W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An "Act for carrying into effect the reports of the "Commissioners appointed to consider the state of "the Established Church in England and Wales, "with reference to ecclesiastical duties and "revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal "dioceses, revenues and patronage," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the "Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners "for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying 'into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established 'Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as 'they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and 'patronage,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ec-'clesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for abolishing peculiar and exempt jurisdictions in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas it is by the first-recited Act enacted that we shall from time to time prepare and lay before your Majesty in Council schemes for carrying into effect certain recommendations therein recited (inter alia, that the limits of deanries and archdeaconries be newly arranged, so that every parish and extra-parochial place be within a rural deanry, and every deanry within an archdea-conry,) and it is provided that it shall be competent to us to propose in any such scheme that all parishes, churches, or chapelries which are locally situate in any diocese, but subject to any peculiar jurisdiction other than the jurisdiction of the bishop of the diocese in which the same are locally situate, shall be only subject to the jurisdiction of the bishop of the diocese within which such parishes, churches, or chapelries are locally situate:

"And whereas by the second'y-recited Act it

is declared and enacted, that the arrangements with reference to peculiar or exempt jurisdictions which we are, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, empowered and authorized to propose in any scheme for carrying into effect any of the recommendations therein recited, may be recommended and proposed in any scheme or schemes, whether relating to such arrangements solely, or also to any other matter and thing contained in any or either of the Acts therein recited,

or of the Act now in recital:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Ely, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that on and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council for ratifying this scheme shall be first published in the London Gazette, all parishes and places locally situate within the limits of the said diocese of Ely, and of the several archdeaconries of the same respectively, and all churches and chapels, and the whole clergy, and others, your Majesty's subjects, locally situate within the limits of such parishes and places respectively, shall, notwithstanding any peculiar or other ecclesiastical jurisdiction, or exemption from jurisdiction, which any of such parishes, places, churches, chapels, clergy, or others, may possess or be subject to, or claim to possess or be subject to, be respectively under and subject only to the jurisdiction and authority of the Bishop of Ely, and of the respective archdeacons of the several archdeaconries of the said diocese of Ely, within the limits of which they shall respectively be so locally situate, except the cathedral church of Ely, which shall remain and be subject to the jurisdiction and visitation to which the same is now by law subject, and to none other; provided always that nothing herein contained shall in any manner prejudice or affect any rights, privileges, or exemptions of the University of Cambridge, or of any college or hall thereof, except so far as relates to the exercise of any ecclesiastical jurisdiction by any such college or hall, or the head thereof, over any parish, or the churches or chapels of such parish, or the clergy or others within the same.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Wm. L. Bathurst.

THEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in

the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the "Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the

words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, in Dean Forest, and of the parishes of English Bicknor, Newland, and Ruar-dean, all in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, Dean Forest, and of the said parishes of English Bicknor, Newland, and Ruardean, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of the Holy Jesus, situate at Lydbrook, in the said ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, Dean Forest, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this pur-pose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amend-'ment of the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged or extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts. and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Lydbrook,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: commencing on the western bank of the river Wye, at the point where the hedge forming the separation between Enclosures No. 2 and No. 3 on the tithe commutation map of the parish of English Bicknor, meets such river, and from thence proceeding south-westerly along the hedges separating Enclosure No. 2 from Nos. 3 and 6, and then by the hedge of Enclosure No. 7, also from No 6, as far as the lane leading to Lydbrook, then proceeding south-easterly along the middle of that lane to the hedge separating Enclosure No. 26 from Enclosure No. 36, and also Enclosure No. 27 from No. 36, then along that hedge south-westerly as far as the hedge of Enclosure No. 32, then south-easterly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 36 from Enclosure No. 32, then southerly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 32 from Enclosures Nos. 35 and 33, then (crossing the lane leading to Tump Farm House), over to the hedge separating Enclosure No. 85 from Enclosure No. 84, then proceeding southerly along such hedge, and also the hedge separating Enclosure No. 88 from Enclosure No. 89, then turning easterly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 89 from Enclosure No. 90, as far as Enclosure No. 81, then south-westerly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 90 from Enclosures Nos. 81 and 91, as far as the western side of Enclosure No. 91, then proceeding southerly, and south-easterly, along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 92 from Enclosure No. 91, as far as Enclosure No. 76, then southerly along the hedge sepa-

rating Enclosure No. 92 from Enclosure No. 76, then westerly and south-westerly, along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 92 from Enclosure No. 75, as far as Enclosure No. 74, then south-easterly and southerly, along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 74 from Enclosure No. 75, as far as Enclosure No. 73, then easterly and scutherly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 73 from Enclosures Nos. 75, 76, and 72, as far as the Enclosure No. 154, then easterly along the hedge separating Enclosure No. 72 from Enclosure No. 154, (all on the tithe commutation map of the parish of English Bicknor,) and from the southern hedge of Enclosure No. 72, in a southerly and south-westerly direction along the boundary line which separates the said parish of English Bicknor from the Holy Trinity district of the Forest of Dean, as far as the lane leading from Eastbach to Mitchel Dean, then down that lane in a southerly direction to the turnpike-road leading from Coleford to Mitchel Dean, then following that road south-easterly towards Mitchel Dean, for about a mile and a quarter past Mirey Stock, and the Severn and Wye tramway, as far as the lane leading to Serridge Green, there leaving the turnpike-road, turning to the left in a direction nearly due north, and striking first across the open forest, and then across the Pluds Enclosure in a perfectly straight line to the Enclosure Gate leading out to Eddys-lane, then proceeding up that lane in a northerly direction, having the encroachments Nos. 103, 102, 101, 100 and 121, on the forest map on the right hand, and Nos. 90, 99, 98 and 97, on the said map on the left hand, as far as the parish of Ruardean, then turning to the left in a westerly and north-easterly direction along the boundary line which separates that parish, first from the ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, and then from a detached portion of the parish of Newland, and then again turning north-westerly and westerly, along the line separating the said parish of Ruardean from the ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, as far as the lane at the extremity of that tongue of land forming part of the said ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity at Lydbrook, just above the river Wye, then following that lane in a northwesterly direction down to the turnpike-road from Lydbrook to Ross, and across that road to the river side, then down the river, following the boundary, first of the parish of Ruardean, and afterwards of the parish of English Bicknor, as far as the point where the hedge forming the separation between Enclosures No. 2 and No. 3, on the tithe commutation map of the parish of English Bicknor, meets the river, being the point from which this description commenced, as such consolidated chapelry of Lydbrook is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, green,

pink, and blue.
"That the consents of the Right Reverend James Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, of the Right Honourable Edward Geoffry, Earl of Derby, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury (on behalf of your Majesty as patron of the aburab of the collections) jesty, as patron of the church of the said ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, Dean Forest), of the Visitors of the Foundation of John Michel, Esquire, in the Queen's College, in Oxford (patrons of the parish church of the said parish of English Bicknor), of the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of the diocese of Llandaff (patron in right of his see of the parish church of the said parish of Newland), and of the Reverend Thomas Huntingford, Master of Arts, Precentor of the cathedral church of Hereford, and patron (in right of such precentorship) of the parish church of the said parish of Ruardean, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Lydbrook, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said James, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, Edward Geoffry, Earl of Derby, Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, and Thomas Huntingford, have respectively signed and sealed this representation, and the said Visitors of the Foundation of the said John Michel have hereunto affixed their corporate or common seal.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Edward Geoffry, Earl of Derby (on behalf of your Majesty, as patron of the church of the said ecclesiastical district of the Holy Trinity, Dean Forest,) and the said Visitors of the Foundation of the said John Michel, the said Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, and Thomas Huntingford, as such respective patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned), and of the said James Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church at Lydbrook aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised alternately by your Majesty, your heirs or successors, and by the said Visitors of the Foundation of the said John Michel, but that the first right of presentation and appointment as aforesaid should be exercised by your Majesty, your heirs or successors.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Lydbrook, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. "Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Eynsford and Saint Mary Cray, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of All Souls, situate at Crocken Hill, in the said parish of Eynsford, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for 'the further amendment of the Church Building 'Acts;' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Crocken Hill,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: commencing at the junction of the parish of Farningham with the parish of Eynsford (at the point marked A, on the map or plan hereunto annexed), on the road leading from Little Wested Cross to the high road, near the Hop Pole Inn, the boundary line is continued south by the road aforesaid, to Little Wested Cross, where it joins the road from Crocken Hill to Eynsford; thence south-east by the said road leading to Eynsford, to the south-east corner of the field numbered 68 on the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Eynsford; thence by the southern boundary fence of the said field, until it joins one, No. 67, on such last-mentioned map; thence by the eastern and southern fences of the said field, to field No. 66, on such map, by the south fence of which field it passes to the eastern fence of field No. 56; and then southerly along the fences of fields Nos. 55, 54 and 77, until it joins the parish of Lullingstaine, at the south-east angle of the said field No. 77; thence westerly by the boundary line of the parish of Lullingstaine, crossing the road from Well Hill to the junction of the said parish of Saint Mary Cray, at the south-west angle of a field, No. 406; thence it proceeds north-westerly, bounded by the parish of Saint Mary Cray, crossing the road from Saint Mary Cray to Crocken Hill; thence in a direction north-east, bounded by the parish of Saint Mary Cray, to its junction with a road called Back Lane, leading from the north-western corner of Crocken Hill Green to Stone's Cross; thence northerly by the said Back Lane, to a plot of ground, marked No. 255, on the tithe commutation map of the parish of Saint Mary Cray, on the west side of the said lane (which plot is included in the said consolidated chapelry); thence north-east by the said Back Lane, to the plots of ground severally numbered 258, 259 and 260, on the last-mentioned map (all lying contiguous to each other on the north side of the said lane, called Back Lane, and all of which said plots are included within the said consolidated chapelry of Crocken Hill); thence north-east, by the said lane, to Stone's Cross, where it joins the road leading from Crocken Hill to Swanley; thence by the last-mentioned road southerly to the point of junction of the parishes of Saint Mary Cray, Sutton-at-Hone, and Eynsford; thence, passing north-easterly, it is bounded by the parish of Sutton-at-Hone, to the junction

It is hereby notified, that the Earl of Malmesbury, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty a Copy of a Despatch, dated the 11th of February last, from Henry William Bruce, Esq. Commodore and Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Naval Forces on the West Coast of Africa, informing their Lordships that he had issued the following Notification of the raising of the blockade of certain ports and places in the Bight of Benin:

### Her Britannic Majesty's steam ship Penelope, Whydah, February 11, 1852.

Notice is hereby given, that the Kings and Chiefs of the places noted in the margin,\* having entered into engagements with Her Britannic Majesty's Government for the complete abolition of the traffic in slaves, their sea coast and ports are to be exempt from the operations of the blockade established by me on the 6th of December last, and to be considered free as heretofore for the purposes of legitimate trade.
