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Vienna, April 4.

WE have Letters by an Exprest from the Camp before *Mongatz*, of the 26th of the last Month, which give an account, That the Besiegers made their approaches to the lower Town with good success, notwithstanding the continual Fire of the Enemies Cannon: That they had almost drawn the first Ditch dry, and were preparing Fagots and Sacks with earth to fill it, and when that was done, would give an assault to the Palanque, which they must be Masters of before they can attack the Castle; And that they had thrown a great many Bombs into the place, one of which falling in the Room where the Prince's *Ragotzi* was at Dinner, and setting it on Fire, occasioned a great disorder among the Besieged, but the Fire was put out without doing any great harm. That *Teckelej* was posted with 5 or 6000 Men near *Gyula*, expecting a great reinforcement of *Turks* and *Tatars*, in order to the relief of *Mongatz*; That General *Caprara*, upon advice of it, had sent the Baron *Baragotzi* with 4000 *Hungarians*, and half of the Regiments of *Schultz* and *Petrini* to attack him there. That General *Piccolomini* was drawing a considerable Body of Men together, with Orders to go and meet the *Tatars*, and to secure the Avenues by which they must pass into *Hungary*. That Lieutenant General *de Mercy*, and the Count *de Caraffa*, were posted with the Troops under their Command, the first near *Zolmoeck*, and the other on the side of *Zabmar*, to observe the Enemy. They write from *Lower Hungary*, That the *Imperialists* having notice that a Party of 300 Men was gone from *Canisa* to make an Incurfion, they laid an Ambush for them, which succeeded so well, that many of the Enemy were killed, and most of the rest taken Prisoners, among which were three Officers of Note. And that the *Germans* and *Hungarians* of the Frontier Garrisons having formed a Body of about 4000 Men, they marched the last Week with several pieces of Cannon and Mortars, to attack the Fortresses of *Balaton*, situated on the side of a Lake between *Vesprim* and *Alba Regalis*; of the success of which Enterprize we hope to give you a good account in our next. The Duke of *Lorrain* is expected here to morrow, and the Elector of *Bavaria* towards the end of this Month; His Electoral Highnesses Troops, as the last Letters from *Munick* inform us, were preparing for their march, which they would order so as to be in *Hungary* by the first of the next Month, the day appointed for the General Rendezvous. The Deputies of *Transylvania* continue to complain of the great disorders they say the Imperial Troops commit in that Countrey, upon which the Emperor has sent directions to General *Caprara*, to examine whether there be any ground for these Complaints, and if there

be, that better Order be observed for the future. The Count of *Dietrichstein*, President of the Chamber of the Finances at *Graz*, parted from hence some days ago, on his return thither, to settle the Fonds for the maintenance of the Forces on that side. The Count *de Ziackj*, who lately arrived here from *Poland*, is gone back with a private Commission from the Emperor. The last Week dyed here Count *Charles Oxenstern*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Sueden*.

Zell, April 9. The Baron *Horwart* is arrived here from the Emperor, and has had Audience of our Duke; His business is, to endeavor a Composure of the Differences between his Highness and the City of *Hamburg*, and in all appearance he will succeed in it. It is said he has likewise Orders to treat about a Body of Men which the Emperor desires the Duke of *Zell* will assist him with against the *Turks*.

Hamburg, April 9. There has hapned a Rencontre between the Minister of the Duke of *Zell*, and one of the Deputies of this City, at *Vienna*, which, it's feared, may somewhat alter the good disposition there seems to be at present to an Accommodation. These Magistrates have not yet taken any Resolution upon what was proposed to them by the Baron *de Horwart*, and the Baron *de Goedens*, the Imperial Commissioners, about their sending a Deputation to the Duke of *Zell*, they insisting to have the Troops of that Prince first quit the Territories of this City. In the mean time we are told from *Berlin*, that these differences do retard the march of the *Brandenburg* Forces that are to serve this Campaign in *Hungary*. The Magistrates of this City have, it's said, resolved to contribute in Money their Quota of the Subsidy of 50 *Roman* Months lately granted the Emperor by the States of the Empire assembled at *Ratisbonne* for the War against the *Turks*.

Hamburg, April 12. The Sieur *Haxhausen*, Envoy from the King of *Denmark*, arrived here this day, and has, we are told, let these Magistrates know, that the Duke of *Zell* has given Orders to his Troops to retire out of the Territories of this City, which has very much increased our hopes of a speedy Accommodation. The *Lunenburghers* demand 800 *Ryxdollars* of the Inhabitants of *Bersdorf*, and 200 of the Four Lands.

Cologne, April 13. The Count *de Eobentoe*, the Emperor's Envoy, having had several Conferences with the Elector of *Cologne*, and his chief Ministers, upon the present juncture of Affairs, parted from *Bonne* the 8th Instant for *Ausbourg*, to assist at the Conference that will be held there the beginning of the next Month. We have an account from *Duseldorpe*, that the States of *Bergs* and *Fuliers* are separated, after having taken Resolutions upon the several Points proposed to them to the satisfaction of the Electoral Prince Palatin, who intends to return very suddenly to *Heydelberg*, and

and from thence to Vienna. The Recruits that have been raised by his Highness will in few days begin their march for Hungary.

Brussels, April 18. The Count de Bergeycke is gone to Flanders, to pay the Troops quartered in that Province. Deputies are come hither from the States of Haynault, but we know not yet what their Business is. The young Prince de Horne, and several other Persons of Quality are preparing for their Journey to Vienna, intending to serve the next Campaign in Hungary. The last Advices from Hungary gave a good account of the Siege of *Mongatz*; The Besiegers were advanced to the Ditch of the lower Town, which, having drawn out the Water, they were going to fill with Fagots; and the Bombs they had thrown into the Castle had done great execution. That Lieutenant-General de Mercy, the Count de Caraffa, the Count de Piccolomini, and the Baron Baragotzi, were abroad with considerable Bodies of Men to have an eye upon the Turks, and that they would all join together if they found there was occasion for it, and make an Army of above 20000 Men. In Croatia and the Lower Hungary, the Imperialists have lately had several successful Rencontres with the Turks, and the last Letters said, that 4000 Germans and Hungarians were gone with several Pieces of Cannon to attack a place called *Balaton*, a League from *Vesprim* towards *Alba Regalis*.

Hague, April 19. The Prince and Princess of Orange are gone from *Dieren* to *Loon*, intending to pass a Fortnight or three Weeks there, and then to return hither. The two Princes of *Saxe Eysenach* parted from hence two days ago for Germany. The Magistrates of *Hamburg* have written to the States General concerning their differences with the Duke of *Zell*, which, it is said, are in a fair way to a Composition. The Ships designed for the *Streights*, under the Command of the Count de *Strum*, are almost ready to sail; and it is believed their number will be increased, upon the News of the *Algerines* having broke with this State. The Heer *Van Staremberg* has Orders to hasten his return to France. The States of *Holland* are adjourned till the beginning of the next Month. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 7th Instant say, that the Duke of *Lorrain* was arrived there from *Inspruck*, and that in a great Council of War, at which he was present, it had been resolved to begin the Campaign with the Siege of *Agria*, notwithstanding the Turks have lately supplied that place with Men and Provisions. That they had an account from *Upper Hungary*, that the Imperialists had drained the Ditches about *Mongatz*, and hoped in a short time to be Masters of the place. That a Party of *Tartars* (being, as was believed, the Vanguard of those the Turks expected in Hungary) had appeared on the Frontiers of *Poland*, with in six Miles of General *Caraffa's* quarters, but that the Imperialists having secured all the Passages, they retired again; And that Lieutenant General de *Mercy* had defeated a Party of 600 Turks, of whom 150 were killed, and the Basis of *Fana*, the Bey of *Lippa*, with an Aga, and several other Officers taken Prisoners.

Paris, April 20. The King has been this week several times abroad in his Coach. The Baron de *Golsheim*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector *Palatin*, had the 18th Instant Audience of his M. C. Majesty, Conducted by the *Sieur de Bonnevil* Introducer of Ambassadors. The Letters from *Madrid* of the 18th past say, That the Moncy which had been seized on Board the French Ship at the *Groyne* was restored to the Captain of the said Vessel.

Whitehall, April 14. Whereas the 12th Instant about Ten at Night, a Robbery was committed near *Isford*, upon Two of His Majesties Mails coming from *Holland*, by Two Persons on Horse back; The One of a Bay Horse, with a white Foot, and the Other of a Grey, One of the Men having on a Black Cap, from which Mails they took in Foreign Gold, Coyned and Uncoynd, Upwards of Five Thousand Pounds Sterling belonging to several Merchants, upon whose Application, His Majesty has been Graciously pleased hereby to promise His Free Pardon to any Person concerned, or privy to the said Robbery, That shall forthwith come in, and declare the same to Philip Frowde, Esq; Governor of His Majesties General Post-Office in *London*, or to any of His Majesties Justices of the Peace, so as the aforesaid Gold may be recovered. And Notice is hereby given, That the Merchants concerned therein, have given Security to the said Mr. Frowde, immediately to pay Five Hundred Pounds Sterling to any Person or Persons that shall discover the said Robbery, so as the said Gold be recovered; Or if only Part thereof, then He or They shall have One Hundred Pounds Sterling immediately paid for every Thousand Pounds so recovered of the said Gold; And if any Person or Persons concerned in the said Robbery, make the Discovery so as the Gold may be recovered, They shall have the same Reward accordingly.
