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Madrid, March 14.

Ount Mansfeldt, the Empéror's Ambassador, having informed the King that several Princes and States of the Empire, had resolved to meet by their Deputies at Ausburgh, to treat upon what had been proposed by the States of Franconia, for their mutual Desence and Security, his Catholick Majesty has named the Sieur de Neusgorges, his Deputy at the Dyet at Ratisbonne, to assist on his part at the said Conference. Orders have been sent to Cadiz, to hasten the Equipage of the Men of War which are to go and meet the Galeons, and a Sum of Money has been sent thither for that Service. Don Foseph de Faria, late Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal at the Court of England, is come to reside here in the same Quality, in the place of Don Mendo de Pereyra, who has had his Audiences of Leave. The Decrees for the great Reform which the King has resolved to make in the several Councils, &s. are not yet published.

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Warfaw, March 8. The Letters from the Frontiers inform us, that some Polish Troops defeated about ten days ago, a Convoy of 200 Wagons laden with Ammunition, which the Turks were carrying to Caminiec, and killed and took many of the Turks prisoners; but that the Bassa of Ca-minies having notice of it, sent out a party of that Garison, who coming up with the Poles, charged them, and exceeding them very much in number, obliged them to abandon their Booty, and to retire in great disorder; and that upon this news Orders were sent to the Sieur Laska, who commanded a party of Poles on that side to joyn with Mobila General of the Cossacks, and to pur-These Letters add, that five fue the Enemy. persons who were Spies for the Turks, having been larely taken, confessed that they had been in all the Frontier places of this Kingdom, and even at Leopol, to observe what Preparations were making for the Campagne, as well as the scituation and strength of the said places. The King is still at Zalkiew; The Express he sent to Rome is come back, with fresh assurances that the Pope will further assist his Majesty with very confiderable Supplies, to enable him to support the Expences of the Campagne. Letters from Moscow say, the Ambassadors of this Crown were very well received there, and that the Czars had appointed some of their chief Miniflers to treat with them.

Vienna, March 19. The 14th instant arrived Mere an Express from Opper Hungary, with the News that General Caprara was before Montgatz; And that the King of Poland had sent to give him notice that the Tartars were marching in a great Body towards Hungary. The 17th we had an ac-
