Venice, April 131 This morning arrived here an Express, by the way of Otranto, from Corfou, with the News that Captain-Sceneral Morofhi, upon advice that Eight thousand Turks were marching towards Zarnatz , failed the 26th pall with the Fleet from Corfou, and having landed his Troops as near as he could to the faid place, attacked the Furks in the night ; of whom 3000 were flain, 800 taken, with all their Baggage and Cannon, and the reft put to flight; of which you may expect a more particular Account in our next.

Vienna April 14, The laft Letters from Zol-nocke told us, shat Licutenant-General de Mercy, having advice that the Orroman Forces on that fide were figparated, had fent the Troops he drew together to observe them back to their several Quarters. The General Rendezvous of the Imperial Army is appointed to be on the 15th of the next Month; It's faid the Prince of Transilvania will join his Forces with those of the Emperor against the Turks.

Hague, April 30. The States General have ratified the Inflrument for the including the Elector of Brandenburgh in the Treaty of Alliance lately renewed between the King of Sueden and this State. They write from Cleves, that the Landtgrave of Heffe-Caffel was expected there in few days, and that from thence he would go to Berlin, to confer with the Elector of Brandenburgh about the prefent Juncture of Affairs.

Yefterday our Governor Brussels, April 30. General went from hence for Flanders, accompanied with a great many Persons of Quality; He will be this night at Gauns, and on Thursday at Bruges, and is not expected back here till the begi ning of the next week. The French, we are told, are preparing for three Encampments, one in Artow, another between the Sambre and the Meuse, and the third on the Saar. The Letters from Vienna of the 18th Instant tell us, that the Rebels in Mongatz make a very vigorous defence, and that the Imperialifts carry on their Galleries with a great deal of difficulty.

Farn, May 1. 9 The Marcfchal d'Effree failed from Breft the 19th paft, with Nine Men of War, and Four Firefhips, befides Tenders ; And the next day the Sicur de Villette joined him with the four Ships under his Command. And we have 'ikewife advice, that the Duke de Mortemar failed the 20th of the fame Month from Toylon with nine Men of War, three Firefhips, three Galiots with Mortars, and three Fly-boats carrying Ammunition and Rombs. The King has made Four new Knights of the Order, the Duke de Chartres, the Duke de Bourbon, the Prince de Conti, and the Duke du Maine.

Dublin, April 19.
