to the Turks in Garisi n there, to let them know, that if they did not quit it in 114 days, he would return with a greater Force, and with Artillery, and that they must not then expect any Quarter either for themselves, their Wives or Children; which Message did so intimidate the Garifon, that five days after they abandoned the place, taking with them their best Goods. At Tudorow the Aga that commanded there was killed, and his Son taken Prisoner.

Ratubonne, April 6. The Letters from Vienna of the 31 of the last Month tell us, that Montgatz was formally belieged, but that it was like to prove an Enterp ize of great difficulty, the place being very strong, and provided with all things necessary for its desence. That the Deputies of Transilvania had made great complaints to the Emperor's Ministers of the Ravage they pretend the Imperial Troops have made in that Countrey, with an intimation that the States of Transilvania were unwilling to ratify the Treaty lately concluded at Vienna, until they were in some measure cased of the great Burthen they lie under. But these Complaints seem to be made at this time by the Prince and States of Translivaria, only to excuse the delay of the Ratifications of the faid Treaty, and to gain time till the iffue of the Siege of Montgatz may direct them, with whom to perfect the Treaties they have now on foot, with the Imperialists or the Turks.

Hamburgh, April 5. The differences between the Duke of Zell and this City have retarded the march of the Troops of Brandenburgh and Saxony towards Hungary, but it's hoped they will now be very fuddenly composed, by the Interposition of the Baron Horwart and the Baron de Goedens the Imperial Commissioners, who are daily expected here. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* does likewife employ, his Mediation for this purpose, and has proposed to these Magistrates, as an Expedient, to send a Deputation to the Duke of Zell, undertaking, that fo foon as they enter within the Territories of that Prince, his Troops shall retire out of the Territories of this City, upon which we do not yet hear what resolution they have taken. They write from Copenbagen, that the 12 Frigats that are fitting out there, were almost ready to fail. We are told from Sueden, that they are likewife fitting a Squadren of Men of War in that Kingdom.

Hague, April 6. The 2d Instant the Deputies from the Province of Zealand, Seven in number, had Audience of the States of Holland, to which they were conducted with much Ceremony, and have fince been in Conference with the Deputies of the faid States. The Deputies of the States General had a Conference the 30th of the last Month, and another the 4th Instant with the Count d'A vanx Ambassador from France. Lieutenant-General Spaen is gone back to Cleves. Prince Waldecke, and the Count of Nasjan are likewise parted from hence, the first for Kursemburg, and the other for Breda.

Brufels April 139. Count Salazar intended to have pirted from hence yellerday for England, buthe isfallen ill again of the Gout. The 5th Inflant the Sieur Blanche, Greffier of the Stares of Brabans, was seized, and carried the pext day Prifoner under a Guard of as Horsemen to the Callie of Leeuwe. The Letters from Fienne of the 31 past lay, that the Prince of Transivania' had not only granted the Tartars a passage through his Countrey, and promised to supply them with Provisions in their march, but was privately treating

him, did not think fit to attack the Caffle, but fent I with Count Teckeley and the Turks, who had affuted him of great Affiliances to protect him against the Imperialists- The Siege of Mongatz will, it's feared, coits great many Men, the place being very

Paris, April 13. The 9th Instant the King went abroad in his Coach to take the Air. The Bithop of Straiburgh, who has been some time at this Court, parted from honce on Monday last for Germany. We are told the Fleet will fail from Toulon the 15th of this Month.

Barnestaple, April 2. On Wednestay last sailed from honce Nine Ships bound for Newfoundland. The late bad weather, we fear, has caused many Shipwracks. About Ilford-Comb, abundance of Aironds is cast ashore; and the Masters of some Veifels that came from Ireland report, that they faw in the Changel a great many Casks floating on the Sea, but the weather was so tempestuous that they could not put out their Boats to take them up. And by several Vessels that are arrived here from Seilly, we are inform'd, that the Princess of Rotterdam, a very great Ship bound for the East-Indies. was lately call away there, and all the Men drowned. Our Firginia Ships are not yet arrived.
