Vitana, April 4. E have Letters by an Express from the Camp before Mongate, of the 26th of the laft Month, which give an account, That the Besiegers made their approaches to the lower

Town with good fuccefs, not with flanding the continual Fire of the Enemies Cannon : That th , had almost drawn the first Ditch dry, and were preparing Fagots and Sacks with earth to fill it, and when that was done, would give an affault to the Palanque, which they must be Masters of before they can attack the Caffle; And that they had thrown a great many Bon bs into the place, one of which falling in the Room where the Princels Ragotzi was at Dinner, and fetting it on Fire, occasioned a great dif-order among the Besseged, but the Fire was put out without doing any great harm. That Teckeley was polted with 5 or 6000 Men near Gyuls, expecting a great reinforcement of Turks and Tartars, in order to the relief of Mongatz; That General Caprara, upon advice of it, had fent the Baron Baragotzi with 4000 Hungarians, and half of the Regiments of Schultz and Petrini to attack him there. That General Picolomini was drawing a confiderable Body of Men together, with Orders to go and meet the Tartars, and to fecure the Avenues by which they must passinto Hungary. That Licutenant General de Mercy, and the Count de Caraffa, were posted with the Troops under their Command, the first near Zolnocke, and the other on the fide of Zathmar, to observe the Enemy. They write from Lower Hungary, That the Imperialifts having notice that a Party of 300 Men was gone from Canifa to make an Incurfion, they laid an Ambush for them, which fucceeded fo well, that many of the Enemy were killed, and most of the reft taken Prifoners, among which were three Officers of Note. And that the Germans and Hungarians of the Frontier Garilous having formed a Body of about 4000 Men, they marched the laft Week with feveral pieces of Cannon and Mortars, to attack the Fortrefs of Balaton, scituated on the fide of a Lake between Vefprin and Alba Regalis; of the fuccels of which Enterprize we hope to give you a good account in our next. The Duke of Lorrain is expected here to morrow, and the Elector of Bavaria towards the end of this Month; His Electoral Highoeffes Troops, as the last Letters from Municke inform us, were preparing for their march, which they would order fo as to be in *Hungary* by the first of the next Month, the day appointed for the General Ren-dezvous. The Deputies of *Transitvania* continue to complain of the great diforders they fay the Imperial Troops commit in that Countrey, upon which the Emperor has fent directions to General Caprara, to examine whether there be any ground for these Complaints, and if there

be, that better Ofder be observed for the fidture. The Count of Dietrichlein, President of the Chamber of the Finances at Gratz, parted from hence fome days ago, on his return thicher, to fettle the Fonds for the maintenance of the Forces on that fide. The Count de Ziacki, who havely arrived here from Poland, is gone back with a private Commission from the Emperor. The last Week dyed here Count Charles Oxenstere, Enyoy Extraoreina y from the King of Sueden.

Zel, April 9. The Baron Horwart is arrived here from the Emperor, and has had Audience of our Duke; His bulinefs is, to endeavor a Compofure of the Differences between his Highnefs and the City of Hamburgb, and in all appearance he will fucceed in it. It is faid he has likewife Orders to treat about a Body of Men which the Emperor defires the Duke of Zell will affilt him with against the Turks.

Hamburgh, April 9. There has hapned a Rencounter between the Minister of the Duke of Zell, and one of the Deputies of this City, at Fiema, which, it's feared, may fomewhat alter the good dilpolition there feems to be at prefent to an Ac-commodation. These Magiltrates have not yet taken any Refolution upon what was propoled to them by the Baron de Horwart, and the Baron de Goedens, the Imperial Commissioners, about their fending a Deputation to the Duke of Zell, they infifting to have the Troops of that Prince first quit the Territories of this City. In the mean time we are told from Berlin; that these differences do retard the march of the Brandenburgh Forces that are to serve this Campagne in Hungary. The Magistrates of this City have, it's faid, refolved to contribute in Money their Quota of the Subfidy of 50 Roman Months lately granted the Emperor by the States of the Empire affembled at Ratifbonne for the War against the Turks.

Hamburgh, April 12. The Sicur Haxbaufen, Envoy from the King of Denmark, arrived here this day, and has, we are told. Let these Magiftrates know, that the Duke of Zell has given Orders to his Troops to retire out of the Terristories of this City, which has very much increased our hopes of a speedy Accommodation. The Lunenburghers demand 800 Ryxdollars of the Inhabitants of Berfdorf, and 200 of the Four Lands.

Cologne, April 13. The Count de Hobenloe, the Emperor's Envoy, having had feveral Conferences with the Elector of Cologne, and his chief Ministers, upon the present juncture of Affairs, parted from Bonne the 8th Instant for Ausbourg, to affist at the Conference that will be held there the b'ginning of the next Month. We have an account from Duselderpe, that the States of Bergs and Fuliers are separated, after having taken Refolutions upon the several Points proposed to them to the fatisfaction of the Electoral Prince Palatin, who intends to return very suddenly to Heydelberg. and f om thence to Vienna. The Recruits that have been railed by his Highnels will, in few days

begin their march for Hungary. Bruffels, April 13. The Count de Bergeyche is gone tor Flanders, to pay the Troops Quartered to, that Province. Deputies are come hither from the States of Haynault, but we know not yet what their Businels is. The young Prince de Horne, and feveral other Persons of Quality are preparing for their Journey to Vienna, intending to ferve the next Campagne in Hungary. The last Advices from Hungary gave a good account of the Siege of Mongate; The Befiegers were advanced to the Ditch of the lower Town, whichs having drawn, Frov de, Efg; Governor of His Majefties General out the Water, they were going to fill with Fa-1 Po -Office in Lombard-fireer London, or to any gots ; and the Bombs they had thrown into Renaht-General de Metey, the Count de Caraffd, the Count de Picolomini, and the Baron Baragoizi, were abroad with confiderable Bodies of M n to have an eye upon the Turks, and that they would all join together if they found there was occasion for it, and make an Army of above 20000 Men. Ih Croatia and the Lower Hungary, the Imperialists have-lately had feveral fuccefsful Rencounters with the Turks, and the last Letters faid, that 4000 Germans and Hungarians were gone with feveral pieces of Cannon to attack a place called Balaton, a League from Vesprin towards Alba Regalis.

Hague, April 19. The Prince and Prince's of Orange are gone from Dieren to Loo, intending to pais a Fortnight or three Weeks there, and then to return hither. The two Princes of Saxe Eyfenach parted from hence two days ago for Germany. The Magistrates of Humburgh have written to the States General concerning their differences with the Duke of Zell, which, it's faid, are in a fair way to a Composure. The Ships defigned for the Streights, under the Command of the Count de Stirum, are almost ready to fail; and it's believed their number will be encreafed, up n the News of the Algierines having broke with this State. The Heer Van Staremberg has Orders to haften his return to France. The States of Holland are adjourned till the beginning of the next Month. The Letters from Vienne of the 7th Instant fay, that the Duke of Lorrain was arrived there from Inspruck, and that in a great Council of War, at which he was prefent, it had been refolved to begin the Campagne with the Siege of Agria, notwithflanding the Turky have lately supplied that place with Men and Provisions. AT hat they had an account from Upper Hungary, that the Imperialifts had drained the Ditches about Mongaiz, and hoped in a fhort time to be Mafters of the place. That a Party of Tartars (being, as was believed, the Vanguard of those the Turks expected in Hungary) had appeared on the Frontiers of Poland, with in fix Miles of General Caraffa's quarters, but that the Imperializes having fecured all the Paffages, they retired again : And that Licutenant General de Mercy had defeated a Party of 600 Turks, of whom 150 were killed, and the Balla of Fana, the Bey of Lippa, with an Aga, and feveral other Officers taken Prisoners.

The King has been this week Paris . April 20. feveral times abroad in his Coach. The Baron de Golftein, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector Palatin, had the 18th Inftant Audience of his M. C. Majesty, Conducted by the Sicur de Bonnevil Introductor of Ambassadors. The Letters from Madrid of the 18th pass fay, That the Moncy which had been feized on Board the French Ship a: the Groyne was reftored to the Captain of the faid Veffel.
