#### Scarborough Market and Approaches.

Erection of Market House, Improvement of Approaches, Removal of Existing Markets, Purchase of Tolls, and Incorporation of Company.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session for leave to bring in a Bill for the establishment of a new market, for the sale of butchers' meat, poultry, fish, butter, cheese, vegetables, corn, hay, and other provisions, goods, wares, merchandise, and marketable commodities, in the borough of Scarborough, in the North Riding of the county of York.
