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Naples, March 12.

THE Marquis de Licbe, Viceroy of this Kingdom, has received Orders from Madrid, to put in execution the Project for the Coining of New Money. His Excellency has stopt the payment of the Pensions and Salaries of several Officers, upon the advice he has receiv'd of the great Reform that has been resolved on in the Council of Spain. Don Sigismond Rbo, Baron of Villermin, is arrived here, to take possession of the Command of Lieutenant General of the Horse in this Kingdom, which his Catholick Majesty has conferred upon him. Yesterday did here Signior Marcello Grassi, President of the Royal Chamber, being near 100 year old. The Gallies of this Kingdom will be ready to put to Sea before the end of this Month, they will be eleven in number, and are to join with six of Sicily, four of Sardinia, and seven of the Duke of Turfs Squadron.

Genova, April 7. The 2d Instant in the night, an English Ship called *The Golden Fleeces*, richly laden for the Coast of Spain, was, through the carelessness of one of the Seamen, burnt in this Port with all her Lading; 14 Men were lost in her, the rest with the Captain very narrowly escaping. We have advice that the Algerines have taken three or four Dutch Vessels.

Dantzick, April 2. The Letters from Poland tell us, that the Tartars of the Garison of Caminiec were marched from thence, to join with Sultan Galga; and that they had Advice, that another Body of 10 or 12000 Tartars was marching to make an Incurtion into that Kingdom. The same Letters inform us, that the Cossacks had, on the 10th of the last Month, defeated a great Party of Tartars near *Miedzibos*, about 300 of them being killed, and many taken Prisoners. The Polish Ambassadors at Moscow had, according to our last Advice from thence, been in Conference with the Commissioners appointed by the Czars to treat with them, the success of which we expect to hear by our next.

Vienna, April 7. The Duke of Lorraine arrived here the 15th Instant from *Insprucke*, and the next day assisted at a Council of War that was held in the Emperor's presence, where, we are told, it was resolved to fix the general Rendezvous of the Army for the first of the next Month, and to begin the Campaign with the Siege of *Agria*. The Letters from the Camp before *Mongatz* of the 26th past, say, the Besiegers had carried their Trenches to the Ditch of the Lower Town, out of which they had drawn most of the Water, and that their Cannon had begun to make a Breach, and to ruine the Defences of the Enemies Works on the side where they intended to give an Assault, but that the Besieged shewed still a resolution to defend the place to the last extremity. That Lieutenant-General

Caraffi had secured the Avenues by which the Tartars must pass into Hungary; That a Party of Tartars had appeared on the Coastlines of the County of *Marmotes*, but presently retired again; And that the said General had sent out a Detachment to attack Count *Tockeley*, who he heard was with 3 or 400 Men in a Village not far from *Gyula*. From *Zolnocke* we have an account, that Lieutenant General *de Mercy*, after having been Encamped for several days with the Troops under his orders near the River *Maros*, passed that River with a design to attack *Schonot*, but receiving advice that the Enemy were marching to possess themselves of the Bridge of *Arad*, he sent the Sieurs *Peterbass* and *Schemszi* before with a Detachment of Hussars and Dragoons, to prevent them, while he himself followed with the rest of the Troops: 600 Turks had passed the said Bridge before the Sieur *Peterbass* arrived there, whom he charged, and the Fight was very sharp between them, but the Turks were at last defeated; 150 of them being killed upon the place, 30 taken Prisoners, among which were the Bey of *Lippa* and an Aga Balla of *Fena*, and the rest put to flight.

Vienna, April 11. The Letters from the Camp before *Mongatz* of the 31 past, give an account, That they had the day before shot 50 Bombs into the Castle, which caused some disorder among the Rebels; That the Besiegers continued their work with good success for the draining the great Ditch of the Lower Town, which is about 36 foot broad, and 20 deep, and hoped in few days to have finished it, when they would give an Assault to the Palanque, where in the mean time they had begun to make a breach with their Cannon. The same Letters say, That General *Caraffa* had sent out several Parties in search of *Tockeley*, who wandered about with 3 or 400 Horse on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, where he had burnt divers Villages, but that they were come back without being able to meet with him; And that Prince *Abafsi* did assemble his Troops, but it was not known with what design. We are told, That the Imperial Troops that have their Quarters in the Hereditary Countries, are ordered to begin their march the 20th instant towards Hungary, where the Auxiliary Forces of *Brandenburgh* and *Saxony* are expected before the end of this month. The Letters from *Poland* of the 31 past tell us, That the King intended to part in few days from *Zolkiew*, to take a review of some Forces he had ordered to be drawn together at *Slodziejow*, and from thence would go to *Lemberg*, where he had appointed a great Council of War to be held. The Deputies of *Transylvania* have, upon the directions they received this week by two Expresses from their Principals, had several conferences with the Emperor's Ministers, but what passed there is kept private. The said Deputies are preparing to return home.

Berlin, April 12. The 8000 Men which our Elector has promised to send to the Emperor's assistance are to Rendezvous the 18th of this Month at *Crossen*, and the 20th they will begin their march towards *Hungary*. The Auxiliary Forces of *Saxony* will be ready to begin their march about the same time, under the Command of *Duke Christian of Saxe-Hall*.

Hamburg, April 15. The *Lunenburghers* have quitted the Town and Castle of *Berisdorf*, and the *Four Lands*, but some of their Troops are still posted in the Isle of *Moorwerden*, from whence Lieutenant-General *Chauvet* has let these Magistrates know they shall likewise retire, so soon as the Vessels that were fitted out from hence to cruise on the *Elbe* are recalled; which having been complied with on this side, and Orders sent for that purpose to the Captain that commands these Vessels, we are expecting to hear that Monsieur *Chauvet* has likewise withdrawn his Troops out of that Island; Things being thus disposed, it's hoped an Accommodation of the Differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City will soon follow, to which the Deputation our Magistrates have resolved to send to that Prince, will doubtless very much contribute.

Hague, April 21. We have advice by Letters from *Cadix*, that the *Algerines* have taken four Vessels belonging to *Zealand*, on pretence that their Passports were not in due form. Prince *Casimir of Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friesland* and *Groningen*, is expected here with the Princess his Wife the beginning of the next Month. The *Lunenburgh* Troops having quitted the Territories of the City of *Hamburg*, it's not doubted but those Magistrates will agree to what has been proposed by the Imperial Ministers for the accommodating their differences with the Duke of *Zell*.

Brussels, April 19. Count *Salazar*, Lieutenant-General of the Horse in the service of these Countries, parted from hence this day with several Persons of Quality who accompanied him for *Osford*, to embark there for *England*. Yesterday was held here a Council of War, at which assisted all the Governors of Provinces and the principal Officers of the Army that were in Town. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 7th Instant, said, the *Transylvanian* Deputies had assured the Emperor, that Prince *Abassii*, and the States of that Country, will faithfully perform what they have promised by the Treaty lately concluded at *Vienna*; That the Siege of *Mongatz* advanced very well; And that Lieutenant-General *de Mercy* had defeated a Party of 600 *Turks*, of whom 100 were killed upon the place, and between 40 and 50 taken Prisoners, most of them Officers.

Brussels, April 23. The Prince *de Rache*, Governor of the Province of *Haynault*, who came hither to make his Compliment to our Governor General, is gone back to *Mons*. The Sieur *de Tirimont* arrived here yesterday from *Madrid*, to take possession of the place the King of *Spain* has given him in the Council of State, and in that of the Finances of these Countries. We are told from the New Conquests, that the *French* Troops are preparing for an Encampment, but we do not hear that the place is yet appointed. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 14th Instant, tell us, that the *Imperialists* before *Mongatz* were, according to their last Advices, still employed in draining the Ditch of the Lower Town, which was very broad and deep, and that they had provided a great number of *Fagots* and *Sacks* with earth to fill it. And that the Prince of *Transylvania* was drawing his Troops together, but whether to join with *Teckeley*, or the *Imperialists*, was uncertain.

Paris, April 24. The *Marschal d'Estree* failed the 12th instant with the Fleet from *Brest*; and it's believed the Duke of *Morsemar* is by this time likewise at Sea with the Ships under his command from *Toulon*. The affair of the *Groyn*e is quite ended, all the Effects that were seized there on board the French Ship being restored to the Captain of the said Vessel. The Court at *Madrid* has also given Orders for restoring what was taken about three months ago out of another French Ship at *Malaga*. And we are told that the difference about the 500 thousand Crowns raised in the *West Indies* on the Merchants who had French Effects in their hands is likewise accommodated.

Whereas several Persons that were in, and Accessory to the Late Robbery committed upon the Holland Mails, have been Apprehended and Committed to Newgate (and some of the Gold recovered) by whose Confessions it appears, that *John Smith*, and *Richard Alborough*, were principal Actors in the said Robbery, and had for their Share about Five and Twenty Hundred Pounds Sterling, in Foreign Gold, Coyned and Uncoynd; These are to give Notice, That if any Person or Persons can Apprehend Them, or Either of Them, He or They shall have Twenty Pound for Each, with a further Reward at the Rate of 10 l. per Cent, for the said Gold that shall be recovered from Them; Or if any Person or Persons can discover the said Gold, though without Apprehending of them, shall have the same Reward of 10 l. per Cent, upon Notice given thereof to *Philip Frowde Esq;* Governor of His Majesties Generall Post-Office in *Lombard-street*, *London*.
