

# The London Gazette.

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*Naples, March 5.*

**C**olonel *Vespaſiano* has already raiſed 300 Men in this Kingdom for the Service of the Republick of *Venice*, (which he has ſent to the *Levant*) and hopes before the end of this month to have quite finiſhed the Levy he is to make.

*Genova, March 9.* We have an account from *Leghorne*, that ſix Gallies, and three Gallots, are fitting out there with great diligence, which are to ſerve with the Pope's Gallies, and thoſe of *Malta*, againſt the *Turky*. By a Veſſel arrived from *Cadiz*, we are informed, that Sixteen Spaniſh Men of War are ordered to go and meet the Gallons that are expected home in *June* next. The Letters from *Provence* confirm that the *French* Gallies are fitting at *Marseilles*, and a Squadron of Men of War at *Toulon*, which are to join together under the Command of the Duke de *Mortemur*. The *Sieur d'Obbeville*, Envoy from *France*, had this week Audience of the Doge, but we do not know the Subject of it. The Maſter of a Veſſel which arrived here this week from *Corſou*, aſſures us, that the *Venetian* Fleet would be ready to ſail from thence before the end of this Month, and that it was believed the Captain-General would begin the Campaign with the Siege of *Mordon* or *Laria*. The Advices from the *Levant* ſay the *Turks* make great Preparations for the Campaign in *Hungary*. The Count de *Fuenſalida* is expected here the next Month from *Sardinia*, in his way to *Milan*; and in the mean time the Palace of Prince *Doria* is preparing for him.

*Venice, March 15.* By a Veſſel which came lately from *Zara*, we are informed, that before her departure from thence, ſeveral Gallies arrived there from *Corſou*, to take on Board the *Venetian* Troops that have had their Winter-quarters on that ſide. And by Letters of the 30th of the laſt Month from *Corſou* we are informed, that the Captain-General hath ſent a Squadron of Men of War to cruize in the *Archipelago*, under the command of Signior *Pisani*, and that he would part from thence himſelf with the whole Fleet, ſo ſoon as the great Convoy he expected from hence was arrived there. On *Thursday* laſt Count *Coningmarks*, General of the Forces of this State by Land, had Audience of the Senate: He will part from hence ſuddenly for the *Levant*. The Troops of the *Silaneze* are embarked; and thoſe of *Hanover* are expected at the *Lido* before the end of this month. On *Monday* laſt arrived here a Barque from *Spalatro*, with advice, that the *Sangiac* of *Albania* having aſſembled what Troops he could, has marched with them towards *Paſtorich* with ſign, as was believed, to attack that place; and the *Venetian* Forces in thoſe quarters did before draw together to oppoſe him. The *Vicere General Cornaro* is preparing for his

departure to go and take poſſeſſion of his Government of *Dalmatia*. This week was made a trial of ſeveral Fire-works, invented by the Ingenier *Vetri*, which ſucceeded ſo well, that the Senate have given him a yearly Penſion of 400 Ducats.

*Vienna, March 17.* An Officer arrived here yeſterday from *Upper Hungary*, who ſays General *Caprara* was before *Montax* with 4000 Foot, 500 Horſe, ſix Mortars, and as many pieces of Cannon for Battery; and that there was in the place a ſtrong Garriſon, who ſeemed reſolved to defend it to the laſt, having had freſh aſſurances of Relief from Count *Teckley*; but if we may give Credit to the Advices we have as well from *Cathaw* as *Zolnocks* he has promiſed them what he can perform for though the *Turks* may be able to draw together from *Great Waradin*, and the Neighbouring Garriſons, a Body of 5 or 6000 Men, to aſſiſt him for the ſuccoring of that Fortreſs, yet being very narrowly obſerved by the *Imperialiſts*, who have their quarters on that ſide under the Command of Lieutenant General de *Mercy*, and Major General *Hueſler*, they can no ſooner begin to move (as they have more than once attempted during this Winter) but theſe will be ready to oppoſe them. The *Herz Grunckau*, the *Brandenburgh* Commiſſary, will part from hence to morrow, to return to *Berlin*, having finiſhed the Commiſſion he was ſent hither upon; He has aſſured the *Imperial* Miniſters, that the *Brandenburgh* Forces will be in *Hungary* by the 15th of *April*, which is confirmed by the Letters we have from *Berlin*; They will be 8000 fighting Men, beſides a conſiderable number of Gunners and Fire-workers. We had a report here the laſt week, that the *Turks* being very much diſſatisfied with *Teckley*, had carried him back to *Belgrade*, to keep him there, till they had the Grand Signior's farther Orders concerning him; but the laſt Letters from *Upper Hungary* make no mention thereof, but on the contrary ſay, that according to the freſheſt News they had of him, he was ſtill at *Great Waradin*, having with him about 800 *Hungarians*, who have returned to him ſince his Liberty. The *Viceroy* of *Croatia* has had this week ſeveral Conferences with the Prince of *Dietrichſtein*, Preſident of the Chamber of *Graz*, with others of the Emperor's principal Miniſters, with whom, it's ſaid, he has concerted the matters he came hither about, concerning the Forces that are maintained by that Countrey for the Emperor's Service, ſo that it's believed he will ſoon in few days return to his Government; The Marquis de *Parella*, who has a Regiment in *Croatia*, is likewiſe on his departure. General *Caraffa* has ſent an account hither, that he has received for Contributions from the City of *Debrecen* 200000 Florins, and 1000 Sacks of Corn; And that the *Baſſa* who commands the *Ottoman* Forces on the other ſide of the *Taiſſe*, has had the Title of *Seraſquier* conferred upon him

by the new Grand Visier *Solyman*. We have likewise Advice, that the Cham of *Tartary* has Orders to send, besides the Troops he is to join with the *Turks* against the *Poles*; a Body of *Tartars* to serve in *Hungary* the next Campaign. The Letters from *Buda* continue to say, that the Grand Visier is expected the next month at *Belgrade*, and that the *Turks* talk of having a very great Army in *Hungary*. We are told from *Cracow*, that the Count *Chiski*, who went with a Commission from the Emperor to the Prince of *Valachia*, was come back to the Court of *Poland*, not having been admitted to see him, but only to confer with some of his Ministers, who shewed no disposition to embrace his Proposals; in his return he was followed by a Party of *Tartars*, but having notice of it he escaped them.

*Bonne, March 20.* The Elector of *Mentz* is expected here in a Fortnight or three weeks, to confer with our Elector about the present juncture of affairs. The Bishop of *Strasburgh* is likewise expected about that time from *France*. Count *Emanuel de Fürstemberg*, Brother to the Prince of *Mourback* lately deceased, is arrived here from *Vienna*.

*Cologne, March 26.* The Electoral Prince Palatine returned this Evening to *Dusseldorpe*, where the States of *Fuliers* and *Bergs* are to meet to-morrow. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners are expecting farther directions from *Vienna* concerning *Juden*, and the rest that are now Prisoners here, who in the mean time have been several times examined by them. The Officers that are raising Men in these Parts for the Emperor's Service have almost complicated their Levies. The Bishop of *Strasburgh* is expected in few days at *Bonne*.

*Hamburg, March 26.* The 24th instant, Colonel *Van Bancken* was carried under a good Guard to the Hornwork, where he was shot to death by three Officers, according to the Sentence that had been given against him; And at the same time was likewise executed the Sentence against Lieutenant *Pieterfen*, whose Sword was broke over his head. The King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and other Princes, do employ their offices for the putting an end to the differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City.

*Hague, March 29.* The States of *Friesland* have, by their Deputies in the Assembly of the States General, declared their Consent to the State of the War for this present Year, upon Condition that their Quota for the Fortifications be employed as they themselves shall direct for the repairing the Fortifications of several places within that Province. It has been proposed in the States of *Holland* to raise the 200 Penny, for the paying off part of the Debts contracted during the last War, which the City of *Amsterdam* is inclined to, but *Leyden*, *Delfe*, and some other Towns oppose it. The Deputies that are come hither from *Zealand*, have had several Conferences with those of this Province, and are preparing to return home. They write from *Zell* of the 23d instant, that an Envoy was arrived there from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to endeavor to compose the differences between the Duke of *Zell* and the City of *Hamburg*. Prince *Waldecke* and Lieutenant General *Spaen* are still here.
