

last year against the Poles into Hungary, and to employ the Troops of Asia, with the Moldavians, Valachians, and a Body of Tartars on that side. It is likewise confirmed that the Turks of Pest having fallen upon a party of our Foragers, took and killed about 120 of them. The Count d'Ervedi Viceroy of Croatia is upon his departure, having settled the matters he came hither about to his satisfaction. The Letters from Zolnocke say, that the Generals de Mercy and Heuster are drawing together the Imperial Troops under their Command, to observe the Turks, who they believe have design to fall upon them in their Quarters. Count is arrived here from Upper Hungary to hasten a Convoy of Money and Provisions that is to be sent thither for the payment and subsistence of the Forces commanded by General Caprara.

Ratisbonne, March 22. The Imperial Decree, which the Emperor demands the assistance of the States of the Empire against the Turks, has been considered of in the several Colleges; That of the Electors have consented to it, but the Colleges of the Princes, and the Imperial Cities have not yet been able to come to any determination therein; The said Cities, and some the lesser Princes being unwilling to give their assent to the Subsidies the Emperor demands, but on condition that they may be exempted from finishing Winter Quarters for the Imperial Forces, and from giving any thing in lieu thereof. The Count de Hobenloe parted from hence the last week for Nuremberg, to assist at the meeting of the States of Franconia, who are now assembled here, to draw up Instructions for the Deputies they have resolved to send to Augsburg to confer with the Ministers of the Emperor, the Elector of Bavaria, and the Circles of Bavaria, Suabia, and the Upper Rhine, who are to meet there the beginning of the next Month. The King of Spain and the King of Sweden were told, will likewise send Deputies to this Meeting.

Paris, March 30. The 28th Instant the King's Statue, set up by the Marechal de la Feuillade, was uncovered, the Dauphin being present, with the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, the Duke of Chartres, Madamoiselle, Madamoiselle d'Orleans, and Madame de Guise, and the Magistrates of this City being there in a Body; after this Ceremony the Dauphin went to the Opera and to the Town-House, where there was a magnificent Collation; a very fine Fire-work was prepared on the Greue, Fountains run with Wine in several places of this City, the Cannon were discharged, and in the Evening Bonfires were made in all the streets. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Germany with the news of the death of the Princess Charlotte of Hesse. Dowager to Charles Louis Elector Palatine, who died the last week at Hydelberg, after a long sickness; She was Daughter of William Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, was born in the year 1627, and Married to the said Prince Elector in 1650. This day two Companies of the Musqueteers exercised before the King in the great Court of the Castle of Versailles.

Paris, April 6. The King has visited the Dutchess of Orleans, upon the death of her Mother the Electress Palatin, and his Majesty and the whole Court are gone into mourning. We have an account from Rochefort, that Nine Men of War are gone from thence for Brest, to join with Seven more that lie ready there; The Marechal d'Estree, who is to command this Squadron, parted from hence the last week. They write from Spain, that at the instance of the Pope's Nuncio, orders have been sent to the Viceroy of Galicia, to put the Money that was some time ago seized at the Groyne,

into the hands of the French Consul there; The Marquis d'Angeau, Governor of Touraine, is married to the Countess of Leweflein.
