WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;" and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for augmenting the income of the archdeaconry of Stow, in the diocese of Lincoln:

"Whereas by the first recited Act it is enacted, that any archdeaconry may, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed, amongst other modes, by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as to raise the average annual income to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, provided that no archdeacon shall be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation or other emolument as such archdeacon, under the provisions of the same Act, unless he shall be resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry is situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licences for non-residence, which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and the residence of the clergy in the same Act mentioned; and it

is by the said first-recited Act further enacted, that, upon the endowment of an archdeaconry being made under the provisions thereof, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments (except any right of patronage) belonging to such archdeaconry at the time of such endowment may, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of any archdeacon in possession at the time of the passing of the same Act, and by the authority therein provided, be vested in us for the purposes of the same Act:

"And whereas by the secondly recited Act it is declared and enacted, that in the case of any archdeaconry which shall no longer be held by the archdeacon who was at the time of the passing of the said first recited Act in possession thereof, the provisions of the same Act which relate to the transfer to us of the estates of any archdeaconry upon its endowment in either of the modes therein provided, shall be construed and held to authorize such transfer with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of the archdeacon in possession of the archdeaconry at the time:

"And whereas the said archdeaconry of Stow is endowed with the prebend of Liddington, in the cathedral church of Lincoln, and the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments thereunto belonging, now demised upon a lease for lives, and the remaining emoluments of the said archdeacon do not exceed the annual sum of thirty pounds:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, and of the Venerable William Brocklehurst Stonehouse, the present Archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Stow, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the said common fund to the said William Brocklehurst Stonehouse and his successors in the said archdeaconry, so long as he or they shall respectively hold the same, and shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the said first recited Act, the annual sum of one hundred and seventy pounds, on the first day of May in every year, and every such whole yearly payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate under the hand of the bishop of the diocese for the time being, that the said William Brocklehurst Stonehouse, or his successor for the time being in the said archdeaconry, has duly resided as aforesaid, during the preceding year, or on the production to us of a licence of non-residence, and that the first such yearly payment shall be made on the first day of May next; and further, that all lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments whatsoever, whether

belonging to the said prebend or otherwise, at any time heretofore annexed to and now forming part of the endowment of the said archdeaconry of Stow, shall forthwith be disannexed therefrom and become and be absolutely transferred to and vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts :

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled ‘ An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of ‘ populous parishes,’ have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of York, and now vested in us.

“ Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne,) all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase-money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other heredita-

ments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

“ And whereas, under the provisions of the said Acts, and of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and ratifying certain agreements between us and the Very Reverend William Cockburn, Dean of the cathedral church of York, we have become actually possessed of and entitled, in fee simple, to all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said deanery, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof:

“ We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said deanery, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for regulating the incomes of the present holder of the fifth canonry, and all future deans and canons, of the cathedral church of Lichfield:

"Whereas it is by the first recited Act enacted that, so soon as conveniently may be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us and a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same), such annual sums shall be determined on to be paid, and shall accordingly be paid by us, or such deductions shall be allowed to be made out of the proceeds of any suspended canonry or canonries, as, after due enquiry and calculation, shall give to the dean of every cathedral and collegiate church in England an average annual income of one thousand pounds, and to the respective canons of every cathedral church in England an average annual income of five hundred pounds:

"And whereas, by the secondly recited Act, it is declared and enacted that, notwithstanding such last recited provision, it shall be lawful to carry such purpose into effect by any mode of payment or contribution which may be deemed fit, as well as by the mode in the said first recited Act specified, and that the scale of payments and receipts may from time to time in any case be revised, and, if need be, varied by the like authority, so as to preserve, as nearly as may be, the intended average annual incomes respectively, but not so as to affect any dean or canon in possession at the time of making any such variation:

"And whereas the fifth canonry in the said cathedral church has recently become vacant and the Venerable Thomas Hill has since been appointed thereto:

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the incomes of the dean and canons in the said cathedral church are subject to great fluctuation and uncertainty, and that it is expedient that the following arrangement should be adopted for regulating the incomes of the present canon of the said fifth canonry, and all future deans and canons, of the said cathedral church:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that with respect to the present canon of the said fifth canonry, and every dean and canon of the said cathedral church of Lichfield to be hereafter appointed, there shall be delivered to us, by the treasurer of such church in every year, so soon as conveniently may be after the annual audit of the accounts of the chapter of the said church, a correct account in writing, in such form, and verified in such manner, as we shall from time to time direct, shewing the moneys which, accord-

ing to the statutes and usage of the said cathedral church or the chapter thereof, shall have become due and payable to such dean or canon in respect of the deanery or of any such canonry of the said cathedral church out of the corporate revenues thereof, for the year ending on the day up to which such accounts shall have been so audited as aforesaid; and that if at any time it shall appear by any such account that the amount so due and payable out of the said corporate revenues shall, in the case of such dean, exceed the sum of one thousand pounds, or in the case of any such canon, the sum of five hundred pounds, then in every such case the amount of the surplus shall, at the same time, be paid by the said treasurer to our credit, at the Bank of England, and that upon any account so delivered being examined and approved by our treasurers for the time being, their receipt for the amount of any such surplus shall be given to the said treasurer of the said cathedral church, and shall be a good and valid discharge for the same, and that if at any time it shall appear by any such account, that the amount so due and payable in the case of the dean of the said cathedral church shall be less than the sum of one thousand pounds, or in the case of any canonry, the amount so due and payable shall be less than the sum of five hundred pounds, then in every such case there shall be paid by us forthwith to such treasurer, on account of such dean or canon, such a sum of money as shall make up the deficiency, and the receipt of such treasurer, countersigned by such dean or canon, as the case may be, shall be a good and sufficient discharge for any claim which any such dean or canon may have on us in respect of the average annual income to which he may be entitled for the year to which the same account relates, under the provisions of the said first recited Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the dean and canons of the said cathedral church of Lichfield, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that on or about the twenty-third day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, your Majesty's said Commissioners (with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the diocese of Winchester) made a representation to your Majesty in Council that it appeared to them to be expedient, and therefore humbly prayed that a particular district might be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate in the parish of Richmond, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that the district so proposed to be assigned to the said church of Saint John should be named 'Saint John's District,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those set forth in the said representation, and next hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: It commences on the west side of the high road leading from Richmond Hill, by Home Castle, east, to a boundary line of Richmond parish, north, north-east, and north along that line, west to Green-lane, so as to include a place called the Conduit and premises occupied by Legg, Esq. on the east side of Green-lane and Blind-lane, to Sandy-lane, continues westward down Sandy-lane, south side of Kew Heath, south-west down Kew-lane to a mark X on the south-west angle of the boundary wall of Kew or Richmond Gardens, from thence proceeds west-south-west and north-west to part of the Royal Gardens, east to Duke's-court and a house and garden in the occupation of the Misses Millaken, marked X, which house is not included in Saint John's District, south-east to Old Flower Garden, Little Green, Duke's-lane, south side of late Town Pond and World's End, continuing north side of road leading from Richmond to Marsh-gate and Spring-terrace, south-west to Paradise-row, south-east to Mount Ararat, Warple Way, and Friar's Stile, south-west to a footway leading from the Vineyard to Friar's Stile, and south-east to a point where it commenced on the west side of the high road, near Home Castle, and which district was more particularly delineated on the plan annexed to the said representation, and thereon coloured pink.

"That, by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of November one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight, your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the proposed assignment of the said district, and to order that the same should be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said

parish of Richmond, and also of the said district which was so assigned to the said church of Saint John, it appears to them to be expedient that the boundaries of such district should be altered under or by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged and extended by the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that the boundaries next hereinafter set forth should be substituted for those comprised in the said Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-ninth day of November one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight; that is to say:

"The boundary line of Saint John's district to commence on the west side of the high road leading from Richmond Hill, on the east side of Home Castle, to a boundary line of Richmond parish, north, so as to include the conduit, and also that part of the ground in Richmond parish, which is occupied by William Frederick Gostling, Esquire, north-east along the boundary line separating the parishes of Richmond and Mortlake, as far as Sandy-lane, then westward down Sandy-lane, into Kew-road, south-west along the middle of Kew-road, to the boundary fence separating the Royal Gardens from part of the old Deer Park, then running westerly along such fence for about three hundred yards, then running south-westerly to the corner of the wall of the footpath, and continuing along such boundary wall, until it reaches the bridge, over the line of the Windsor, Staines, and South Western Railway, near the north corner of Richmond Green, and entrance into the old Deer Park, then easterly along the north side of the line of that railway, up to the railway bridge in Park Shot-road, formerly called Kew Foot-lane, and passing thence south-westerly along the road to the corner of Duke-street, then up that street, eastwardly along the south side of the late Mechanics Institution, (formerly the site of the Old Town Pond), and along the middle of the road leading from Richmond to Marshgate, as far as Spring-terrace, south-west to the end of Spring-terrace, and the corner of a road formerly a worple way, leading to Mount Ararat, then southerly along that road to Friar's Stile, then south-easterly along the north-east side of the footway, through a field leading to Home Castle, to the point where the boundary commences, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"That the consents of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, of the Provost and Fellows of King's College, within the University of Cambridge, (patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Richmond,) and of the Reverend Harry Dupuis, Bachelor of Divinity, (Vicar and Incumbent of the said parish church), have been severally obtained to such proposed alteration of boundaries as aforesaid, as required by the two Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof, the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, has hereto set his hand and seal the twenty-sixth day of May one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, the said Harry Dupuis has also hereto set his hand and seal, the twenty-fourth day of May in the same year, and the said provost

and fellows have, on the twelfth day of May in the same year, hereto affixed their common or college seal.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the boundaries of the said district, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Potterne, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Worton, in the said parish of Potterne, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and also in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes;' or under and by virtue of

any and every other power or authority in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should consist of the tithings of Worton and Marston, and should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Worton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Worton is bounded on the north and north-east by the parish of Paulshot, and the remaining part of the said parish of Potterne; on the south-east by the parish of West Lavington; on the south by the tithing of Littleton, and the parish of Great Chiverell; and on the west by the chapelry of Erle Stoke, and the tithing of Bulkington, as such district chapelry of Worton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church at Worton aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent for the time being of such church.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.
