

AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 16th day of October 1852,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning the right of patronage of the district or new parish of Saint Andrew, Lambeth, in the county of Surrey, and diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying such scheme), at any time to assign the right of patronage of any district or new parish constituted under the provisions of the said Act, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons, contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as shall be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas by a scheme duly prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council by us, and an Order ratifying the same, made by your Majesty in Council on the sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty six, and duly gazetted, the said district of Saint Andrew, Lambeth, was duly constituted out of the district of Saint John the Evangelist, Waterloo-road, Lambeth:

"And whereas no assignment of the right of patronage of the said district has yet been made, under the herein-recited enactment:

"And whereas arrangements are now in progress for the erection of a church within the said district, to be offered for approval by us, and for consecration by the bishop of the diocese, as the church or chapel of such district, for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof; and a sum of four thousand pounds has been contributed and paid to us, upon trust, to be applied towards the building of the said church:

"And whereas the persons by whom the said sum of four thousand pounds has been so as aforesaid contributed and paid to us, have duly nominated to us the five several persons hereinafter named and described as trustees of the right of

patronage of the said district and the nomination of the minister thereof; and it has been proposed to us that, in consideration of the contribution aforesaid, such right of patronage and nomination should be assigned to such persons as such trustees, and that vacancies in the trusteeship of such patronage should be filled up from time to time in manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the right of patronage of the said district or new parish of St. Andrew, Lambeth, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall be assigned to and vested in Sir Walter Farquhar, of Saint James's-street, Baronet, John Labouchere, of No. 16, Portland-place, Esquire, Robert Cooper Lee Bevan, of Trent Park, in the county of Herts, Esquire, Benjamin Shaw, of No. 8, Cambridge-square, Esquire, and Charles James Bevan, of No. 70, Portland-place aforesaid, Esquire, as trustees duly nominated to us for that purpose, and that such right of patronage and nomination shall for ever thereafter be exercised by the same persons, or the survivors or survivor of them, as such trustees or trustee, and by such future trustee or trustees, being a member or members of the United Church of England and Ireland, as shall from time to time be nominated in writing under the hands or hand of the trustees or trustee for the time being, or the major part of them, in the place and stead of any one or more of them who shall from time to time die, resign, or become incapable of acting; provided always, that the number of such trustees shall not at any time exceed five.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.
