## Legborne, April 3.

Ť a Veffel arrived here in fix weeks from *smirna*, we have advice, that an Order had been published there, as well as in other parts of the Ottoman Empire, requiring all the old Fanifaries that received any Pay from the Grand Signiot, to repair to the Army, which most of them obeyed with great unwillingness. That the new Levies which had been made for the War, were already very much diminished by Defertion; And that the Deferters having formed themselves into feveral Pands, did spoil the Country, and had plundered the Caravan that was paffing from Conflantinople to Smirna, and had made aBooty of 50000 Sequins, and killed feveral Armenian Merchants who went about to defend themfelves. We do not hear of any confiderable Fleet the Turks will have at Sea this Summer, their Gallies being in a very ill condition, and the Land-Soldiers having been taken out of them by the Captain Bacha, to

reinforce the Outoman Forces in the Morea. Venice, April 9. We have an account from Corfon, that the Troops of the Milaneze arrived there the zoth paft, and that Captain-General Morofini failed from thence with the whole Fleet the zoth of the fame Month. This week arrived here a Veffel from Malta; the Mafter whereof reports, that those Gallies pretended to fet Sail the 15th of the last Month, to join the Venetian Fleet. Signior Cornaro, Proveditor General of Dalmatia, is arrived at Zdra; fiom whence Signior Pietro Valiier 'returned hither the 4th Inflant. We have advice from Du-#azzo, that so Companies ( 300 Men in each ) of the new Levies, the Grand Viller had ordered to be made for this Campagne, had been fent towards Belgrades but that above half of the Men rdeferted in their .march. And that Solyman Batha, who commands in Albania, had Orders to raife what Men he could for the War, and to oblige all perfons to bear Arms that were capable of it, which had made many of the richeft Families retife from

thence into the Countrey of Cimarra. Venice, April 19. Yefferday atrived here an Express from Parto Vitula, with Letters of the first Instant, which give the following Account; That the Captain Balla having formed a Body of 10066 Foot, and 3000 Horse, marched towards Shialafa, and belieged that place, in which was a Garilon of 2000 Men, and sailed a Battery against it of fix pieces of Cannon a which having made a Breach, he feut a Summon's to the Belieged, with an offer of very good Conditions, but was aniwered by Signior Gritti the Governor, That they were in too good a conditions defend the place.

to think of forrendring it; That in the mean time the Captain-General Morofini, upon advice from Signior Carnaro General of the Illands, who was Cruifing in the Gulph of Coron, of what had pafled, failed witho the Fleet to Runto Vitulo, where he arrived the 35th paft, and holding a Council of War, refolved to land 3000 Menawho, with 2000 Maynored, fnould march to Chialafa, and attack the Enemy in their Trenches ; And that notice thould be given of their defign to t & Befieged, that they might at the fame time fally out of the Town. These Troops, advanced accordingly towards the Enemy; and having attacked in the Night a Poll which the Turks had fecured at a little diffa ge from their Camp, they eafly pollelled themfilves of it, intending the next morning by break of day to fall into the Enemies Camp, but the Turks ha-ving notice of the approach of our Forces, tailed the Siego, which had lasted ten days, and marched off very filently in the night. The Venetians ; fo foon as they knew the Enemies Retreat, purfued them, and overtaking their Cannon, took it, cutting in pieces most of the Jurks that guarded it, which were about 500; and taking the reft Prifoners, with the loss only of 10 Men on their fide ; And when these Letters were written ; the

Maynotes' were in farther purfuit of the Enemyer Warfam, March 29. The King of Poland according to Jun lait Letters from Zakiero, parted from thence the 20th of this Month for Acopol, intending to flay there and at Zloczon-till the b. ginning of May, and then to go to the general Rendezvous of the Army. The Tartars have of lare made great Ravages in the Province of Podolis, but feveral of their Parties have, been defeated by the Coffacks; and the Forces of the Crown. I

Vienna, April 18. Prince Louis of Baden, Ge-neral of the Impenial Cavalry, and feveral other General Officers that are to serve in diangary, are come hither within these few days, to order their Affairs here before they go to the Army, which is to Rendezvous the 15th of the next Month, between Comorra and Barkani There are held liere daily Confultations of War, and for the most partin the Emperor's prefease of Andwe are told it is refolved, That the Imperial Forces, which, with the Auxiliary Troops of the Princes of the Empire, will amount to 94009Men, fhall be divided in two Armics, but that they ihall act fo as that if there be occasion, they may join and affilt each others; And that the Campagne fail be opened with the Siege of Agria, for that it is a place of that importance, that if it remains in the hands of the Turks, the Imperialists will not be able to maintain Zolnocke, and the other places they have lately taken on the other fide of the Theiffe 3 And that the Baron dd Falkenham, Vice-Commillary Generalibl the Army, pasted from hence this wack

week with a Convoy of Money to provide Maga facs for the fublilience of the Army while they are employed in this Siege. Some of the General Officers as well of the Bavarian as Brandenburgh Troops are come hither, to concert matters concerning the march of these Forces; And in the mean time great quantities of Provisions are brought down the Danube, to fill the Magazin:s which are ordered to be made in Hungary for their fublistence. The Elector of Bavaria continues in his refolu ion to command his Forces in Perfon this Campagne, and defires, it's faid, to act with them on the fide of Croatia; He is expected here the beginning of the next Month. We have advice that the Imperial Troops that were detached from Vefprin, Raab, and other Frontier places of Lower Hungary, have taken by affault the Caffle of Paloita, scituated about two Miles from Alba Regalin; And that the Turks apprchending the Chriftians will likewife attack Albs Regalis, have reinforced that Garifon with 1000 Men from Buda. They write from Upper Hungary, That the Serafquier Achmet Bacha having cauled the Ostoman Troops that were encamped between Gyula and Temifwaer, to return to their respective quarters, was gone himfelf to Belgrade, to meet the Grand Vifier, who is expected there before the end of this Month. The fame Advices fay, That the Grand Vifier hath cauled above 30 Bacha's and General Officers of the Army to be firangled; And that three Bacha's of Afia were lately beheaded at Advianople, because the Troops they were ordered to bring with them were not complete. We have no freih News from Mongatz ; nor do we yet hear of the Tartars which the Turks give out are to join them in Upper Hungary. Hamburgh, April 26. The Elector of Bran-

deaburgh is gone to Croffen, to fee his Troops that are to Rendezvous there. We have an account from Berlin, That the Elector of Brandenburgh arrived the 24th past at Crogen, where he gave Audience the next day to the Count de Shafgoiz; Envoy Extraordinary from the Empiror; And that the 29th, the Brandenburgh Troops that are to ferve this Campagne in Hungary, twere to Rendezyous about a Mile from that

We have Letters from Constantinople de the 28th of February, which tell us, that the Sieur Girardin, Amballador from this Crown, parted from thence the 20th of the fame Month for Adrianople, to have Audience of the Graud Signior; That some days before a Quarrel hapned at Conftantinople, between several French Scamen and divers Soldiers belonging to the Turkifb Ships commanded by Baba Haffan, in which one of the French Men was killed, and tome others wounded ; That the Ambaffador made thereupon a great Complaint to the Caimacan, for that the Turks had first affaulted the French Men, and refused to go to his Audience till he had fatisfaction ; which was given him by Baba Haffan's going on Board the French Man of War, and asking the Captain's Pardon for the Injury that had been offered to his Seamen, and by releating two French Slaves for the Scaman that was killed. The Ambaffador demanded tarther, to have four of the Turks hang'd at the place where the Scuffle hapned, but the Caimacan pretended he could not comply with that without the Grand Signior's Order.
