His Majefly taking into His Royal Confideration the faid Request, is Graciously pleased to Declare. That such Merchants, Fasters, Matters of Ships, or other Persons that shall ofe the Method hereafter following, in the Hiring of Servants for His Majesties Plantations, shall not be Disquie, sed by any Suit on His Majesties behalf, but upon Certificate thereof, that He will cause all such Suits to be stopped, to the end they may receive no further molestation thereby.
