T the Court at Windsor, the 16th day of October 1852,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled the "Passengers Act, 1852," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council to be by her made, with the advice of the Privy Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit for preserving order, for promoting health, and for securing cleanliness and ventilation, on board of passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, and the said rules and regulations from time to time in like manner to alter, amend, and revoke, as occasion may require:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke an Order in Council, made at a Court, held at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, on the sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, in virtue of the provisions of the "Passengers Act, 1849," (now repealed,) and to make a new Order in

Council :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in her by the said "Passengers Act, 1852," order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, be and the same is hereby revoked; and that the following shall henceforth be the rules for preserving order, for promoting health, and for securing cleanliness and ventilation, to be observed on board of every passenger ship proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad out of Europe, and not being within the Mediterranean Sea.

1. All passengers who shall not be prevented by sickness or other sufficient cause, to be determined by the surgeon, or in ships carrying no surgeon, by the master, shall rise not later than seven o'clock A.M. at which hour the fires shall be lighted.

2. It shall be the duty of the cook or cooks, appointed uder the thirty-sixth section of the said "Passengers Act, 1852," to light the fires, and to take care that they be kept alight during the day; and also to take care that each passenger or family of passengers shall have the use of the fireplace at

the proper hours, in an order to be fixed by the master.

3. When the passengers are dressed, their beds shall be rolled up.

4. The decks, including the space under the bottom of the berths, shall be swept before break-

fast, and all dirt thrown overboard.

5. The breakfast hour shall be from eight to nine o'clock A.M. Before the commencement of breakfast, all the emigrants, except as hereinbefore excepted, are to be out of bed and dressed, and the beds rolled up, and the deck on which the emi-

grants live properly swept.

- 6. The deck shall further be swept after every meal, and after breakfast is concluded, shall be also dry holystoned or scraped. This duty, as well as that of cleaning the ladders, hospitals, and round houses shall be performed by a party who shall be taken in rotation from the adult males above fourteen, in the proportion of five to every one hundred emigrants, and shall be considered as sweepers for the day. But the single women shall perform this duty in their own compartment, where a separate compartment is allotted to them, and the occupant of each berth shall see that his own berth is well brushed out.
- 7. Dinner shall commence at one o'clock P.M. and supper at six P.M.
- 8. The fires shall be extinguished at seven P.M. unless otherwise directed by the master or required for the use of the sick; and the emigrants shall be in their berths at ten o'clock P.M. except under the permission or authority of the surgeon, or if there be no surgeon, of the master.

9. Three safety lamps shall be lit at dusk, and kept burning till ten o'clock P.M.; after which hour two of the lamps may be extinguished, one being nevertheless kept burning at the main hatchway

all night.

10. No naked light shall be allowed at any time

or on any account.

11. The scuttles and stern ports, if any, shall, weather permitting, be opened at seven o'clock A.M. and kept open till ten o'clock P.M.; and the hatches shall be kept open whenever the weather permits.

12. The coppers and cooking utensils shall be cleaned every day.

13. The beds shall be well shaken and aired on deck at least twice a week.

14. The bottom boards of the berths, if not fixtures, shall be removed and dry-scrubbed, and taken on deck at least twice a week.

15. Two days in the week shall be appointed by

the master as washing days; but no washing or | drying of clothes shall on any account be permitted between decks.

16. On Sunday mornings the passengers shall be mustered at ten o'clock A.M. and will be expected to appear in clean and decent apparel. The Lord's Day shall be observed as religiously as circumstances will admit.

17. No spirits or gunpowder shall be taken on board by any passenger; and if either of those articles be discovered in the possession of a passenger, it shall be taken into the custody of the master during the voyage, and not returned to the passenger until he is on the point of disembarking.

18. No loose hay or straw shall be allowed below

for any purpose.

19. No smoking shall be allowed between decks.

20. All gambling, fighting, riotous or quarrelsome behaviour, swearing, and violent language, shall be at once put a stop to. Fire arms, swords, and other offensive weapons shall, as soon as the passengers embark, be placed in the custody of the master.

21. No sailors shall be allowed to remain on the passenger deck among the passengers, except on duty.

22. No passenger shall go to the ships' cookhouse without special permission from the master, nor remain in the forecastle among the sailors on any account.

23. In vessels not expressly required by the said "Passengers Act, 1852," to have on board such ventilating apparatus as therein mentioned, such other provision shall be made for ventilation as shall be required by the Emigration Officer at the port of embarkation, or in his absence, by the officers of Customs.

24. And to prevent all doubts in the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered that the terms "United Kingdom," "Passenger," "Passenger Ship," and "Master," shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said "Passengers Act, 1852."

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Commissioners for the Affairs of India are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such warrant, and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided, that the power thereby given should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage:

And whereas it is considered expedient to alter the rates of postage payable on letters and newspapers conveyed between the United Kingdom and the republic of Peru:

Now, we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling us in that behalf, direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between the countries and places next hereinafter mentioned, there shall be charged and paid, in lieu of any rates heretofore chargeable on such letters, the several rates of British postage herein- | On every such letter, exceeding two ounces, and after set forth; that is to say:

Between any part of the United Kingdom and any port in Peru, or any foreign country, through Peru, direct, or viâ Panama, if the sea conveyance be by British packet-boat, a rate of two shillings, and if by private ship, a rate of eight-

Between the British West Indies and any port in Peru, or between the islands of Martinique and Guadaloupe and any port in Peru, without passing through the United Kingdom, the conveyance being by British packet-boat, direct, or via Panama, a rate of one shilling and four-

Between one port in Peru and another port in Peru, or between a port in Peru and any other port on the western coast of America, without passing through the United Kingdom, the conveyance being by British packet-boat, a rate of

sixpence.

Between any port in Peru and any foreign port, (the islands of Martinique, Guadaloupe, ports on the western coast of New Granada, and ports in the republic of the Equator, Chile, and Bolivia only excepted), without passing through the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance being by British packet-boat, direct, or viâ Panama, a rate of two shillings.

And we direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of Peru, transmitted by the post between Peru and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country, through the United Kingdom, and on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted between any foreign country, through Peru, and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country, through the United Kingdom (the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Peru direct, or via Panama), there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of two shillings, for the conveyance of every such letter between Peru and any part of the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance being by British packet-boat, and an uniform rate of British postage of eight pence, for the conveyance of every such letter between Peru and any part of the United Kingdom, if the sea conveyance be by private ship; and also such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such respective letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, as shall from time to time be chargeable and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and such colony or foreign

And we further direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and paid progressive and additional rates of British postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates following (that is to say):

On every such letter, exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage;

On every such letter, exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage;

not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates

And on every such letter, exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight

rates of postage;

And for every ounce in weight, above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce, above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as one additional ounce.

And we further direct, that such printed newspapers as are hereinafter mentioned may be sent by the post, free of postage, or liable to postage, according to the regulations and rates hereinafter set forth; that is to say:

British newspapers and such British publications as are allowed to pass by the post as newspapers in the United Kingdom, may, if posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Peru, be sent from the United Kingdom to Peru, direct, or viâ Panama, by packet-boat free, and by private ship at a rate of one penny each.

Newspapers published in the Spanish language, and posted in Peru, may be sent from thence to any part of the United Kingdom, direct, or via Panama, by packet-boat free, and by private

ship at a rate of one penny each.

Newspapers published in the Spanish language and posted in Peru, may be sent from thence to any British colony (without passing through the United Kingdom) by packet-boat, direct, or viâ Panama, free, and by private ship, at a rate of one penny each.

Newspapers published in the Spanish language may be sent by British packet-boat from one port in Peru to another port in Peru, (without passing through the United Kingdom) free.

Newspapers published and posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies may be sent from thence to any port in Peru (without passing through the United Kingdom) by packet-boat, direct, or via Panama, free, and by private ship, at a rate of one penny each.

Newspapers published in the Spanish language, and posted in Peru, may be sent from thence to any foreign port (without passing through the United Kingdom) by British packet-boat, direct, or viâ Panama, at a rate of two pence each.

And we further direct, that every printed supplement or additional sheet to any newspaper shall, for the purpose of charging the postage under this warrant, be deemed a distinct newspaper, unless sent in the same cover or together with the newspaper to which it is a supplement or addition.

And we further direct that the said newspapers shall be forwarded under and subject to the following conditions; that is to say:

Each must be sent without a cover, or in a cover or band open at the sides or ends, and there must be no word or communication printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the cover or band thereon, nor any writing, figures, or manual marks upon it, or upon the cover or band of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent. There must be no paper or thing inclosed in or with any such newspaper. Any newspaper not forwarded in conformity with such conditions is to be chargeable with the full letter rates of postage.
