courbon<sup>3</sup>. Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons, Signlor Alcenago, and the Ingenier Muttoni, will part from hence in few days for Corfou.

Genoua, March 9. By a French Weffel which came from the Coalt of Barbiry, we have an account, that 16 Algerines are now abroads and that the Durch Conful fearing a Rupture, was retired from Argiers; Thefe Ships have, its faid, Icäve to cruile two Months, and affer that, are to go to the Levant to join the Grand Signior's Flett. The Merchants here are in fome pain for a Ship of 700 Tuns belonging to this State, which failed from Alicant about the latter end of Fanuary, beirg very tichly Laden for this place, they fearing the is fallen into the hands of the Pyrats.

The King intends to part from hence about the mindle of the next Month for Holflein, where, it's faid, his Majefty will pals moft of the Summer. Twelve Frigats are fitting here, which, we are told, are to cruife in the Baltick. They write from Spockholm, that the King of Sueden has promified to afful the Emperor with Sobo Men; That the Troops are to Rendezyous in Livonia, and from thence are to marchi through Courland, Poland and Silefia, to Hungary.
