Milan; April 24.

il R new Governor, the Count de Fuenlalida, arrived here the 22d Inflant from Pavia, accompanied with a great many Persons of Quality; The next day the Cardinal Visconti, Archbishop of Milan, made his Excellency a Visit, to compliment him upon his coming to this Government; And all the Great Officers and Ministers of State were likewise to make their Compliments to his Excellency.

Venice, April 27. The dast Letters from the Morea give an account, That after the raising the Siege of Chielifa and the taking the Enemies Cannon and Baggage, Captain-General Morofini cau-fed his Troops to Re-embark at Porto Vitulo, and sailed with the Fleet towards the Gulph of Calama-\*a; That a Body of Turkish Horse was encamped near Niezi, a place which the Captain Bassa much delights in, who hearing of the approach of the Venetian Fleet, decamped, and retired in great diforeler, leaving behind them several Mules and Wagons with a great deal of Provision, which they were in too much haste to take with them; And that the Maynotes purfued the Enemy, and killed and took Prisoners a confiderable number of them. We have Advice that the Bassa of Candia having lately taken a Review of the Ottoman Troops in that Kingdom, found they were not 12000, and these, for the most part, raw, undisciplined Men; And that they are in great fear the Venetians will make a Descent in that Island. By a Vessel come from Smirna, we are informed that Nine Men of War of Barbary were arrived there under the Command of Babassar, but

that they were very ill Manned.

Genoua, April 27. We have Advice that the Squadron of Men of War commanded the Duke of Mortemar, failed from Toulon the 9th Instant to the Westward. Two days ago parted from hence one of this States Gallies for Civita Vecchia, to join with the Pope's Gallies that are designed against the Turks. It's said that the Christians will have this Summer in the Levant 55 Gallies, 4 Galeasses, and 30 Men of War; A Force much superior to what the Turks will be able to bring to Sea. It is confirmed that the Algierines have broke with the Dutch.

Madrid, April 25. The 22d Instant their Cathohck Majesties went from hence to the Buen-Retito,
intending to pass some short time there, and to go

afterwards to Aranjuez. Prince Eugene of Savoy, who covered before the King the 16th Instant, as Grandee of Spain of the first Rahk, parted from hence the 18th for Hinneary. They write from Cadiz, that 12 Men of War of the Fleet that's to go and meet the Galeons were ready to put to Sea; that the rest were equipping with great diffigence, and that they expected three Ships from Holland; where they have been lately built for the Service of this Crown, and six from Biscape, to join the said Fleet:

Lemburgh, April 12. The King of Poland arriby an Express from his Ambassadors at Moscone, a Project of the Conditions upon which the Czari are wiling to enter into an Offensive and Defensive League against the Turks, the chief of which is; That this Crown shall quit all manner of Pretentions to the Cities of Kievia and Smolensko; The King having thereupon confulted with the Senators that are here, it was refolved to comply therein; and that the faid Project should be sent back to the Ambassadors, with directions to hasten the conclusion of this Alliance; By which the Moscovites will be obliged to employ a great Army against the Tartars, thereby to divert them from joining with the Turks against this Crown. The King has, since his being here, held several Councils of War. We do not hear that the day is yet fixed for the general Rendezvous, but it's believed 'twill be about the beginning of June. We have an account from Turky, that the Resident of this Crown at the Pore; who has been a Prisoner there ever since the beginning of this War, has at last obtained his Liberty; and is returning home with new Overtures of Peace from the Grand Visier.

Vienna, April 28. The News of Lieutenant-General Scherffenberg's being entred into Transilvania with a Body of 1 0000 Men, is confirmed, but what his Orders are, is not yet known; It was reported upon the first Advice we had of the march of. these Forces, that they were to join with those of Transilvania, but by the account we have since; that the Treaty between General Caraffa and the Deputies of Transilvania about setting the Contributions, is broken off, and that the Imperialits have thereupon made several Incursions into that Countrey, there feems to be more reason to believe that they are gone to treat Prince Abasti as an Enemy, than to join with him as a Friend. The last Letters from the Camp before Mongatz told us, they continued their Work for the draining the Ditch, but that the wetness of the Seafon hindred them from making any great progress in it; And it's fain here, that General Captara has Orders to leave the

Conduct of that Siege to the Count de Caraffa, or the Baron de Mercy, the Emperor intending to employ him in some more important Service. The General Rendezvous of the Army near Barkan is appointed to be on the 25th of the next Month.

Vienna, May 2. Their Imperial Majesties parted on hence this day for Newstadt. The Imperial from hence this day for New tadt. Troops are on their march to the General Rendezvous near Barkan; And all the General Officers that are here, will be going in few days for Hungary. Teckeley has again written to the chief of the Hungarians that are in the Emperor's Service, to perfuade them to enter into new Engagements with him, but they have fent the Letters to General Caprara without opening them. There passes little of moment before Mongatz, nor is it expected that the Besiegers will be able to carry on their Attacks with better Success than they now do, till the weather is more favourable. Our Advices from the Turkesh Quarters say, That the Asiatick Troops which are to ferve this Campagne in Hungar, and against the Poles, Rendezvoused the first of the last Month near. Adrianople, being about 50000 Men; And that the greatest part of these were fent towards Belgrade, where the Grand Vifier is expected the 10th of this Month; It is still faid, that he will command in Person the Ottoman Army in Hungary, but at the same time we are asfured that it will not be composed of above 60000. The Turks, we are told, have reinforced the Garifon of Buda to 9000 Men, and supplied the place with Provisions and Ammunition. Strasburgh, May 6. The last week three Ba-

talions marched from hence to Saar-Louis, and were followed yesterday by two more, and several others will take the fame way, so soon as those that are to supply their places here, are arrived. The Sieur de Bertillac will begin his march in few days with three or four Regiments of Horse to the Camp that's appointed on the Saar. The Margrave of Baden Dourlach came hither some days ago, and went from hence to Bisweiler, where he had a long Conference with Duke Christian of Birkenfelds, but we

know not the Subject of it. All the Endeavors that Hamburgh , May 7. have been used to compose the Differences between the Duke of Zell and this City, have hitherto been unsuccessful. The Lanenburghers continue in the Isle of Maruerder, and the other Posts they are still possessed of within the Territories of this City; And on the other fide, these Magistrates have resolved to send out 20 Detachement of Foot and Dragoons, with four pieces of Cannon, to coblige them to diflodge; but it's hoped that by the interpofition of the Imperial Ministers things wilbbe kept from farther Extremities. The Elector of Brandenburgh returned the 2d Instant to Berlin from

Crofferio where he had been to take a Review of his Tromps which are to ferve this Campagne in Hun-

Bruffels, May 14.1 Our Letters from Vienna of the 2d Instant, give an Account, That the Imperial Court was removed from thence to Newstade, where the Elector and Electoress of Bavaria were exprofed the 10th of this Month; That the Empe-For's Forces were marching to the General Rendezmous which was fixed for the 25th Instant, but that it was not yet declared who shall command the Army under the Elector of Bauqua; That Count Texteley, who still feeds the Turks with hopes that the Hungarians, who were formerly of his Party, will abandon the Emperor's Service, and return to him, had written particular Letters to Peterhasi, and all the principal Hungarian Officers, offering them great Sums of Money, and other Advantages,

if they would again join with him; And, for farther Inducement thereunto, affuring them that the Turks will have a great Army in Hungdry this Summer.

Whitehall; May 8. The French Ambassador having by a Memorial complained to His Majelty, That a Book intituled, Les Plaintes des Protestants cruellement opprimes dans le Royaume de France, was fold and dispersed in this Kingdom, in which Book are many Falsities, and scandalous Reflections upon the Most Christian King; And that the said Book was likewise Translated into English, and Printed here, His Majesty was pleased to Order, That diligent Enquiry should be made after the Translator and Printer of the same, that they may be profecuted according to Law: And that a printed Copy of the faid Book in French, and another in English, should be Publickly buint by the hands of the Common Hangman; which was accordingly put in execution on Wednesday last before the Royal Exchange.
